

Impact on Lifetime Earnings







## Who is in Virginia's education pipeline?







#### **pK-12 Students Experiencing Homelessness**


#### **Total Enrolled in Virginia Schools**

## What is GEAR UP?

Gaining **Early** Awareness and **Readiness for Undergraduate** Programs

**U.S.** Department of **Education federal grant** program designed to significantly increase the number of lowincome students who are prepared to enter and succeed in postsecondary education.

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## **GEAR UP Virginia (GUV)**



#### **7**<sup>th</sup> Grade Cohort

- Serving 15 divisions, now in 25 high schools
  - Supporting @ 4200 students from 7<sup>th</sup> grade (2014-15 academic year) through their first year of college (2020-21)

#### **Priority Students**

- Serving homeless students, as defined by the McKinney-Vento Act
  - Supporting up to 50 homeless high school seniors, annually, as they prepare for life after high school and enter postsecondary education
  - Priority partner school districts include:

Lynchburg, Newport News, Petersburg, Roanoke



- Improve the academic performance and college preparation of students
- Increase the number of students in rigorous courses
- Increase knowledge of college and financial aid among students and their families
- □ Improve college readiness rates
- □ Increase college enrollment rates

- Identify and talk with students about the program and benefits at the close of the junior year to help hurry onboarding and support in the fall
- New collaboration with VCCS' Great Expectations program to provide near peer mentors for students (Great Mentors) to work alongside MV Liaisons in the school and increase use of the iPad each student receives for communications, reminders, information sharing, promotion of tutor.com,
- □ Identify ways to solicit and share promising practices for supporting students statewide and nationally
- □ Conduct further research to gain a better understanding of the scale of the enrollment of students experiencing homelessness in VA colleges
- Establish a shared goal to track postsecondary credential attainment between K-12 and higher education
- □ Establish Single Points of Contact for students experiencing homelessness at each institution to help with the transition from K-12 to higher ed. and assess policy and campus "friendliness"
