

Let Your "Yes" be "Yes"


My Dear Eastern Diocesan Family:

In the Gospel of Matthew we read; "Let your word be 'Yes, Yes' or 'No, No'; anything more than this comes from the evil one."(Matthew 5:37)

What a difference between the standard Jesus sets for us, and the standard of the world. A person can particularly notice this when they find themselves surrounded by all the sights and sounds of an election season. It just seems that we are being bombarded by political ads, speeches, rallies, cable and broadcast channel reporting that continues to share half-truths, mis-truths and all out lies. It is the servant of God to execute wrath on the wrongdoer. Therefore one must be subject, not only because of wrath but also because of conscience. For the same reason you also pay taxes, for the authorities are God's servants, busy with this very thing. Pay to all what is due them—taxes to whom taxes are due, revenue to whom revenue is due, respect to whom respect is due, honor to whom honor is due. Owe no one anything, except to love one another; for the one who loves another has fulfilled the law. The commandments, "You shall not commit adultery; You shall not murder; You shall not steal; You shall not covet"; and any other commandment, are summed up in this word, "Love your neighbor as yourself." Love does no wrong to a neighbor; therefore, love is the fulfilling of the law. Besides this, you know what time it is, how it is now the moment for you to wake from sleep. For salvation is nearer to us now than when we became believers; the night is far gone, the day is near. Let us then lay aside the works of darkness and put on the armor of light; let us live honorably as in the day, not in reveling and drunkenness, not in debauchery and licentiousness, not in quarreling and jealousy. Instead, put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires."

So what do we do, as Christian and Catholic faithful who have to live in this world? Again Scripture tells us: But our citizenship is in heaven, and it is from there that we are expecting a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ (Philippians 3:20). See, I am sending you out like sheep into the midst of wolves; so be wise as serpents and innocent as doves (Matthew 10:16). Give therefore to the emperor the things that are the emperor's, and to God the things that are God's" (Matthew 22:21b). No one after lighting a lamp puts it under the bushel basket, but on the lampstand, and it gives light to all in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven (John 5:15-16). I have said this to you, so that in me you may have peace. In the world you face persecution. But take courage; I have conquered the world (John 16:33).

As we approach Election Day, Tuesday, November 5th, let us give unto Caesar that which is Caesar's. Let us do so knowing that our first citizenship is to the kingdom of our Lord Jesus Christ. May we always carry ourselves as Jesus' disciples, faithful to His teachings and rule.

In just a few days we Polish National Catholics of the Eastern Diocese will exercise a form of representative democracy as we engage in holy synod. May the Holy Spirit be a part of our gathering and may His grace, wisdom and guidance impel the synod to manifest God's will for the good work and building up of the Eastern Diocese.

Resolutions of the XXVI General Synod of the Polish National Catholic Church



Whereas, we the delegates to the XXVI General Synod of the Polish National Catholic Church—representatives of the holy People of God—have convened under

the leadership of our Prime Bishop and Bishops in Scranton, Pennsylvania, from the 18th through the 21st days of October in the year 2022;

Whereas, we were strengthened, enlightened and sanctified by our Lord Jesus Christ, Himself, truly present in our very midst through Word and Sacrament during the celebration of the Most Holy Eucharist, concelebrated by our Prime Bishop and Bishops at St. Stanislaus Bishop and Martyr Cathedral, first parish of the Polish National Catholic Church, and as Eucharistic people, and proclaim it as the most beautiful and important aspect of the great work of these blessed days;

Whereas, all of the Bishops of the Union of Scranton—the Most Reverend Anthony Mikovsky, the Right Reverend John Mack, the Right Reverend Paul Sobiechowski, the Right Reverend Bernard Nowicki, the Right Reverend Jarosław Rafalko, the Most Reverend Robert Nemkovich, and the Most Reverend Roald Flemestad were gathered around God's altar to witness the Most Reverend Ottar Myrseth of the Nordic Catholic Church sign the Declaration of Scranton and to welcome him into the Union of Scranton;

