

Chaplin's Corner

The lapel pen of the Grand Master of Kansas, Dale Morrow, is a Perfect Ashlar coming out

of a Rough Ashlar. He presented me with one of his pens at the 2019 Kansas Shrine Bowl and highly praised the significance of the Fellowcraft lesson of the Ashlars. This conversation sent me on a quest to learn more. Here is what I've learned. I agree with Most Worshipful Dale on the vital lessons contained in understanding the masonic principles of the Ashlars.

Rough and Perfect Ashlar are stones that serve to symbolize a man's spiritual and moral life. In history, only large buildings were made of ashlars. Other buildings were built with brick and wood. Rough ashlars were cut and raised by apprentice masons. They did that under the supervision of Fellowcrafts. The Master Masons were the general supervisors. The Master Masons had proved themselves as those that could make ashlars for the Master to best fit them for the builders use.

The Rough Ashlar and the Perfect Ashlar are symbolically used in the Fellowcraft Degree. The Rough Ashlar represents an uninitiated before he becomes "enlightened." The Perfect Ashlar represents the Mason who has received "light", strives to live a purposeful life, and does all he can to receive "more light".

A Rough Ashlar is in its natural state as an imperfect stone. An imperfect ashlar can be made perfect, but some major flaws are difficult to change, and these flaws can weaken a structure when the ashlar is fitted into the structure. This applies to both men and stones. A flawed ashlar can bring in negative thoughts, bitterness, envy, and divisions that weaken the body.

The Perfect Ashlar is shaped

into something better. Likewise, we become shaped into a being that has been tried by the square of virtue, encircled by the compasses of the boundaries given by the Creator. As Freemasons we must seriously and consider our personal responsibility to have a lifelong passion to becoming a more perfect ashlar.

In Holy Writ we find these words, "Whoever is patient has great understanding, but one who is quick-tempered displays folly. A heart at peace gives life to the body, but envy rots the bones. Whoever oppresses the poor shows contempt for their Maker, but whoever is kind to the needy honors God." Proverbs 14: 29-31.

Jerry Kramer spent 11 years in the NFL as a right guard for the Green Bay Packers. His career and post-football life is a lesson for us in becoming a more perfect ashlar.

Despite being a member of ESPNs NFL's 100 Greatest, and the NFLs Greatest of All Time 50th Anniversary Team, he was not inducted into the Hall of Fame. In his 11 NFL seasons he had 20 surgeries including removal of wood splitters from his abdomen and spine, lead shot removed from his liver, and after a bout with colon cancer he had a colostomy. He was selected as an All Pro 5 times. He was the



greatest lineman on one of the greatest teams that ever played. Yet he was overlooked.

Finally, February 3, 2018 at the age of 82, Jerry was elected to the Hall of Fame. He was the last person on the 100 greatest of All Time and the last person on the 50th Anniversary team to make it into the Hall. Despite having his hopes dashed so many times, Jerry was gracious, "I felt like the NFL had given me 100 presents in my lifetime. If I were to be upset

From the desk of the Recorder

§ 325.11 Election Regulations.

- (a) Electioneering. A candidate for an elected office in a Shrine temple may print, publish and circulate during the year he is seeking the elected office, a resume consisting of his educational back ground, his vocational history, and his Masonic and Shrine record. Except as provided in the prior sentence, the printing, publication, circulating or distribution of resolutions, letters, telegrams, tickets, email or other devices, by a unit, club, Noble, or group of Nobles, suggesting, recommending, opposing, or containing the names of proposed candidates for office in the temple is prohibited.
- (b) Expenditures Prohibited. The expenditure of money for gifts, favors, or entertainment on behalf of a candidate for elected office is prohibited.
- (c) Violation. For any violation of (a) or (b), the Imperial Potentate may suspend any offending Noble, and he may declare the election of the officers void and order a new election.
- (d) Notice. At least one week prior to the annual meeting or any election, the temple Recorder shall mail to each member a notice thereof containing this section.

This may seem to be early to write about the Circus, but before you know it the Circus will be in town!

As you may have heard by now, we have changed the basic Circus Committee structure and have moved to a permanent Circus Chairman. I have volunteered for this position for the next 3 years. One stipulation to me volunteering was that Noble Andrew Piper serves as my Assistant Circus Chair so that he can learn the Chair position and take over in three years, which he has volunteered to do.

Our goal of committing a permanent Circus Chair to the planning and organizing of our Circus was to bring consistency to the Circus Committee. We seem to try and re-invent the wheel each year with a rotating committee and unfortunately some aspects of the planning process fall through the cracks. We have been planning and holding our Circus for 80 years. We mostly continue to do the same thing each year with only minor changes. After each Circus we wonder why we did not do as well as prior years!

