

Divine Mercy Sunday Year C

John 20:19-31



"On the evening of that first day of the week, when the doors were locked, where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood in their midst and said to them, "Peace be with you." When he had said this, he showed them his hands and his side. The disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." And when he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained." Thomas, called Didymus, one of the Twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples said to him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands and put my finger into the nailmarks and put my hand into his side, I will not believe." Now a week later his disciples were again inside and Thomas was with them. Jesus came, although the doors were locked, and stood in their midst and said, "Peace be with you." Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands, and bring your hand and put it into my side, and do not be unbelieving, but believe." Thomas answered and said to him, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus said to him, "Have you come to believe because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed." Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples that are not written in this book. But these are written that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that through this belief you may have life in his name.

Dear St Pius And St Anthony Churches,

Divine Mercy Sunday Year C John 20:19-31

Happy Easter Again! You know my favorite line! I love being Catholic because we don't limit a celebration to a single day, but we keep a whole season of days to celebrate the occasion. (Christmas isn't one day, but a whole season, and so Easter isn't only one day and done. No-it is a whole 50 day season until Pentecost!) So, we are just getting started! Some people tell me that about birthdays; don't just have ice cream that one day, but stretch it out and have ice cream every day for a week, or call the whole month your 'birth month' (We do that with birth stones- like Emerald for May, Amethyst for February etc). So, enjoy!

Therefore, if today's mass looks a lot like Easter Sunday's, it should, because it is basically a repeat (like the double visit house call Jesus makes on the apostles, first without Thomas, and then later with Thomas there too). We call it the Octave of Easter and it is the 'Eight Days' of Easter. If you attended daily mass, you also notice that each day contains all the elements of a full Sunday mass (Festive Music, Gloria, etc). Each successive day is like Easter morning all over again (Yes, I guess like Easter-Groundhog Day-it's just that Jesus has come out of the ground forever!) Just as a tomb in the ground cannot hold down the abounding new life of Jesus, so also, one day cannot contain the bursting joy, growth & new life of Christ raised from the dead! So, we have a whole season to celebrate His (& our new life) with Him!

And Jesus brings it all to us! Mercy upon Mercy! So, Happy Divine Mercy Sunday! I am always struck deeply by the very first word out of Jesus' mouth, after all of the cruel and painful suffering He endured for our sake (and from our hands). After His passion and death, when He meets with us again, the first word out of His mouth is, 'Peace!' He doesn't say, "Boy, do you have it coming!" He doesn't tear into them with righteous indignation about their faithlessness and cowardice. No, Jesus' first word is 'Peace', echoing His words on the cross "It is finished" (John 19:30). That ugly page of history, Christ's crucifixion, has been turned. It is past and over. Its fruit is now born. With Christ risen and back among His followers-He brings Healing! The First word: 'Peace'. In case we don't hear it, He repeats it a second time, "Peace". And then when Jesus mercifully shows up again to draw Thomas back into the fold, He will give it once more "Peace" 3X (John 20, verses 19, 21 & 26). When I am asked what 'Mercy' means, I can't help but to remember the great line from an old Clint Eastwood Western movie, 'Unforgiven' when his character is told about men who lost their lives in a gunfight. The kid said, "Well, I guess they had it comin..." And he responds, "We all got it comin', kid." We all sin, and Romans 6:23 tells us that the 'wages of sin is death'. So, when it comes to sin against God, We all got it Coming! But, not after Jesus' resurrection! Jesus releases us from 'what is coming' by His threefold gift of 'Peace'! That is Mercy! Or as James 2:13 tells us, "Mercy triumphs over Judgement!" In today's popular Thomas Story from John's gospel, we hear about Jesus showing up after His resurrection with an Easter basket of three gifts for the apostles. John 20:21-23 tells us that Jesus gives the apostles the gifts of 1) Peace, 2) Holy Spirit and 3) Forgiveness! If we consider the faithlessness of the apostles as sin against Christ, then Jesus appears risen to heal/forgive them, and reestablish His presence of Peace among them. And none too soon, as it seems that the apostles are further splintering and coming apart after their sin. We find Thomas out somewhere alone, violating Jesus' apostolic command to go out 2x2 (Mark 6:7). This further breakdown of human relations is typical after sin, as we saw in the first pair Adam & Eve, who sinned against God, and then destructively turned against one another self-righteously blaming each other (Genesis 3:12-13). But after the resurrection, Jesus appears to the apostles, to renew their bonds and establish peace and forgiveness among them. By breathing His Holy Spirit into them, He was commissioning them to also further that reconciling and peace-giving work among the rest of the disciples. Yet, I love too, that Luke tells us that Jesus remains with them forty more days, to further teach and enlighten them to keep 'walking His Way' (Acts 1:2). What a God of new beginnings and God of second chances we have in Christ our Shepherd! As John 1:16, tells us "From His fullness we have all received, grace in place of grace". With Jesus, it just keeps on coming!


