Epiphany

Epiphany is coming January 8th instead of January 6th. Epiphany is the day we celebrate the Gentile World, the whole world coming to Jesus and Jesus being recognized as the light of and for the whole world. The Christmas season lasts 12 days and the next day is the day that we celebrate the Magi coming to visit Jesus.

This year Epiphany is January the 6th as always and that falls on a Friday. I really didn't think we would get many people during basketball season to a Friday night worship. But, this is such a special time for the church, we are going to celebrate the day on Sunday, January 8th. We will be using the assigned readings for Epiphany Day.

In addition, I will ask the children and some adults present to carry flags of the nations into the worship space and place them in the Chancel area in front of the reredos. We will leave the flags in the sanctuary for the season following Epiphany prior to Lent. This is a visible reminder that Christ comes for the whole world.

The word *epiphany* itself means "to show," "make known," "to reveal," or, as suggested in the words of Luke 1:78, "to break upon us." The origins of the Epiphany celebrations are found in the Eastern Church, where connections were made to the nativity, the Baptism of the Lord, and the miracle of Jesus' changing of water into wine at the wedding in Cana.

The Western Church later linked this day to the visit of the Magi or Kings, which has since become the more dominant theme in many churches, such as those of Hispanic and Latin culture that observe *el Dia de los Tres Reyes*, "Three Kings Day."

In all of these examples, Jesus is revealed anew in a particular way: through birth, voice of God and descending spirit, miracle, or star. According to The Companion to the Book of Common Worship, while "Christmas marks the coming of God to us, Epiphany celebrates the appearance of the Lord in the midst of humanity."

While the day of Epiphany was once one of the primary festivals of the church along with Easter and Pentecost, over time it has lost its significance in many churches. Epiphany is still a time to worshipfully consider the hospitality that is most appropriate when we see Christ in friend and stranger – to welcome each guest as we would welcome Christ himself. Of course this brand of koinonia (fellowship) needs to happen between teenagers and believers of all ages and stages within the church, but it also needs to happen between those with whom teens relate with the most ... other teenagers!" Stier argues that the community fostered by youth ministry can be a safe place for youth to ask hard questions and to explore their struggles in light of their faith.

I'm excited to be part of the youth ministry that is taking place here at St. Paul's. Please join me in prayer for our youth program: for the advisors, the parents and all the supporters that make it possible; for our youth, that they will be nurtured by their time together; and for us, that our youths' energy and enthusiasm ignite our faith.

Thank you from the Stewardship Committee to everyone who responded so generously with pledges on our Commitment Sunday in November.

Thank you to those who shared their thoughts about Stewardship during Temple Talks: Daniel Locke, Curt Hahn, Linda and John Foreman, William Timmons, Alice Barnes.

Thank you to everyone who took the time to talk with members of the committee and to provide quotes and stories for our bulletin inserts and brochure.

Thank you to Susan Esposito who managed the printing and details.

From all accounts, our results were very positive.

Briefly:

- The challenge gifts were well-received. ►
- We received 20 more pledges on (and leading up to) Commitment Sunday as compared to Commitment Sunday last year.
- There are 9 brand new pledgers. ►
- There was about \$30K more pledges as compared to last year.
- There are 20 more people who signed up for Simply Giving (bank drafts) which will be helpful for stable, predictable offerings.

Although we did not get everything we had dreamed about, the budget is \$42K larger than last year. It encompasses:

- small raises for staff ►
- ► a fully-funded vicar
- mortgage payments of \$31K on the new mortgage for the house next door, which has been renamed Damascus House.

After 4 years of stagnant budget numbers and little/no salary increases for staff, we have a budget this year that does all of that!

In addition to that good news, if giving in December proves as good as last year, we can carry over \$65K into next year and will not have to take from Capital Reserves for the first time in many years.

Clearly, we are a generous congregation who understand God's abundance and shares from the abundance we have been given.

In 2017 you will see the Stewardship Committee launching a year-long program of Stewardship for all Seasons. We will be talking about stewardship of our time, our talents, and our treasures. We will offer educational programs about Planned Giving and Spiritual Gifts and maybe more.

If you have not filled out a pledge / commitment card, it's never too late to do that. Ask anyone on the Stewardship Committee to make sure you get a card. And PLEASE continue to talk with the members of the committee and to share your ideas.


