#### Fundraising Banquet – Saturday, March 23<sup>rd</sup>



## SNOW-DEE-VOO, '24 By Mike Nesbitt

On Wednesday evening, as we were driving home after conducting a New Members Orientation at the Capitol City Rifle &Pistol Club, the rain was splattering noticeably on the windshield. I commented to Tom Brown how snow seemed to be in the air. "It isn't going to snow," said Tom, in a rather directive way. Well, Tom's authority on the weather was somehow out-voted because the next morning we had about 5-inches of fresh heavy snow, no power (at home), with downed trees and limbs, not to mention more snow to come. It was very good that our annual Rain-Dee-Voo didn't start until the next day.

Of course, some of the hands that helped run this year's Rain-Dee-Voo were already 'in camp' at the site. The first to get there were the leaders of the Sotelo tribe, Derek and Kerry. They were on hand so any traders who might arrive early could get set up in the clubhouse. Bob and Julie Wright were also there early, in time to get the registrations going, and they kept at it to complete the scoring. Having dedicated helpers like them made sure that "Snow-Dee-Voo, '24" got off to a good start.

The shooting for the matches begins on Friday, generally at 1:00 in the afternoon. But for the crewmembers who conduct any of the several jobs in putting on a doin's like our Rain-Dee-Voo we have an earlier shooting time, 10:00 o'clock on Friday morning. That means we shoot the rifle trail at that time, rain or shine, blizzard or solar eclipse. When I got to the club about 9:00 that morning, I

found the road climbing to the club grounds was already plowed. Will Ulry had gotten there earlier and cleared the snow from our entry road and my best compliments to him for doing so. Tom Brown had given the road some attention as well. That made "getting there" much easier, especially for modern camp-keepers who might be pulling trailers.

The snow had stopped falling and it actually wouldn't last very long. But at that moment, enough snow was on the ground that Mike Moran had a real job ahead of him, to clear enough ground for his primitive camp. Mike elected to get busy at that task rather than

to shoot with us in the early group. So, only five of us "hit the trail" to shoot for score.

For me, this was going to be a good trial. I'd be shooting my "Trailblazer," the .50 caliber

Lancaster made from a kit by TVM, lefthanded. Shooting left-handed with this rifle was given a good try just two weeks before at the monthly muzzleloader match and it gave me no trouble. In that match, I had gotten hits on every target. Now we'd see if such luck would continue.

My rifle apparently brought me good luck because I hit 14 out of the 21 targets. And this gun gave me good ignition for every shot. I was very pleased. Bob DeLisle, of course, outshot me by getting 19 hits. Robert Fisher, shooting a percussion rifle, did even better, getting 20 hits. Such shooting is very good!

Mike Moran had done a good job of clearing the ground for his primitive camp and he was our only primitive camper this time. I checked on him after shooting the trail and he was all set up, even had hot coffee over the fire. Yes, he offered me a cup which I accepted and it was good.

The next competition, for me, was not until the next morning when the mostly same bunch of us, plus Mike Moran and Jim Haeckel, hit the archery trail with Dale Soost and some of the other Bowmen. The Capitol City Bowmen put on a very good archery trail for us every year and it is simply a lot of fun to shoot.

We also have a 'Hawk & Knife trail. But the Rainde-voo is somewhat unique in that shooters get to pick either 'Hawk & Knife or Archery as part of their aggregate score. Let me admit it, I lean toward the archery more and I don't throw the 'Hawk & Knife at Rain-de-voo.

And don't let me give you the idea that we were the only ones doing any shooting. Saturday morning brought in a lot more shooters, at least 35 and that's 4 more than last year. The shooting events were busy and that was certainly very good.

Some things in the awards were simplified by this year's booshway, Josh Brown. One example of that is the reduction in certificates, only the top scorers received certificates. In general, the only prizes awarded were for the aggregate.

While showing the winners in the various categories, we'll also list the 2<sup>nd</sup> place scorers even though no award or certificate was given. We'll begin with Best Primitive Camp, Mike Moran. (No second-place winner.)

Only 12 of the heartiest souls braved the nearly 60 degree weather and bright sunshine for the January monthly shoot of the Paul Bunyan Plainsmen. Departing from the usual format, the Plainsmen hosted the Washington State Muzzleloader's Association Silhouette Shoot, with WSMA providing medals for first, second, and third place.

Shooters gathered at the registration table and were paired up and assigned a starting point. With 12 shooters and 8 firing points, the group was divided into two relays, and the relay number and start point noted on their score cards. The course of fire would be simple – 16 shots, four at each of four different animal silhouettes, each animal at a different range. Each hit would count as one point,

and unlike our traditional practice, no extra points were awarded for period attire.

The silhouettes were place in the following manner. Chickens were placed at 35 yards, piglets at 50 yards, turkeys at 100 yards, and rams at 150 yards. For reference, these silhouettes are roughly life sized, but looking out at the small white specs down range one might think they were miniatures. All shots were taken with patched round ball and shot offhand. A verified hit on a target that didn't fall over was still counted as a hit. Spotting scopes were available, and hits were verified between relays when the targets were reset and repainted.

Other than a few of the usual mechanical issues the shoot went well, and many new and interesting excuses created for easy targets missed. When the last relay was finished, the crew helped get all the steel put away and the group retired to the clubhouse for prize out. Cody Mehr was the big winner with a score of 14, missing only one turkey and one ram. Doug Dickman and Allen Tresch would take second and third place, both scoring 11 points, with the number of hits on the rams used as the tie breaker.






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