Whereas, we offer our gratitude to the Central Diocese of the Church, under the leadership of the Right Reverend Bernard Nowicki, and all those who selflessly assumed and attentively carried out the responsibilities of planning and hosting this Holy Synod;

Whereas, the Polish National Catholic Church joyfully celebrates the 125th Anniversary of its Institution, and we offer our humble and sincere gratitude to God for Bishop Franciszek Hodur and the dedicated and faithful parishioners who, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, sacrificed much in working together to organize our beloved Church;

Whereas, we recognize the foundation that was laid at the XXIV and bolstered at the XXV General Synods of the Polish National Catholic Church regarding our Future Direction and acclaim the efforts made over the last eight years by the Future Direction Subcommittee, wishing to especially recognize the enthusiasm of the Very Reverend Robert Nemkovich, Jr., as he steps down from the chairmanship of the Subcommittee and praying that the Holy Spirit will guide another dedicated disciple in leading these endeavors in the coming years;

Whereas, we received an impassioned and enthusiastic report from the National United Youth Association as delivered by its president Jorge Hernandez Arjona, and now pledge our support to National United Youth endeavors, and are zealously committed to work for growth or establishment of youth groups within our parishes, and for increased attendance at the biennial National Youth Convocations for which the Polish National Union of America has announced its gracious establishment of scholarships to provide financial assistance to youth who wish to attend the Convocations; Therefore, fervently praying that Almighty God, One in the Blessed Trinity, through the prayers of Our Lady, St. Stanislaus and all the Angels and Saints, will bring forth abundant fruit from the proceedings of this XXVI General Synod, and as we now prepare to return to our parishes and build up Christ's Church by executing its work, we hereby resolve:

To continually draw our strength from the Most Holy Eucharist and the whole Sacramental life of the Church; to seek the true enlightenment that comes to us from the Sacred Scriptures and through the holy teachings of the Church; to selflessly embrace the sacrificial work that Christ has entrusted to our care by fulfilling His Two Great Commandments of Love; to faithfully walk the pathway of Christian discipleship as marked out by the pristine faith of the Undivided Church of the first millennium; and to plainly show the Polish National Catholic Church to be an integral part of the One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church founded by Christ and professed within the Creed, by the bold witness of our words, by the shining example of our compassion, mercy and charity, and by our own lives of true and abiding holiness.

Resolutions of the XVI Eastern Diocese Synod October 10, 2020

Due to the Coronavirus and the inability to meet face to face, the XVI Synod of the Eastern Diocese convened virtually October 10, 2020. Hosted by Blessed Trinity Parish, Fall River MA the Synod was summoned under the authority of Right Rev Paul Sobiechowski, Bishop Ordinary of the Eastern Diocese and attended virtually by the Most Rev Anthony Mikovsky, Prime Bishop of the PNCC. Very Rev Robert Nemkovich Jr served as the moderator for this virtual Synod. Additionally, Bishop Paul Hewitt, Bishop Ordinary of the Diocese of the Holy Cross joined us and presented to the Synod.

The Synod began with a morning prayer which set the tone and inspiration for the proceedings of the day. Through our deliberations, we learned and discussed the following:

Whereas, we are thankful to Bishop Sobiechowski, our senior priests-Very Rev Joseph Krusienski, Very Rev Joseph Soltysiak and Very Rev Robert Nemkovich Jr for the planning and execution of a very successful virtual Synod; additional gratitude is extended to Very Rev Robert Nemkovich Jr for hosting and moderating this Synod.

Whereas we acknowledge the active participation of the delegates, guests, and clergy in fulfilling their discipleship role entrusted to them as members of our Holy Church and through their attendance and commitment in spreading God's word throughout our communities, our diocese and our Church.

