CHOOSE TO BE A PRACTICING CHRISTIAN

(Deut. 11:18, 26-28, 32; Ps. 31:2-4, 17, 25; Rom. 3:21-25, 28; Matt. 7: 21-27)

Adam was a sixteen-year-old high school sophomore. He had grown to become very stubborn and was considered a threat to his fellow students and teachers at school. He was not doing well at school, failing his tests and exams. He was always involved in fights, and had been suspended from school on several occasions. He was very disobedient and mean to his mother at home. She was very worried and concerned about him. Thus, she asked for the help of her parish priest and requested him to speak with her son, Adam, privately. The priest obliged, and invited the young man in for a chat. During the two-hour conversation, Adam revealed to the priest that his mother, a single parent, had not been a good influence in his life. Although she had done her best to provide for his material needs, she had not provided for his emotional and spiritual needs. She had not shown good example in her relationships and moral life. "Probably, I am modeling her life!" Adam added, in frustration.

Many families have experienced a similar tragedy! The choices we make in life have consequences – they may either affect us directly or those who are dear to us. The context of today's first reading, is when Moses observed that the people he led out of Egypt had made some wrong choices and had refused to obey God's commandments, he exhorted them to "Take these words of mine into your heart and soul" (Deut 11: 18). In the second reading St. Paul reminds us that although we have all sinned, it is only by God's grace that we are saved. The Lord loves us in spite of our sins, and He wants us to be saved with Him in Heaven. He wants you and me to make choices that will bring us life - choices that will not cause us injury or harm - choices that will give us lasting joy and happiness. "I set before you here, this day, a blessing and a curse: a blessing for obeying the commandments of the Lord, your God...a curse if you do not obey..." (Deut. 11:26-28; 30:19). I urge you to, therefore, choose "blessing" that you might live and be happy ever there after!

At our Baptism, the Lord intended you and me to live a life that will win us eternal life with Him in Heaven. He exhorted us to observe His commandments, norms and laws so that "you will live and increase, and...your God, will give you His blessings..." He urged us to "choose life that you and your descendants may live" (Deut. 30:15-16). The bad choices that Adam's mother made, unfortunately, adversely affected not just her, but also her son. Adam's bad choices in the end affected him and his relationship with other kids and the teachers. The lesson we all should learn from today's gospel is that "Not everyone who says to me, Lord, Lord, will enter the kingdom of heaven, but only the one who does the will of My Father in heaven." In other words, as Christian parents and leaders, we should always lead not just by our words, but also by our good deeds. You and I should avoid making choices that will estrange us from Jesus, and might make Him say to you or me, "I never knew you. Depart from me, you evildoers." Jesus is telling you and me it is only those who make good and meaningful choices that "will enter the kingdom of heaven."

The teachings of the Church may seem unreasonable or futile to some of us. At times, the laws and commandments of God may sound unattainable and meaningless to you and me, but they are meant to win us life. When we humble ourselves, persevere and remain faithful to the Lord's commandments, then we act "like a wise man that built his house on rock. The...floods came...the winds blew...But it did not collapse; it had been set solidly on rock" (Matt. 11:25). When your faith and values are built on God, you will be able to overcome temptations and surely the Lord will be your "Rock of safety."

Metanoia is a Greek word for Lent, which connotes a change of mind and heart, altering one's mind-set toward whole new ways of thinking and acting. Lent is a period where we take a long look at where we are and try to see where we ought to be. It involves testing our values and discerning how they stack up against the values that our Lord Jesus offers His followers. Subsequently, Lent is a time when we acknowledge our guilt for the sins that led to Christ's passion and death.

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ASH WEDNESDAY

This Wednesday, March 9th, is Ash Wednesday and marks the beginning of Lent. As the beginning of Lent, Ash Wednesday calls us to the conversion



journey that marks the season. The readings assigned to Ash Wednesday highlight this call to conversion. The first reading from the prophet Joel is a clarion call to return to the Lord "with fasting, and weeping and mourning." On Ash Wednesday the Church invites us to receive ashes on our foreheads as a sign that during the season of Lent we will make sincere efforts to cleanse our lives of sin, and discipline ourselves through almsgiving, prayer and fasting.

SYMBOLISM OF ASHES

As with all material things which are used as religious symbols, the symbolism of ashes is complex and difficult to understand. In themselves, ashes have little meaning, but they have their own biblical and historical context in the liturgical practices of today. Ashes are an ancient symbol of repentance (sackcloth and ashes). Consequently, when received in the light of God's revealing word, ashes can become a biblical symbol for us, and our desire to turn back to God. When we receive ashes on our foreheads, we remember who we are. We remember that we are creatures of the earth ("Remember that you are dust"). We remember that we are mortal beings ("and to dust you will return"). The reception of the ashes on our foreheads reminds us of the fact that we are God's chosen children on a journey of conversion, hence "Turn away from sin and be faithful to the Gospel." The ashes remind us that we are members of the body of Christ, and the blotch on our foreheads will proclaim that identity to others, too.

ASH WEDNESDAY SERVICES

Ashes will be distributed at each Mass on Ash Wednesday. The times of the Masses are 7 a.m., 9 a.m., 12 Noon and 7:30 p.m. With the exception of those who are ill, ashes will only be distributed during Ash Wednesday Masses.

ASH WEDNESDAY and GOOD FRIDAY are days of fast and abstinence. FRIDAYS during Lent are days of abstinence.

ABSTINENCE prohibits those who are 14 years of age and older from eating meat on Ash Wednesday and Fridays during Lent.
