There was also much discussion about the need for MPI to offer a mission trip opportunity for our donors and anyone who might be interested in MPI. A mission trip provides a chance for our donors to not only hear what is going on but to truly "see" what MPI is all about. Little did we know that day what an exciting opportunity awaited us. The Lord had something wonderful in mind for the great little county of Belize. . . and you!

During December 13-18 each one of you are invited to join the MPI board to help build One-Day-Churches, put the roof on a large new church and do maintenance and construction projects at La Loma Luz Hospital in Belize. Jerry just returned from Belize to meet the conference president, see the locations for these churches, find tin, and make various other arrangements. It was a busy and exciting trip. The various groups are extremely joyful in the thought of having a church of their own, just as we are excited to get to share in their dream. Presently there are groups of anywhere from 10 to 70 members that do not have any church of their own and meet in homes or rented buildings.

Some of you may be familiar with the One-Day-Churches, or you may have read about them in our last newsletter. (See our previous issue of MPI Update) When we were first thinking of this trip we thought only of building only a few churches, but thanks to the One-Day-Church program and Maranatha International we will be able to build at least 30. Truly I praise the Lord for his blessings! Building sites have been identified from Corazal to Punta Gorda and Belize City to Billy White.

Jeff's mother left the family for another man when Jeff was only 10 years old. He was so devastated by this rejection that he ran away and didn't see his mom again for 14 years. He stayed with a friend of his father's about 10 kilometers from his home, making them promise that they would not tell his family or else he would run again.

This friend had a pedal car business, so Jeff worked as a pedal car operator from age 10 to 15. He said sometimes his big passenger would have pity on him and let him be the passenger and they the peddler. Jeff had been attending a Baptist elementary school and wanted to continue in a Christian school. His pedal car work paid his way.

After elementary school he attended the largest high school on the island of Negros, graduating 5th in his class of 2000 seniors at the age of 15. His teacher asked him if he had parents to place the honors on him and he said no. The teacher cried and, he admitted, he cried, too.

Jeffrey is a very intelligent, focused and spiritual young man. After high school, a Baptist minister saw potential in him and assigned him to a church. He

worked hard for a year or so and the church grew. Then they moved him to a smaller church, but he was disappointed with that move.

About that time, an Adventist uncle living on the island of Palawan, invited him to come live with him. Jeff accepted his invitation and while there became an Adventist. He worked with his uncle for a few years, then his uncle sponsored him to attend Naga View Adventist College to take the ministerial course. Sadly, his uncle died in 2004 so Jeff had to stop school. For the last 4 years he has worked as a Bible worker where needed, though he would like to finish the ministerial course. He has great drive and potential.

We have decided to sponsor Jeffrey through MPI. Here is a letter received from him just a few days ago.

Hello Sir Ed & Mom Ruth, how are you? Thank you very much for your continued support. Mom Ruth & Sir Ed, I'm now the public information officer of YMC (Young Ministerial Club) in NVAC (Naga View Adventist College) We have elections for Min-



isterial <u>A</u>ssociation and the YMC is planning to make me their President in MA.

Please pray for me that God will enable me to do the task. I know it's a big task to do, I can do nothing without God. I also have good news for you, I always top in our quizzes. We will lead the program this afternoon for Sundown Worship and tomorrow for AY program.

Sir Ed & Mom Ruth thank you very much for the chance you've given to me. Don't worry we will plant vegetables for our foods. As of now we start planting, after three months we have vegetables. God has lots of ways to supply our needs.

Sir, Mom, I promise, I'll do the best I can to make my grades good and finish

my study. I'm looking forward that we can work together someday. I'm very happy for this opportunity you have given to me. I will not fail you....

We will send you my grades every end of the semester. We will send you also pictures about my whereabouts in school.

Stories from the Sierra Huichol of Mexico

Dagoberto "accidentally" discovers Seventhday Adventist physician in his neighborhood!

Our mission pilot and pastor, Dagoberto Cirilo, needed a doctor to check his knee. He looked in the Guadalajara yellow pages and found a doctor not far from his home

When he went for his appointment he noticed that the doctor had a Walla Walla College diploma on his wall! Dr. Mohan, who had been born in India, was pleased to tell Dago that he'd done his undergraduate studies at WWC. He then went to medical school at Autonomous University School of Medicine in Guadalajara, where he was now practicing.

Dagoberto told him, "I am a Seventh-day Adventist pastor and also the mission pilot for the Huichol mission aviation program."

Dr Mohan was delighted with this news and said, "When I was a medical student I flew with your predecessor, Pastor Bobby Roberts, to the Huichol Indians. He was a man whom I liked very much. I'd like to be in touch with him again."

Dagoberto told Dr. Mohan about our program and invited him and his family to visit church the following Sabbath. Dr. Mohan replied,

"You know, I always thought perhaps I would someday be back with the Adventist community again. I feel, like Moses, I have been wandering in the desert for forty years. I would like very much to start going to church again." The following Sabbath Dr. Mohan and his wife came to Dagoberto's church and have been faithful attendees since that time. On Sabbath, June 13, Mrs. Mohan and their 12 years old son were baptized as Seventh-day Adventist Christians.

Dr. Mohan has also flown into the Sierra Huichol with Dagoberto again, and we hope he'll become a strong part of our program. Isn't it amazing how God leads?

The response has been very positive with even some of the Huichol coming to the TV station and expressing their appreciation.

Many people are grateful to be able to see 3ABN and HOPE in their own homes. The station is also able to provide community service announcements. We are deeply grateful to Mission Projects Inc., Al and Kathy Nelson, and Mike Nelson who made possible the purchase of the TV tower and broadcasting equipment.

Baptisms in Puente de Camotlán

A report from mission pilot/pastor Dagoberto Cirilo

On the last Sabbath in February, at the new church in Puente de Camotlan, three Huichol Indians, and one woman from Puente de Camotlán were baptized. The new believers included Huichol teens, Karina Robles her brother Adlaberto Robles (16)

- and one more Huichol who it brings a very special happiness for me to tell you about.

Maria Guadelupe is a 44 year old Huichol grandmother who has overcome tragic circumstances in her life, but which has led to this day of happiness. Maria (not her real name) was raped by a family member when she was only 12. She fled on foot to another vil-

lage to escape the shame - a village several days' walk away, which she did alone and pregnant! There Maria gave birth to a daughter, Teresa, and in spite of her young age Maria managed somehow to raise Teresa and encourage her always to do her best in school. As she grew, Maria sent Teresa to Seventh-day Adventist Navajoa Academy where she came to know Jesus and was baptised.

Teresa studied nutrition at Navajoa, married a Huichol young man and is now a mother. Her mother's baptism is a very special happiness for all of us. God has watched over His precious daughter Maria and *her* daughter Teresa all of these years, and now both are anticipating the coming of Jesus.

The Puente de Camotlán church is located on the edge of Huichol territory. It is the town where the Huichol come to trade. The church sits high on a hill overlooking the beautiful valley, with the majestic Sierra Huichol in the background.