Whereas we as delegates, reflect upon the legacy of faith set forth upon us by our organizer, Bishop Francis Hodur, the clergy, and organizers of the Church.

Whereas, we continue to support the endeavors of Future Direction and the overall theme of Discipleship towards increasing growth and membership, lifelong learning and renewed Spirituality among all members; to expanding community engagement efforts; and to enabling joyful responses to God's call to Sacred Vocations and service.

Whereas we acknowledge the work of the Eastern Diocese Strategic Planning Committee who over four years has worked diligently to:

a. increase the awareness of our church by enabling parishes to use more social media technologies, especially Facebook in promoting masses and special services, and various events and fund-raising activities.





Local veterans recently enjoyed lunch together at the Veterans' Kitchen of Fall River, currently located at Blessed Trinity Parish at 1340 Plymouth Ave.

The group of dedicated volunteers, led by Dawn Trahan, serves lunch to local veterans each Wednesday. Doors open at 10 a.m. and food is served at 11.

Workers in the kitchen prepared a healthy, delicious meal, as another team of volunteers from Home Depot readied to serve it. The Bristol County Home Depot group sends a team once a month to assist with the meal and deliver some smiles.

One of the lucky ones



WWII Army veteran Manny Carvalho agreed to share wittle about his life and his service to his country in the early 1940s. "I was a Sherman tank dover in the Tank Corp under General Patton," he said. "I served in North Africa, China, Burma and India.

"A 'bad thing' that happened during that time," Carvalho said, "was when we were on a ship to India and while we were at the Port of Iran, the Germans came from Crete and bombed us. We were in the water three hours before another ship came by.

"There were 1600 guys on that ship," Carvalho recalled. "Eight to nine hundred of them died. I was one of the lucky ones," he said. "There were only 100 life jackets and I got one of them. I couldn't swim, I was just bobbing up and down in the water."

After pausing he said, "Those days are gone. Those are bad old memories."

Having turned 99 in October, Carvalho said he lived in Westport with his wife Doris until she passed away in 1990. They had one son. The veteran proudly noted that he worked for the Fall River Housing Authority for 33 years prior to retiring.


• Monthly Veteran Breakfast

St. Casimir's Summer Gardeners

This spring St. Casimir's undertook a beautification project to improve the appearance of our exterior property. Bushes were trimmed, mulch was put down, weeds were attacked, new perennials were added and annuals were planted in containers.

A crew of volunteer gardeners worked to make sure the flowers were watered and cared for all summer. There was a schedule and each day the volunteer gardeners tended the plants.

Our dedicated summer garden crew included Deb, Beverly, Monica, Jacob and Jo Ann.

• The "Chasing Annie Powell" Project

Annie Powell (1859-1952) is a recently discovered street photographer who is likely responsible for 3,000 "anonymous" photos of Lowell, MA found in books, postcards and university libraries. Annie Powell took pictures of Lowell and its inhabitants at the beginning of the twentieth century. Included in her collection were various ethnic groups within their neighborhoods. When Annie



passed away, her photographs were found in her home, some of which have been made into posters. The "Chasing Annie Powell" Project celebrates Annie's work in and around Lowell. From spring 2024– October 2025 the city of Lowell will distribute 100 posters to local businesses, nonprofits and government agencies that now occupy buildings or have addresses on streets that Annie photographed one-hundred years ago.The goal is to show how Lowell neighborhoods appeared in Annie's time in relation to Lowell today.

St. Casimir's has been chosen to participate in the "Chasing Annie Powell Project".

Annie Powell was a local photographer who took pictures of Lowell and its inhabitants at the beginning of the twentieth century. Included in her collection were various ethnic groups within their neighborhoods. When Annie passed away 3000 of her photographs were found in her home, some of which have been made into posters. Posters will be displayed close to where the photographs were taken throughout Lowell.

Poster #3 depicts a tenement with a group of children on Lakeview Avenue. St. Casimir's will display it on the interior surface of our parish hall exterior door enabling passersby to view it until or about November 2025 when the entire collection will be displayed downtown.



