

# Helpful Details for the 2022 HOLMES, DOYLE, & FRIENDS Conference



- REGISTERING FOR HD&F:** Registration for a hotel room is *separate* from conference registration. Do not use the (800) number of Choice Hotels ([The Airport Clarion's](#) parent company), or you may not receive our special low room rate. Instead, call its *local* number, **(937) 832-1234**. Please mention HD&F when registering. You may notice room rates lower than ours advertised on the Clarion's [Web site](#). These rates are “promotional,” *i.e.*, they're generally used when demand is slack. Since the 2019 HD&F sold out, and the one for 2020 was within 2 spaces of being sold out before we canceled it because of the epidemic, it is unlikely that promotional rates will be offered for the 11<sup>TH</sup> or 12<sup>TH</sup> of March 2022. More importantly, promotional rates, unlike ours, are nonrefundable. Cancel and you lose your money!
- LOCAL WEATHER:** March weather, like Professor Coram's appetite in GOLD, is “variable.” Although there are several Internet weather forecasting services available, your best bet is the Web site of the dominant local TV station, [WHIO](#). This has the latest equipment (*e.g.*, Doppler high-definition radar) and the largest local staff of meteorologists.
- FLYING IN:** The airport shuttle is free. (But the driver gladly accepts tips.) When flying in, hotel staff request that you retrieve your traps (Victorian slang for “luggage” or “belongings”) *first*, then call (937) 832-1234 on either your wireless (cellular) telephone, or the free courtesy telephone to [The Airport Clarion Inn](#) near the baggage pickup area.
- MOTORING IN:** [The Airport Clarion Inn](#) is at Exit 29 (State Route 48) of Interstate Highway 70, the second exit west of the intersection of Interstates 70 and 75, two of the most heavily traveled highways in the nation. For those with GPS systems, the address is **10 Rockridge Road, Englewood, Ohio 45322**. (Englewood is a north-side Dayton suburb.) The Inn is readily visible from I-70 if you're going west (*e.g.*, coming from I-75). If you're driving east (*e.g.*, from Indianapolis), you can't see it quite as easily. Thus, for eastbound travelers, it's best to look for Exit #29, turn left (north) off the ramp, go under the highway, and again turn left onto Rockridge Road. The reconstruction of I-75 through downtown Dayton, long a choke point, was completed in 2016. But it's still not a good idea to drive through downtown during rush hours. Dayton is not large enough to merit a beltway.
- A HINT TO WOULD-BE MYCROFT HOLMES'S:** Sherlock Holmes' “corpulent” (fat) brother, Mycroft, you may recall, disliked walking and all other forms of exercise. In this document, a SHORT walk is one-half mile or less. An EASY walk is a full mile or less. If you are unable to walk these distances because of inclement weather, physical disability, or simply a Mycroftian dislike of physical exertion, we recommend sticking to the free shuttle or the Clarion's own restaurant (see below).
- FRIDAY EVENING WELCOME RECEPTION AT 6 P.M.:** will be held at [The Hampton Inn](#), a SHORT walk (see the paragraph just above) up the hill from the Clarion Inn. Walk (but the hill is steep, and you'll be at the mercy of the weather), drive, or take the free shuttle. You can make a light supper of the *hors d'œuvres* (as usual, some will be meatless or vegetarian), wine, and soft drinks. The Welcome Reception is included in your registration fee.
- SATURDAY EVENING BANQUET:** will be held at [Company 7 BBQ](#), most recently named in 2018 as “one of the 28 best BBQs in America,” and the *only* one in Ohio. The restaurant is a SHORT (see above) walk from The Clarion, but the shuttle is also available.
- RESTAURANTS:** As previously mentioned, you can make a light supper of the *hors d'œuvres* at the Friday Reception. If you arrive early (and hungry) or choose not to go to the Reception, the Clarion has its own restaurant and bar. There are several chain eateries nearby (SHORT walk): Bob Evans, Frisch's Big Boy, Perkins' Pancake House, and Skyline Chili; (EASY walk) Waffle House and a Mc-

