# <u>Trip Report: Caracas and Parque Nacional El Ávila, Venezuela</u> (20<sup>th</sup> – 25<sup>th</sup> April, 2015)



This visit to Caracas represented my first opportunity since 2009 to put our copy of Hilty's 'Birds of Venezuela' to good use whilst re-familiarizing myself with the local birdlife. Due to work commitments and security constraints in Caracas my birding activities were, however, limited to fleeting opportunities from the office balcony, plus an excellent morning with Phil Gunson and our driver Lucas at Los Venados in PN El Ávila for some 'real' (and safe) birding.

The extended dry-season in the Caracas region had left the city and lower reaches of El Ávila rather dry. Nonetheless, the trees behind the office in Las Mercedes proved to be quite birdy, and it was certainly a pleasure to share my sightings there with colleagues whilst we enjoyed an occasional *café marron*. Our dawn through mid-morning visit on Saturday to Los Venados on the flanks of El Ávila was a relaxed and productive conclusion – we encountered 43 species, representing the bulk of my week's total of 57 species. Highlights at Los Venados included best-ever, close-up views of a half dozen Painted Parakeets (the endemic subspecies that is split by Hilty as Venezuelan Parakeet) and several lovely tanagers feeding at low fruiting bushes. Of course, in order to minimize risks I had brought only binoculars and a point and shoot camera with me, so I was unable to capture photographs that do full justice to these special parakeets!
