LOVE, THE LONGEST LASTING GIFT FROM **GOD**

The people of Nazareth were expecting a different



kind of Messiah, someone who would overthrow the Roman authorities. But Jesus wants to make sure they understand that He was not sent just for His own people. The world is a lot larger than that. So He reminded them that Elijah brought God's mercy to a poor pagan widow and Elisha called forth

God's healing power upon a foreigner. God's love cannot be confined to one town or one people. Neither could God's Son.

Corinth was something of a melting pot in the first century. A major seaport where East met West, its inhabitants were of varied social, economic and religious backgrounds. The early Christian community was actually several disparate communities, divided by religious heritage, wealth, and class, as well as by which

disciple led them. This greatly troubled Paul, who continually preached unity. Two weeks ago we heard him argue that all spiritual gifts are unified by the same Spirit. Last week we heard him use the analogy of the body to teach them that though they had different roles they all had vital



roles. Evidently he feels that these two arguments are not enough, for today we hear him start by saying, "I shall show you a still more excellent way" (1 Corinthians 12:31). He is going to attack this disunity with everything he has. Now he has realized the best way.

Love. Love is the ultimate answer. Love is the greatest and longest-lasting gift we have from God. It is the Father's love for us that brought us Jesus. Christ's love for us that won us salvation, Their love for us that gave us the Spirit. So it is that love that can conquer all

ST. BLASE BISHOP AND MARTYR FEBRUARY 3RD

We know more about the devotion to Saint Blase by Christians around the world that we know about the saint himself. His feast is observed as a holy day in the Eastern Church. The Council of Oxford, in 1222, prohibited servile labor in England on Blase's feast day. The Germans and Slavs hold him in special honor and for decades many United States Catholics have sought the annual Saint Blasé blessing for their throats.



We know that Bishop Blasé martyred in episcopal city of Sebastea, Armenia, in 316. the legendary Acts of Saint Blasé were written four hundred years later. According to them, Blase was a good bishop, working hard to encourage the spiritual and physical health of his people. Although the Edict of Toleration (311), granting freedom of worship in the Roman Empire, was

already five years old, the persecution still raged in Armenia. Blase was apparently forced to flee to the back country. There he lived as a hermit in solitude and prayer, but made friends with the wild animals. One day a group of hunters seeking wild animals for the amphitheater stumbled upon Blase's cave. They were first surprised and then frightened. The bishop was keeling in prayer surrounded by patiently waiting wolves, lions and bears.

As the hunters hauled Blase off to prison, the legend has it, a mother came with her young son who had a fish bone lodged in his throat. At Blase's command the child was able to cough up the bone.

Agricolaus, governor of Cappadocia, tried to persuade Blase to sacrifice to pagan idols. The first time Blase refused, he was beaten. The next time he was suspended from a tree and his flesh torn with iron combs or rakes. (English wool combers, who used similar iron combs, took Blase as their patron. They could easily appreciate the agony the saint underwent). Finally he was beheaded.

COMMENT: Four centuries give ample opportunity for fiction to creep in with fact. Who can be sure how accurate Blase's biographer was? But biographical details were not essential. Blase is seen as one more example of the power those have who give themselves entirely to Jesus. As Jesus told His apostles at the Last Supper, "If you remain in Me and My words remain in you, ask for whatever you want and it will be done for you" (John 15:7). With faith we can follow the lead of the church in asking for Blase's protection.

QUOTE: "Through the intercession of Saint Blase, bishop and martyr, may God deliver you from ailments of the throat and from every other evil. In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit (Blessing of Saint Blase).
