

The Reverend's Ruminations - November 2023

As I look ahead at my calendar, there are still <u>nine</u> more weeks left in the year. But in the church's liturgical year we are rapidly approaching a new season. Yes, the entire month of November <u>is</u> still the Season after Pentecost (often called Ordinary Time), but by December 3rd we will be into the season of Advent with its anticipation of Christmas. It may seem I'm jumping the gun, but I'm sure you, too, saw a few Christmas trees and decorations beginning to occupy aisles near the Halloween costumes by mid-October, just as the autumn leaves were just reaching peak colors!?! I must admit, our warm late-October did recently give me pause to think of putting up some Christmas decorations—but that's only in a quintessentially-Minnesotan nod to "getting them up before it's too cold or snowy to work out there."

As usual, there is plenty more I should be doing outside before the snow flies, so let's not rush that part of winter just yet. As I recall, November also has at least one big holiday that many of us are "thankful" for—not to mention local elections, Veteran's Day, and a little-known holiday known as Ellen and my 25th wedding anniversary on the 21st. It's hard for us to believe we've been married that long, but for some in this congregation a quarter century together is just a drop in the bucket. Thank you for the inspiration!

In our wide-ranging Old Testament journey exploring the ancestors of our faith, November will include passages from the books of Joshua, Judges, and Ezekiel. One of the most familiar verses we'll encounter from Joshua is an affirmation that you may well have displayed somewhere around your home—although likely only the final dozen words: "Now if you are unwilling to serve the Lord, choose this day whom you will serve, whether the gods your ancestors served in the region beyond the River or the gods of the Amorites in whose land you are living; but as for me and my household, we will serve the Lord" (Joshua 24:15, NRSV). Have you contemplated Joshua's impact on your life?

In this month of thanks-giving, I challenge you to take a moment and think back on the examples of faith that you saw modelled in your household by parents, grandparents, or other family members. Though some in the congregation may have come to faith later, or by other means, it is likely that most of us grew up in a household that instilled the importance of prayer, church attendance, and faithfulness you have today. Please pause—on Thanksgiving or sometime this month, whether in person or in prayer—to thank those most influential in your Christian development!

After a bit of a hiatus, I'm happy to announce that our **Adult Sunday School** is getting a reboot in a new time slot—and with the addition of a light meal! A survey of past participants and those interested in joining indicated a preference to meet immediately following the worship service once or twice a month. So... on **Sunday, November 12** we will start a 7-part video-based series from **rightnow** MEDIA entitled "For the Life of the World." Please join us for some lively discussion, a warm bowl of soup, and maybe a few extra treats too! The schedule of subsequent sessions will be determined with those in attendance, so stay tuned to the bulletin or Facebook page for information about our next gathering.

With a new year inevitably around the corner, I also ask that you prayerfully consider how you might serve a more active role at First Congregational United Church of Christ. We are actively seeking board and council members for a new term, and I encourage each of you to take your turn in these valuable ministries of the local church. None of the board positions takes more than a few hours a month, and are a great way to get acquainted with other members of our congregation. Of course, there are also opportunities for short-term help in the way of kitchen workers, singers, Christmas decorators, ushers, greeters, or scripture readers as well. Volunteers, no matter the duration of the task, help make the many ministries of First Congregational UCC possible.

As November wears on and *snow* inevitably makes its way into our vocabulary, I hope you and yours remain warm, healthy, and safe!

The Council met in Heritage Hall at 5:45 PM. The meeting was called to order by Moderator Abigail Anderson. Pastor Cory led in prayer. Motion to approve the minutes from the September 20 meeting was M/S/C (Catherine/Amanda).

Treasurer's Report: Catherine reported that we are at 59.40% of pledged giving received at the end of September. Boards should be thoughtful about spending. Budgets should be returned to her right after the November boards meetings. Ask Catherine if you have any questions. A motion to accept the treasurer's report was M/S/C (Amanda/ Larry).

Pastor's Report: Pastor Cory reported that visitations have been up, and he was able to go up to Mankato for a visit as well.

Hy-Vee & Fareway Report as of 22 October 2023

During the last four weeks, \$11,698.08 (5.98%) worth of Hy-Vee slips were received. After 43 weeks, Hy-Vee is at \$173,907.26 (86.95%) toward the 16^{th} goal which is now \$200,000.

During the same time, \$3,545.15 (2.36%) worth of Fareway slips were received. After 25 weeks, Fareway is at \$32,563.05 (21.71%) toward our 5^{th} \$150,000 goal.

This program started the first of March 2011, so any slips from then until now can be used. Any Fairmont Fareway and Hy-Vee food store register slip can be used. Even slips from Hy-Vee Fast & Fresh (Gas), Coffee Shop, Food Service, and Pharmacy help us toward the goal. Delivery slips/ sheets can also be used. Thanks to all who bring/mail the slips to the Church, or mailing them or dropping them off at my house


Sunday, November 12, during the worship service, we will celebrate together our wonderful Family and will receive the **promises of support for our continued mission** as followers of Jesus Christ.




The NE entry to the church will be closed starting on November 15th or earlier if it snows.



Our culture is full of opinions masquerading as wisdom. What's worse, much of what passes as wisdom today has the ring of biblical truth. How can we tell the difference, and sort through the half-truths and self-help trends to access the deep wisdom of God's Word?

Those are the questions Jarrett Stephens tackles in this series—**Trite**, **Not True**—where he explores seven of the most common pop philosophies that influence people's lives today, including Christians. Ultimately, the life of meaning and impact you long for doesn't come from a philosophy, platitude, maxim, or mantra...but from one person, Jesus Christ.



We've all heard these statements. At one time or another in a noble attempt to encourage someone else or coach ourselves up in the midst of a challenge or difficult situation, we say what's easy. At the time, it sounds good to say and feels even better to hear, but is what we are communicating even true? Is it even biblical? This is important because shallow statements won't lead to deep living, and false belief can lead to a false hope. This series looks at some cultural beliefs and trite statements inside Christianity that sound good, wise and helpful, but in the end might not be true biblically, and if not dealt with in an honest way could discourage people, disrupt their faith, and lead them further away from a true relationship with God.

As the weather turns colder and your kids or grandkids start to beg for a bit of screentime after school or supper, I of course encourage you to help them find creative outlets that keep their imaginations active. But we all know that there are moments when they (and you) can also benefit from wholesome, fun shows that inspire them without the fear of commercials and online ads. **Whirl** — published by **Sparkhouse Family Media**, the creators of our Sunday School curriculum — offers hundreds of short, animated stories that will keep the kiddos interested and inspired for positive growth. There are 7 volumes of 20, 4-minute videos available. The description of the series is short, but gets to the heart of what they offer for kids 3 & up:

Ada & Friends introduce kids to a group of friends who help each other navigate real-life problems and adventures using biblical values.

Wild Rice Soup from Mary Ellen Mackey

1 C. wild rice

l medium onion

½ C. diced ham or 7 slices of bacon

2 cans cream of potato soup

l qt. milk

3/4 lb. Velveeta cheese

Cook wild rice in 2 cups of water. Bring to a boil, then simmer for 30 minutes. Dice and sauté onion. Fry bacon and cut into small pieces. Place in crockpot and add soup, milk, and cheese. Simmer for 2 to 4 hours.
