

ACT TWO: After many years of wars with others and strife among themselves, the people, now known as Israelites, have been united as one kingdom under King David. The country Israel lives in peace and prosperity during the reigns of David and his son Solomon. After Solomon's death, the country splits in two, a northern kingdom of Israel and a southern kingdom of Judah. Israel was conquered by the Assyrians in 722 BCE, its people scattered and lost to assimilation. Judah was conquered by the Babylonians in 586 BCE, and while many of the people were transported to Babylonia, the exiles were allowed to settle into their own communities.

ACT THREE: In Babylon, a beautiful Jewish woman named Esther caught the fancy of the king and became his wife. Although she was just one of many wives (and it was not widely known that she was Jewish), she quickly became his favorite. One of the king's advisors (a man so evil we shall not mention his name here) plotted to have all the Jews put to death. Esther was prevailed upon to go to her husband the king to plead for her people. Luckily, she was successful and all the Jews were saved.

As we know, Act Two is history. Acts One and Three probably are not history, at least not history as verifiable fact, but they are stories that are important to us as Jews. Act One, of course is the story of Exodus, which we celebrate "in the first month, on the 14th day of the month" (Lev. 23:5). We now know this as the month of Nissan, and we celebrate Passover in this first month to commemorate the emergence of the Jewish nation.

Sylvia Speaks of Jewish Culture

An Investigation of Origins and Variations

There is a Jewish food, or several foods. It is just not what we normally think of as food.

We are not sure when, or where, man evolved from animal. It seems that occurred in many places and over eons. There are still remote locations with tribes exhibiting aspects of societal, communal and general existence we might attribute to some pre-historic age.

Even so, there are commonalities to be found in all peoples regardless of geographic, temporal or societal advance. Each has reached some explanation of origin. No matter of life can exist in a vacuum. Fish, animals and people all tend to form supportive groups and develop leaders. Among mankind, this leader often rules under some level of claim of a relationship to initial existence. Many of these grow into what is defined as a religion. Most religions can be traced to some holy person, item or event.

There is another common item with all religions. They all have celebrations for similar events. These include folkloric and historic people and events, seasonal shifts, moon phases, harvests and other food events. Generally, these are observed by some type of offering or food consumption.

Does this seem familiar? These celebratory events are a common core in Jewish existence. The timing may have varied, the food items probably differed by location and social status. Even so, these observances represent a true "Jewish food."

Act Three is the story of Purim, which we celebrate on the 15th day of Adar, the last month of the Jewish calendar. We associate a lot of silliness with our observance, but there is a serious message. If the plot to annihilate the Jews had succeeded, there would have been no Jewish nation to celebrate the next Passover. And when the Persians conquered the Babylonians in 539 BCE, there would have been no Judean exiles to return to Jerusalem.




New Memorial Plaques


