AMANA NEWS AND NOTES

Fireball Lights Up Sky July 8

Amana Colony residents are among those who witnessed a fireball in the southern sky on Sunday, July 8 at about 8:40 p.m.

As of Monday morning, the American Meteor Society had classed it as a "shallow angle... earth grazing fireball," that most likely did enter the earth's atmosphere and broke apart or "fragmented." A "fireball" is the term used for a meteorite that is brighter than normal, bright enough to be seen at dusk, dawn or in daylight.

Josh Wickencamp, Marlena Hicks, John Hoppe and Marie Synofzick, all residents of High Amana, were outside on Wickencamp's deck having supper when they spotted the fireball which flashed across the southern sky lasting about 5 or 6 seconds.

As Hoppe described, "At first I thought maybe it was a firework or something, but after a second it was very clear it was not. It was streaking across the sky quickly. It had a brilliant iridescent blue tail with a tinge of white. Near the object it appeared green. I thought it was much closer than it actually was because I had no frame of reference. . . I listened carefully and was surprised it was completely silent as it shot by. . . We ran around the side of house and we observed it break apart and could see two distinct pieces shoot out, kinda shoot out from the body in a white and red explosion. We knew we had seen something special and I Googled if there was anywhere to report such an observation. " Within about ten minutes they reported the sighting to the American Meteor Society.

As of mid-morning Tuesday, over 600 reports were filed with the American Meteor Society by witnesses who saw the event and described it or submitted photos or videos to the organization. The fireball was seen by residents of Iowa, Illinois, Michigan, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Missouri and Nebraska, the website recorded. If you too saw the fireball please make an online report to www.amsmeteors.org.

KCRG television received calls from viewers across eastern Iowa and reported the fireball, which was then picked up and reported by Good Morning America.

Using the eye witness accounts and computer imaging, the trajectory was estimated, according to AMS, from about 40 miles north of Des Moines heading east and south until about Burlington. Estimates place this one's actual size as somewhat bigger than a baseball but smaller than a cantaloupe. Most meteorites are iron ore, nickel or composite ore and rock.

History buffs will recall that in 1875 on Feb. 12 a brilliant fireball lit up the sky and resulted in about 100 meteorite fragments falling over an 20-square mile area around Homestead. One of the larger fragments is on display at the Amana Heritage Museum in Amana.