Lowell Folk Festival

St. Casimir's works very closely with the Lowell Polish Cultural Committee to prepare foods sold at the Lowell Folk Festival. The Cultural Committee, in collaboration with St. Casimir's and Holy Trinity RC Church, works to promote Polish culture outside of Poland. Pauline Golec of the committee said the LPCC has been involved in the local festivals since 1974.

Food preparations required the use of our kitchen. Volunteers, over the course of many hours, made crispy rosettes and kapusta.

Cooked pierogies were packaged and sealed to keep warm during transport to the Polish booth on Market St. in Lowell. Other foods include kielbasa and kapusta. For the first time, people at the festival could buy all of the booth's offerings together as

"Polish Plate" for \$20.

It is a large effort with many volunteers cooking, moving food and other supplies to the festival grounds, selling food at the booth, and then bringing everything back to be cleaned and stored for next year. It is very satisfying to know people line up at the booth for these delicious Polish treats

Parade of Nations began the Lowell Folk Festival on Friday, July 26th.

In June we celebrated Father Tenus with our annual Pastor Appreciation day event. Parishioners gathered during coffee hour to toast Father's dedication and work for our church.





Annual "Alms Box" collection





Youth, adults and three clergy gathered for this inspirational time of prayer, worship, learning, fellowship and fun. After a delicious roast pork dinner, Fr. Sr. Rob Nemkovich, our diocesan Youth Chaplain, began the retreat in the Camp Lodge overlooking Newfound Lake with our opening prayer service and the presentation of the flags and retreat banner. Prime Bishop Anthony Mikovsky then prayed over and blessed Catholic Youth Bibles which were given to all participants in



memory of + Fr. Sr. Fryderyk Banas.

The new Bibles were immediately put to use in the activity "Journeying through God's Word" led by Kathy Nemkovich and Joanne Oliveira. A Penance Service with confession was led by Fr. 





Wisława Szymborska urodziła się 2 lipca 1923 na Prowencie (dzisiejszy Bnin, będący częścią Kórnika) jako córka Wincentego i Anny. Jej rodzina przeniosła się w 1931 roku do Krakowa, gdzie mieszkała i

pracowała aż do śmierci na początku 2012 roku. Po wybuchu II wojny światowej w 1939 roku, kontynuowała naukę w tajnym nauczaniu.

W 1945 roku podjęła studia z literatury i języka polskiego, które wkrótce zmieniła na socjologię na Uniwersytecie Jagiellońskim w Krakowie. Tam poznała i była pod wpływem Czesława Miłosza. W marcu 1945 opublikowała swój pierwszy wiersz "Szukam słowa" w codziennej gazecie Dziennik Polski; od tego czasu przez szereg lat jej wiersze były publikowane w różnych gazetach i periodykach. W 1948 roku porzuciła studia, z powodu trudnej sytuacji finansowej; w tym samym roku poślubiła poetę Adama Włodek, z którym rozwiodła się w 1954 r.

Jej pierwsza książka miała ukazać się w 1949 r. jednak cenzura nie pozwoliła, gdyż "nie spełniała wymogów socjalistycznych". Mimo to Szymborska pozostała wierna ideologii PRL-u, podpisując polityczne petycje (m.in. niesławną petycję z 8 lutego 1953 r. potępiającą polskich księży oskarżonych o zdradę w pokazowym procesie) oraz wychwalając Józefa Stalina. Włodzimierza Lenina i realia socjalizmu. Jest to widoczne w jej debiutanckim zbiorze "Dlatego żyjemy" z wierszami "Lenin" i "Młodzieży budującej Nową Hutę". Stała się też członkiem Polskiej Zjednoczonej Partii Robotniczej. Wkrótce jednak w Szymborskiej zaczęła narastać niechęć od ideologii socjalistycznej i wyrzekła się swojej wcześniejszej pracy politycznej. Chociaż oficjalnie nie opuściła partii aż do 1966 r., zaczęła kontakty z opozycjonistami. W 1957 roku zaprzyjaźniła się z Jerzym Giedroyciem, redaktorem naczelnym wpływowego emigracyjnego dziennika wydawanego w Paryżu "Kultura", do którego zaczęła pisać. W 1964 sprzeciwiła się wspieranemu przez komunistów protestowi do "The Times" przeciwko niezależnym intelektualistom, i domagała się wolności słowa.

