Purim the Improbable

The amazing thing about Purim is that we all understand that it is based on a Biblical book that is pure fiction. I know that there are people who think the whole thing is fiction. I am not among them. But even I and even the most pious have no question that you cannot pass the Book of Esther off as anything other than farce—and made up farce at that. Some people (including some of the rabbis in the Talmud) wonder how it got included in the Bible at all. The events are implausible. Unbelievable. Here is a story about a foolish, incompetent ruler with such absurd qualities: impulsive; bad to and for women; uncouth and self-centered. He has sinister advisors who give him nothing but bad advice. He keeps making ridiculous rules and destructive laws and feels that he has no choice but to carry them out. As a result, he makes things dangerous. His outrageousness puts the lives of his subjects in peril. Isn't that just zany. It's all too funny. The reason we love this story so much is because we understand that such things cannot happen in real life. It just pushes the boundaries of the imagination. The fictitiousness of it all is so self-evident. Life in the real world is nothing like that at all. What a great fantasy.

That is why we have a holiday devoted to it. We need a break from the boring monotony of real life. So, our tradition says, take a break from conventional normality. We live in the fantasy of a dystopian government for one day. Do what you don't do the rest of the year: Get drunk. Get rowdy. Behave in outrageous ways that you wouldn't do any other time to keep in the spirit of the sheer outrageousness of this outlandish story.

Then when the holiday is over you can return to the humdrum normalcy of our everyday reality. One day of Purim is great. Can you imagine having to live with that all 365 days of the year? B'Chalom. Rabbi Daniel Polich



Kabbalat Shabbat Sermon: 8000

February 22, 2019

Tonight I hope you will please indulge the thoughts of a 76 year old man whose future is the past because that is where I feel most happy, even though one needs to be very careful not to shine golden lights on bygone days, because most of them were not as glorious as we dream. You know that I love so many things Italian in origin, particularly my Tuscan wife, so please bear

with me when I pull you back for a moment to the terrible days of the War and ask you to hold in your minds the fact that 8000 Italian Jews died in the Holocaust.

So, where does this old guy want to go with this?

Only to tell you that, that number, 8000, represents only 61 days of deaths due to Oxycodone in America. That a Jewish family, the Sacklers, great donors to world-wide museums, including the one for which my own son works, have, since 2007, after having paid a huge fine for misleading doctors about the dangerous potential of that drug, that this family has banked 4 billion dollars, mostly profits from Oxycodone, sickens me. These are folks who I am sure consider themselves Jews.

How can folks who are our people, whom our Torah calls for, indeed demands, an exalted vision for the world, secretly conspire to increase the sale of these terrible drugs by lobbying doctors to use higher doses to maintain profits? How can they call themselves Jews and pat themselves on the back for donating to the very museums where I have spent some of the most beautiful moments of my life. How can I not feel the urge to retch when I walk up the steps of the Smithsonian, or the Metropolitan Museum of Art?

I know I am old and when you get old, your tummy isn't as tough as it used to be.

I am not softening the blow of any of this when I say that the Sackler paterfamilias was already dead when they struck the Oxycodone goldmine, and, if I am to take his widow at her word, he would have been horrified. So let's give Sackler senior and his widow a pass on the Oxycodone issue.

But I really believe that, as the state of Massachusetts un-redacts information that the Sacklers and their attorneys are struggling to keep hidden, there will be plenty of heinous, horrific guilt to go around the Sackler family. Many years ago I lived high on a hill, surrounded by beautiful homes, many of which I built with my own two hands.

An organization wanted to turn a home almost one mile away into a small residence for developmentally disabled people.

The Nimbys came sailing forth, afraid for their property values, their children, probably for their pets. After they had all said their piece, a little brown-skinned guy with a deep Spanish accent, stood up and said: I have been in America 30 years, this is the first time I feel ashamed to be an American.

I know the damage beyond these poor lives sacrificed to greed. This greed damages us as Jews. I can barely contain my rage. I hope you can help me find direction.





Member's Corner

We Continue to be the Story Today

Shabbat Shalom!

When I first looked at this Torah portion, *called Mishpatim* – which means ordinances or rules, I was very confused. There is no introduction. It begins like this: "Now these are the ordinances which thou shalt set before them." I began looking ahead and realized that this portion is very long. Then I had to look backwards to see what came just before it to make sense of the beginning. Well, SURPRISE, the one that comes before Mishpatim is the portion with the TEN COMMANDMENTS!

At that point I was thinking, why couldn't I have the Ten Commandments portion?

So, I was disappointed with this portion. I was disappointed because it felt like there was no sweeping narrative, no major story, especially after the vast, cinematic scenes with which we are so familiar in Exodus – it seemed like it was just a list of rules and this seemed boring.

But, once I read the whole thing and looked at some commentaries I realized that this portion has a lot going for it. It has some of the most recognizable lines in the Torah such as "An eye-for-an-eye, a tooth-for-a-tooth" and "you shall not boil a kid in its mother's milk" – which is the basis for all kosher laws. And, towards the end Moses communes with God at the top of Mount Sinai for "40 days and 40 nights." Just as the ten commandments were given on Mount Sinai, so were the ordinances of Mishpatim. It says in this portion that God told them to Moses and Moses wrote them down.

In a very abbreviated summary of Mishpatim I can tell you that: there are the laws about how to treat slaves. There are laws about what happens when people fight and someone gets hurt. There are laws about how to treat animals. There are laws about seduction, marriage and the monetary value of a fetus. There are laws about what to do with a sorceress. There are also positive laws such as kindness to strangers, to widows and orphans. There are laws about loving God and only God. There are laws for those in positions of authority; they are not supposed to lie or to take bribes. Three holidays are outlined in this portion - Passover, Shavuot and Sukkot, and there are laws about observing Shabbat.

As I got more into it I began to realize that this very portion is the link to our people from the past to the present. And that we present day Jews continue the narrative of our people every day through the laws.

I want to mention here that my feeling about being a Jew has changed dramatically as I have grown and through my life experiences. When I was a child, I was raised by my Holocaust-survivor parents with the message that being a Jew was almost like a curse, and that it could not be escaped. This was frightening and did not make me feel positive about my religion or my people – and certainly did not lead me to search for continuity between the past and the present. But, when Richard and I went to Kenya to volunteer, I met people from the Luo tribe and realized how much we Jews had in common with them. They had a strong sense of who they were in the world and their responsibilities towards each other. I began to feel grateful that I too had such a strong sense of who my ancestors were – that I could know who I was and where I came from.

I began to understand that the Torah was the story of my people and that my long-ago ancestors read the same words, celebrated the same holidays and sang some of the same songs that we do today. However, I wasn't overly curious about reading the words for myself.

But, because I was assigned this portion, I have learned that this isn't just the story of our people in the past – we continue to be the story today. We are actors in this continuing narrative; we are a Covenant people. The ordinances of *Mishpatim*, to which our ancestors responded to God "this we shall do," still apply to us today. And, although there are numerous debates about how to apply these ordinances to our own lives, I now understand that we are connected to the Torah – to the story of our people – every day through the decisions that we make. God is in the details. When we decide to be kind to strangers, to value the lives of animals, to care for the poor and, generally, to make the world a better place, we are not just doing a good thing or following a commandment, a mitzvah. We are being holy, just as God wants us to be. We are honoring God and each other.
