LIVING FOREVER...

Daniel 12:1-3; Psalm 16: 5, 8, 9-11; Heb. 10:11-14, 18; Mark 13:24-32

This Thursday, November 22^{nd} , is Thanksgiving Day! A day set aside for us to thank God for the many good things we have received from Him. We thank Him not just for the "Turkey" and the "Food." We thank Him for the gift of our being – for the gift our parents – for the gift of our relatives – for the gift of our friends – for the gift of nature and the natural habitat. When we admire nature in the plants and flowers, we witness the beauty and the benevolence of God. When we contemplate nature in the waters of the ocean we see the magnificence of God. When we contemplate nature in the rocks, the hills and the mountains, we capture the greatness and the all-envisioning God.

We thank God for all His works, and we thank Him in all His works! Ironically, as we thank Him for the green and fresh plants, we must also never fail to thank Him when the plants dry and wither. The season of fall reminds you and me of the end of our lives here on earth - our lively days will one day come to an end. As we noticed during fall the once beautiful and gigantic plants shed their leaves. The leaves and the grass that were once green suddenly turn red, orange, tan, yellow or brown. As time progresses, they fall off the trees and die. When winter finally arrives, the trees stand bare without leaves and the once green fields turned mousy-brown. Everything appears dead. The trees cannot provide shade any more. So also will our lives be, our once blooming life will surely give way, and the end is imminent!

Next Sunday is the Feast of Christ, the King - the last Sunday of this Liturgical Year. As we draw near to the end of the liturgical year, today's first reading and the gospel remind us of the inevitable reality (the apocalypse) - death will come for all of us. There will be a final judgment. Like a scary movie, contemplating this reality can be very frightening when we relate it to ourselves. It is the Apocalypse! It is the end-time! It is time to die! The natural instinct is for us to be scared because we are uncertain of the future. As Christians we should see the apocalyptic moment as a "season of fall" while we anticipate "spring time" with a renewed hope. In John 12: 24, Jesus draws our attention to this inevitable reality when he says: "Amen, amen I say to you, unless the grain of wheat falls to the earth and dies, it remains a single grain, but if it dies, it produces much fruit thereafter." Such are our lives as Christians, in order to have eternal life in abundance we must be prepared to live a life that will give us optimism for the future. We must prepare to die to self and live for others.

For a Christian, like you and me, all is not lost. Life does not end with fall and winter! There is hope! We are apocalyptic people. A new life will come at the advent of spring. The trees, the shrubs and the grass that appear dead, will once again bloom with new life. We are a people of hope. When you are depressed and feel overwhelmed, trust and have faith in God and He will free you from your bondage because He says: "At that time... people shall escape, everyone who is found written in the book." Christians who truly live the life of discipleship need not be afraid of the impending and inevitable end because their names will be inscribed in the "book of life" and they shall escape the final damnation. "Many of those who sleep in the dust of the earth shall awake;" and the faithful and the committed followers of Christ "shall live forever."



SHOWING FAITH BY GIVING THANKS...



In this Year of Faith we must recognize that the spirit of Thanksgiving is central to the life of every human being. By expressing thanks to an individual for a gift, we are clearly saying that they have enriched our lives through it and we recognize that it is a sign of the relationship that exists between them and us. It is an unfortunate reality that the simple act of appreciation is not as

essential as it once was in the minds of people.

When we were young, we were taught the virtue of writing the "bread and butter" letter to relatives and friends who remembered our birthdays or other celebrations. Sad to say Christians have adopted similar habits going back a few decades. During World War II the Church of the Holy Cross would conduct the Miraculous Medal Novena every fifteen minutes as people poured into the pews to pray for their sons and brothers to return home from the battles in the European and Pacific theatres, but once the war ended the need for the multiplicity of services rapidly decreased. Countless times we pray prayers of petition for a job, health, or family but how frequently are they matched by prayers of thanksgiving.

On Thursday, as a nation we pause, upon the instruction of Abraham Lincoln, to recall the goodness of God to us in permitting us to live in freedom and prosperity (Though it is also important to remember those suffering without shelter, food and other basic necessities.) But even that day has decreased in significance compared to Black Friday with the stores opening on the evening of Thanksgiving lest we spend too much time with family. As a Catholic people, how will we commemorate God's gifts to us? Will we attend the parish Mass? Will we say grace at meals? Will we remember those who called us together in prior years but are no longer with us? Will we serve those who are doing without?

As Catholics we must remember that each and every celebration of the Mass is an act of thanksgiving in and of itself. We cannot afford to neglect one opportunity to express our gratitude for salvation. Our giving thanks demonstrates our acknowledgement that without God nothing exists, but with God all things are possible. Within the Mass itself, after receiving the Lord, we should use that time to enter into the intimacy of our relationship with the divine and declare with hearts burning: "My Lord and My God". Thankfulness must be the heart of our faith.