W 1953 roku dołączyła do redakcji czasopisma przeglądu literackiego "Życie Literackie" a od 1968 roku prowadziła w nim własną kolumnę recenzji książek pt. "Lektury Nadobowiązkowe". W latach 1981-1983 była redaktorem miesięcznika "Pismo". W latach osiemdziesiątych zintensyfikowała swoją działalność opozycyjną.

Szymborska zaczęła być rozpoznawalną na arenie międzynarodowej, gdy w 1996 roku zdobyła nagrodę Nobla w dziedzinie literatury. Podczas przyznawania nagrody Akademia pochwaliła jej "poezję, umożliwiającą z ironiczną precyzją ukazanie kontekstu historycznego i biologicznego we fragmentach ludzkiej rzeczywistości".

Wisława Szymborska zmarła 1 lutego 2012 w domu w Krakowie.

Wisława Szymborska

"Let the people who never find true love keep saying that there's no such thing. Their faith will make it easier for them to live and die."

Wisława Szymborska was born on 2 July 1923 in Prowent, Poland (present-day Bnin, Kórnik, Poland), the

daughter of Wincenty and Anna. Her family moved to Kraków in 1931 where she lived and worked until her death in early 2012. When World War II broke out in 1939, she continued her education in underground classes.

In 1945, Szymborska took up studies of Polish language and literature before switching to sociology at the Jagiellonian University in Kraków. There she met and was influenced by Czesław Miłosz. In March 1945, she published her first poem "Szukam słowa" ("Looking for a word") in the daily paper Dziennik Polski; her poems continued to be published in various newspapers and periodicals for a number of years. In 1948 she quit her studies without a degree, due to her poor financial circumstances; the same year, she married poet Adam Włodek, whom she divorced in 1954.

Her first book was to be published in 1949, but did not pass censorship as it "did not meet socialist requirements". However, Szymborska remained loyal to the PRL official ideology, signing political petitions (i.a. an infamous political petition from February 8. 1953, condemning Polish priests accused of treason in a show trial) and praising Joseph Stalin, Vladimir Lenin and the realities of socialism. This is seen in her debut collection "Dlatego żyjemy" (That is what we are living for), with the poems "Lenin" and "Młodzieży budującej Nową Hutę" ("For the Youth who are building Nowa Huta"). She became a member of the ruling Polish United Workers' Party. Soon, however, Szymborska gradually grew estranged from socialist ideology and renounced her earlier political work. Although she did not officially leave the party until 1966, she began to establish contacts with dissidents. In 1957, she befriended Jerzy Giedroyc, the editor of the influential Parisbased émigré journal "Kultura", to which she also contributed. In 1964, she opposed a Communist-backed protest to "The Times" against independent intellectuals, demanding freedom of speech instead.

In 1953, she joined the staff of the literary review magazine "Życie Literackie" (Literary Life) and from 1968 ran her own book review column entitled "Lektury Nadobowiązkowe" (Noncompulsory Reading). From 1981 to 1983, Szymborska was an editor of the monthly periodical, "Pismo". During the 1980s, she intensified her oppositional activities.

Szymborska received international recognition when she won the Nobel Prize for Literature in 1996. In awarding the prize, the Academy praised her "poetry that with ironic precision allows the historical and biological context to come to light in fragments of human reality."

Wisława Szymborska died 1 February 2012 at home in Kraków.