Donald hamburger stand (walk to bottom of hill, turn right, go under the bridge for I-70—sidewalk all the way). There is a locally owned, AAA-rated, restaurant about two miles away: [The Buckhorn Tavern](#). The hotel shuttle can take you there and back (recall that the driver gladly accepts tips), but reservations are recommended on weekends. There are numerous restaurants (Cracker Barrel, Olive Garden, Outback Steak House, and many more, some locally owned) on Miller’s Lane, just south of the I-70/I-75 intersection, about 10 minutes by car from the Clarion. The strip is known to natives as “Restaurant Row.” Take I-70 east to I-75, take I-75 south to the BENCHWOOD ROAD/WYSE ROAD exit, turn right off the ramp, and finally turn right again. The Clarion Inn has complimentary breakfast for those lodging there, and Saturday’s luncheon is *included* in your Conference Registration Fee.

**HOUSES OF WORSHIP:** Concord United Methodist Church is ½ block away. There are several other churches (and one synagogue) of various denominations within a ten minutes’ drive (or less) for those with automobiles.

**REWARD POINTS:** If you are a member of Choice Hotels’ Rewards Plan (recall that Choice is the parent company of The Clarion Inn), you may use your accumulated points. Please inform the clerk at the Front Desk upon registering.

**WI-FI:** The Clarion Inn has free wireless Internet. The password is: *guest* (all lower case). Like most public wireless networks, this one is unprotected, and we urge you to have reputable security software installed on your PC, tablet, smart telephone, or other digital device. The more technically inclined may wish to use a virtual private network.

**TOURISM:** If you are coming with a spouse or friend who (heaven forbid!) will not attend the Conference, there are many sights to see here. The most famous area attraction—tied with the Rock ’n Roll Hall of Fame in Cleveland as Ohio’s largest single tourist draw—is the National [Air Force Museum](#) in suburban Riverside, open every day but Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Year’s. Admission and parking are free. It is about 30 minutes from the Clarion by car, but—alas!—the Museum is inaccessible on weekends via omnibus because of cuts in service. (However, both Lyft and Über are available in Dayton.) One can easily spend an entire day at the Museum, which has a cafeteria (no alcohol is served). Free guided tours are available. Dayton’s rich history includes aviation (Dayton was home to the Wright Brothers) and technology (everything from cash registers to electronic point-of-sale terminals, flip-top cans, bar codes, RFID, and—most recently—drones). That history is recounted at [Carillon Park](#), run by [Dayton History](#). The Park is home to [The Carillon Brewing Company](#), a AAA-rated restaurant featuring a working wood-fired craft brewery and emphasizing mid-19<sup>TH</sup> century food, beer, and décor. (The gas lighting at the entrance is authentic, but interior fixtures have been retrofitted for electricity.) The tramping tracks (hiking trails) of the [Aullwood Garden Center](#), an award-winning park near the Clarion, are ideal for a country walk (weather permitting, otherwise you’ll return in a dreadful mess and risk having Mary Jane remove the mud from your boots). If your companion wishes to attend the Banquet, he or she need not register for HD&F. Merely buy an extra banquet admission.

**PUBLIC TRANSIT:** Dayton and its suburbs have a good omnibus system run by the Regional Transit Authority (RTA), but weekend schedules are attenuated, especially in the suburbs. There is a sheltered ’bus stop at the foot of the hill, a short walk from the Inn’s entrance. Route maps and ’bus schedules for the entire metropolitan area can be found [here](#). Click on the “VIEW THE RTA SYSTEM MAP AS A PDF FILE” option. The Clarion is at **H-6** on the RTA map and is served by the #16 ’bus route. Look at the [Saturday South-bound Schedule](#) in the column marked “Meijer & Route 48,” then deduct five minutes from each time. (Be sure it’s the Saturday, *not* the weekday or Sunday schedule.) Like virtually all big-city transit systems, RTA has instituted *cashless* fare payment. Click [here](#) for details. Finally, as previously mentioned, Lyft, Über, and regular taxi service are available in the Dayton region.
