We're currently considering a viewing of the **"Professor Cheng Man Ching's Journey West"** documentary which is hard to find now as most participants have now pass. I'm also considering teaching the 18 lower hand form taught in Malaysia and developed by Yue Shu Ting, one of Prof. Cheng's senior students. The form was added to the end of the 37 to practice some additional aspects of the original Yang style.

#### History, heritage and bubble waffles !

Cantonese for 'Happy New Year' (san nin faai lok) is a greeting used by the Chinese community both at the traditional change of the year across the world on 1st January, as well as for the Chinese Lunar New Year, known in China as the Spring Festival - as it means exactly what it says on the tin! In Mandarin - xîn nián kuài lè



The Chinese New Year Festival occurs at some point in either January or February, dependent on the second new moon after the winter solstice on 21st December, and in 2024 it began on 10th February.

Other greetings with wishes for 'Good Health', 'Career success', and the more widely known one for 'Prosperity' (gung hei faat choi) are all heard, as family and friends meet each other.

The fifteen-day period of celebration for the Lunar New Year is steeped in tradition, celebrated at the beginning and the end - and to be involved in it makes one aware of just how important to the Chinese and Hong Kong communities 'one's culture' and 'family' are at this time.

This was a privilege given to members of the Lichfield Kai Ming and 'Painting the Rainbow' Groups when I was asked if we would join the Inaugural Lunar New Year Celebration Event held on 17th February 2024, for the Chinese and Hong Kong communities living in and around Lichfield, and hosted by the Lichfield Labour Group.

In previous years to take part in such celebrations I would have had to travel to Birmingham, but with the recent increase in numbers forming a significant Hong Kong community in the Lichfield area, the idea to celebrate the Lunar New Year locally was launched. As with many new ventures relying on public participation, the management of the day 'evolved' rather than it following a rigid plan.

Throughout the afternoon, it was a complete Team effort - our ten-strong Kai Ming Team, was supported by members of the Painting the Rainbow Groups heavily disguised as Members of the Public - to draw people in to have a go in the Qigong Sets !

I am indebted to the thirty-one folk from the Lichfield Kai Ming and Painting the Rainbow Groups who gave up their Saturday afternoon, braved the February temperatures, and stepped forth into the streets of Lichfield. They were prepared to put themselves forward to interrupt the unsuspecting 'shoppers', encouraging them to pause in their headlong whirl along cobbled streets, shopping bags and pushchairs at the ready - and to perform in front of a coach load of Sunderland FC Supporters stopping for a beverage of choice on their way to a match, and who rapidly disappeared inside their hostelry when I suggested that their 'red and white' would complement our 'red and black' !!

The Kai Ming Display Team 'opened' the festivities, performing their first Display at 12 noon outside the historically impressive Lichfield Guildhall, complete with dungeon and cells ! No mean feat - stepping out onto flagstones and cobbles, and into formation, surrounded by folk in a hurry, heads down, with thoughts on things a far cry from Tai Chi .... but we did it ! Our programme was repeated later in the afternoon, with an even bigger audience and larger numbers having a go !.

Our performances were well received, and attracted a large number of people to discover the indoor activities that were not that obvious from outside. Later I was informed by the Organisers that over five hundred people had visited their stalls. In addition, we had a good deal of interest in our weekly Kai Ming and Painting the Rainbow sessions that were publicised around the walls inside the building - posters that also made reference to the websites for publicising classes further afield. The Team's efforts were very much appreciated by the Organisers - and we are on their radar for next year !



Throughout our thirty-year history the Kai Ming Association has been asked to be involved in a variety of public events ranging from a hundred-strong Qigong display in Centenary Square in Birmingham, a similar experience in Cannon Hill Park, displays at the Botanical Gardens and various Fetes and focussed Well-being events. Personally, as well as taking part in the above-mentioned events, I have given numerous Talks and Presentations promoting the benefits of Tai Chi to large and smaller Conferences, and various community groups of all sizes; provided two-day courses to schools for both staff and pupils; full day information events in Wolverhampton; regularly led Display Teams at a Canal and River Trust Heritage Gathering; as well as running the World Tai Chi Day celebrations in Beacon Park, Lichfield with 98 folk taking part.

All of these events in their many forms have made an impression on me - all of them encouraging participation by members of the public in one way or another. I have always valued the responses one gets when someone experiences taking part in a Qigong set for the first time whether in a formal setting like a Conference for Myasthenia Gravis, Multiple Sclerosis or Secondary Breast Cancer, a school hall full of pupils, a freer WI or U3A Meeting, or drop-in sessions in a park.

They have all had an impact - all demonstrating the accessibility of Tai Chi and Qigong, and the benefits that are possible even if they are embryonic, in a taster session.

The events have all made their mark and their memories have stayed with me - reinforcing why I love, and am passionate about, what we do and offer, in both Kai Ming and Painting the Rainbow.

Taking part in the Lichfield Lunar New Year celebration event was an experience right up there and will be stored away with all my other Tai Chi memories ..... but this event had something extra, something I have not experienced before.

In all the other events, large or small, the target audience has always been multicultural, but by its very nature and the venues involved, the emphasis has always been on Tai Chi Chuan and Qigong within the British culture. This event was different. This time we were performing Tai Chi and Qigong sets for an audience steeped in its heritage. They were already well versed in its benefits even if their current lifestyle didn't lend itself to the traditions of their parents, grandparents and great grandparents. It was obvious that our performance 'mattered'. It was obvious, too, that 'how' we performed was important. Our CMC Form has lineage, with its original source being followed for generations. To perform each move incorrectly, or on 'automatic pilot' without feeling, would have been an insult to our knowledgeable audience.



It was a weird feeling encouraging the Hong Kong community to take part - to have a go ! To see the expressions on their faces, male and female, as they followed our Group performing the Qigong sets, provided us with an extra 'lift' to what we were doing. To see the pride on the faces of the parents as they photographed their children taking part in something Grandma still practised at home, brought us an emotional appreciation of exactly what our Team was providing for them. The tears on the cheeks of a grandmother, as she watched her son and granddaughter perform Qigong with pure enjoyment, was noticed by a few of our own supporters - and made it all so worthwhile !

Yes - there were all the banners, paper lanterns, lucky 'Year of the Dragon' wall hangings, and plenty of stalls, cups of tea -

and bubble waffles (scrumptious bubble waffles !) ..... but they were all 'material' items. What the Kai Ming Display Team provided in performing the Cheng Man Ching 37 Form and the Short Fan Form triggered a massive interest in the watching community (as well as the passing 'shoppers' !) They saw something that they related to from childhood - it was powerful ! What the combined Kai Ming and PtR students provided in performing the various Qigong sets enabled the community to try something from within their heritage - some who were doing it for the first time ! That experience was much appreciated by them - shown in their movements, emotions and joy.

On reflection, the afternoon reinforced the importance of us 'getting it right' ! The responsibility we, as Instructors within the Kai Ming Association, have as we introduce the CMC Form to our students was never more evident. We are the custodians of a legacy - the lineage that comes with the Cheng Man Ching Form has come down the generations from the Yang Family, through Yang Cheng-Fu. We have a duty to carry that on, with integrity - to ensure our own Form is correct, rather than 'dilute' the quality of what we produce in our classes by our own lack of effort or awareness.

The trust the Hong Kong community showed they had in our interpretation of the various Qigong sets and the Forms was plain to see.

An excellent afternoon..... and one that is already planned to be repeated in 2025 !