Another goal is to narrow the committee and not have as many involved in the planning process. We have combined some of the planning tasks that in the past involved several members and narrowed them to one Noble. That being said we have talked with "most" of the Nobles on the current committee with the planning process. The ones we have not met with yet; we will soon! You probably also noticed we did not have a meeting in August as we have in prior years. We will have a meeting in January 2020 as we have in prior years to tie up loose ends.

This first Circus may not see huge changes on the surface; however, we have already started making some changes. Some changes may work great, others not so great, but in order for us to take our Circus into the future we cannot keep doing the same things each year.

We are going to be using the Stormont Vail Event Center (formally known as the Expo Center) to handle more aspects than we have in the past. This year they will be printing all of our tickets. We will be able to print the minimum amount we feel we need and if we need additional tickets they can be printed right away and readily available. The cost is considerably less than we have paid in prior years.

One of the biggest changes with our tickets will be with the Nobility tickets. This year we will not be mailing nobility booklets. We will send the letter that we have in the past to explain the price of the tickets and the Grand Parent program we have. This year we will ask the Nobles to pick up their tickets from the office and pay for them at the time they are obtained. This will allow you to purchase the exact amount of tickets you want, no more than you want or no less than you want.

We are planning to offer a family pack of tickets to include "possibly" parking or maybe a free toy with the purchase of the family pack.

We will also be offering early sale of tickets on "Cyber Monday" so



that parents and grandparents can include them as stocking stuffers for Christmas.

We will possibly be changing our bike give away. We are currently considering giving away iPads, a drone, bicycles or even a combination of all. As we have in prior years we will ask our Units to help sponsor whatever product we decide to give away. We hope to help spur the sales of our programs to improve the program sales. We will also change the process at intermission in order to shorten the amount of time spent with intermission.

The office made a special effort to put together the Advertising Packets early this year. The sales of ads for our programs are a significant part of our Circus income budget! You should have received an email that your packets are ready to pick up at the office. If you are unable to pick them up from the office, as in prior years I will have them at the Directors Meeting in October to give to your Unit Directors. You will notice that we have changed the ad sales order form to hopefully make the sales packages simpler and cleaned up the pricing to help you with your sales.



What the heck is a "Meat Raffle"?

Have you seen "the wheel"??? It's made an appearance a few Friday nights now in anticipation of a new fund raiser we've been working on.

We're always looking at new and fun ways to raise money for the Temple. At Oriental Guide school I learned of something that many other Temples are doing. After a several calls and lots of information shared, we're ready to bring this new fundraiser to Arab. The origins of meat raffled are unclear, but they are becoming a regular and well-established part of the fundraising activities in other parts of the country.

For example, Minnesota is one of a few states to regulate and keep track of earnings from charitable gambling, and last year nonprofits earned around \$12 million from various events, the majority of which were meat raffles!

Most meat raffles share some commonalities. After paying your admission, (which includes food and a drink), selecting a seat at a table and partaking in a beverage of choice, (typically beer or

fountain soft drink), the fun starts with exchanging your large bills for \$1 bills. This makes the job of the ticket sellers easier and speeds along the sales process.

The raffle itself is divided into "rounds". At the beginning of each round, the emcee will announce the number of spins of the wheel for that round. Ticket sellers walk around the room at the beginning of each round selling tickets. Each ticket will cost \$1 and will count for every drawing in that round. The more spins per round the better your chances are of winning multiple prizes with the same ticket. This means that if the wheel lands on your number for any spin that round you win! Prizes often includes bacon, meat sticks, ground beef, steaks/chops and poultry.

These events are a fun time and great social gathering. Bring some friends – the larger your group the more people who have tickets and the better chance someone in your group will win. Pro tip - if you plan to attend: Get there early and be prepared to raise your hand for

raffle tickets as soon as the word is called - the tickets are limited and sell out quickly!

So – bring coolers for your winnings and please join us at Arab Shrine's first Meat Raffle! Before we go "live" with the public we're having a "trial run" on November 3rd for Shriners and friends. Tickets are \$10.00 and available at the office – but hurry we will be full after the first 200 are sold. While this is a trial run the prizes and fun will be real!

I know that Mike Allen, Illustrious Sir Steve Kramer, Kimberly Justus, Gary Ashton and Melissa Rogers have had a hand in the construction and painting of the wheel. 
Clowns byWhiznut (Brad Pollman)

With great instructors like Jeff and Tony along with Curt's humor, breaking clays doesn't have to be a mystery. It just takes time and practice.



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
