

Presidents Letter

My Fellow Property Owners in the Gardens of Gulf Cove,

The Board has received the resignations of Directors Greg Smyth and Jack Anderson. Greg was the Association Community Association Manager (CAM) and a Director. Jack was a Director and President of the Association for many years. They both were involved with the management of the Association at the time of the financial crisis that resulted in large numbers of homes being abandoned or turned over to the banks. The effect on our community was that we had a lot of houses not being properly maintained. Through their efforts and those of the staff and the Board of Directors, we have seen dramatic changes in our community. Enforcement of the use restrictions contained in the Covenants resulted in the owners, including the banks, better maintaining the vacant homes. As a result, the appearance and quality of life has significantly improved over the years. We also need to recognize the above and beyond efforts of Jack Sheehan during his first year as our

We also need to recognize the above and beyond efforts of Jack Sheehan during his first year as our CAM. During this time he has greatly improved our financials including new office procedures as well as aggressive collection of overdue assessments and fines. He saved us money while increasing the frequency and quality of lawn care by bringing the lawn cutting in house. Upgrades were made to our cameras to enhance our security on the common grounds. The pool decks have been ground patched and coated. Upgrades to the bathhouse are in progress. Screens where added to the sliding doors at both facilities to allow the fresh air into our buildings. There are many other improvements that we can see as you walk around our Association.

The Directors are working with the CAM to identify and supply funding to complete the work needed to the point where only normal routine maintenance is needed. While the end of "catch-up" maintenance is in sight, the work needs to continue in 2017. The goal of the Board is to do this with minimal if any financial impact to the owners. The Board will create the 2017 Annual budget, with input from the owners this fall.







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Did you know that August is also...

Back to School Month. As summer draws to a close, back-to-school season is in full effect. Remember to safely share the roads with school buses, pedestrians, and bicyclists, and provide children with the necessary knowledge to stay safe at school. Whether children walk, ride their bicycle, or take the bus to school, they—and the motorists around them—should remember to take proper safety precautions.

National Black Business Month. During August, individuals, institutions, and businesses are encouraged to visit at least one black-owned business per day. The increased sales resulting from that traffic could result in more than 40,000 additional jobs during the month and as many as 450,000 new jobs if the habit is continued over the course of a year.

National Immunization Awareness Month. National Immunization Awareness Month (NIAM) provides an opportunity to highlight the value of immunization across a person's lifespan. Activities focus on encouraging all people to protect their health by being vaccinated against infectious diseases.

National Water Quality Month. The Environmental Protection Agency reports that 40 percent of the nation's waterways suffer water quality problems. Individuals and families can help prevent water pollution from their homes by not flushing unwanted or out-of-date medications down the toilet or drain, choosing nontoxic household products when possible, picking up after pets, and more.

Clown Week, Aug. 1-7. Celebrations take on a variety of forms, such as putting on shows in malls, child care centers, hospitals, and nursing homes, and clown appearances in parades, grand openings, and other places.

National Fraud Awareness Week, Aug. 7-13. Businesses and government agencies around the world lose an estimated 5 percent of their annual revenues to fraud. National Fraud Awareness Week seeks to educate everyone on the dangers of fraud and how to protect themselves from criminal activities.

Motorcycle Week, Aug. 14-20. For the motorcycle rider and lover, a week dedicated to the vehicle that millions of Americans enjoy. Ride, celebrate, and make new friends on the road.

National Aviation Week, Aug. 14-20. A celebration of flight, observed during the week of Orville Wright's birth, Aug. 18. Along with his brother Wilbur, Orville Wright built and flew the world's first successful airplane in Kitty Hawk, N.C., in 1903.


Lughnasadh, Aug. 1. A Gaelic festival marking the beginning of the harvest season.

Water—are you getting enough?

We need water to live, but if you're worried that you're not fully hydrated every day, information from the U .S. National Health Nutrition Examination Survey may ease your mind. The survey found that adult men drink an average of 14 cups of water every day—117 ounces—and women consume about 12 cups, or 93 ounces.

The Institute of Medicine advises that men get about 125 ounces of water a day, and women 91 ounces, so the study suggests that most men and women are getting adequate amounts of fluid.

The report notes that "water" doesn't mean just plain water, though—in fact, only about 30 percent of fluid intake comes from the tap or bottle. We also get water from juices, sodas, coffee/tea, and even food. But juice and soda can add extra calories to your diet, so don't depend on these too much for your daily dose of H2O.

New findings on lifespans How long will you live?

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recently reported that the average life expectancy for a Caucasian American born in 2014 is currently 78.8 years, down from 78.9 years one year before.

The life expectancy of non-Hispanic white women born in 2014 is 81.1 years, a slight decline from 81.2 years. For non-Hispanic white men, the figure is 76.5 years. The CDC notes that the drop, though mild, is unusual in nations like the United States, which tend to have higher standards of public safety and health care.

Unused space could mean big bucks

A spare bedroom in your home could mean extra cash, according to personal finance site Finder.com. Americans have approximately 33.6 million unused bedrooms. Finder.com estimates that all that space adds up to about \$174.9 billion in untapped real estate a year, or close to \$5,200 per bedroom. Think about that when looking for some additional income.

Like a good neighbor . . .

We depend on our neighbors to water our plants and walk our dogs when we're out of town—or do we? A study from the Pew Research Center found that only a little more than half of Americans—52 percent—say they trust all or most of their neighbors, and 48 percent they trust only some of their neighbors, or none at all.

The Pew Center found that among households with incomes of \$75,000 or more, 67 percent of residents trust all or most of their neighbors, but in households earning less than \$30,000, only 37 percent feel the same.

Race may also be a factor, although the connection is unclear: Sixty-two percent of white Americans say they trust their neighbors, just 31 percent of African-Americans do, and only 27 percent of Hispanics.

The Zika virus: Protect yourself with the facts

The Zika virus is spreading in the headlines and around the world, but you don't have to panic. The best defense is information. Here are some basic facts about the virus from the NBC News website:

• **Origins.** Zika comes from the continent of Africa. It was first observed in 1947, but didn't seem dangerous. That changed when it migrated across the South Pacific and ultimately arrived in Brazil, where immunity against the virus is low.

• **Effect**. The virus itself doesn't seem to cause major health problems in most people beyond a rash, headaches, and fever. But it can in some cases cause paralysis, nerve damage, encephalitis, and miscarriages, as well as birth defects and deaths in newborn children.

• **Transmission**. The Zika virus is mostly spread by mosquitoes native to tropical regions. It can also be sexually transmitted.

• **Reach**. Zika has already arrived in the United States, where approximately 700 people have been infected after traveling to foreign countries. Mosquitoes that carry the disease are common in many areas, even as far north as New York, so localized outbreaks could occur in several states.

• **Prevention.** Air conditioning and windows screens are both good defenses against the mosquitoes. In addition, officials advise that people wear long clothing and insect repellant when going outside.
