It's funny; when I first started to preach, I had a hard time finding enough material. My sermons lasted all of ten minutes. One of my seminary professors told me that my people would probably appreciate that more often than not! (Thanks a lot, right?!) But, he did tell me later that as I grew in sermon preparation and preaching, adding more substance would come naturally. I found that to be true. On the other hand, I've always worried about having too much material and maybe preaching too long, losing people in the process. Someone once said that if you have something to say, you should say it. And once you've said it, shut up and sit down! In other words, "Keep it short and sweet."

One of the nice things about having a church newsletter is that I have an avenue to "say" things that I didn't get to in one or more of my sermons. In an attempt to "keep it short and sweet," I cut out the following story a few Sundays ago. The more I thought about the story, the more I wished I would have shared it. So here it is!

Birds got into our house on several occasions in our last parsonage. Before that, two Parsonage's ago, we had bats! As you might imagine, that didn't sit too well with a particular member of the family! After much effort, the last little bat wore himself out, and I was able to net him and release him to his normal habitat. I did a little study on bats after that. Here is what I found.

Bats fly by "echo-location." They produce a high pitch sound from their mouths and measure the speed in which those sounds bounce off of objects and make their way back to their little ears. Scientists have tried to interfere with these high-pitched sounds by producing other sounds that are 2000 times louder than the sounds the bats make. By God's great design, those bats can still pick out their own echoes in the midst of all that noise and still stay on course.

There are so many loud voices vying for our attention in our culture today. Perhaps we need to train our ears so that we can hear the right sounds to stay on course. Each prayer, devotion and song directed to God echoes back to our hearts and minds. Are we listening for those echoes? If a bat knows better than to be distracted from the real echoes, can we not do the same, spiritually speaking?

Stay on course! Listen for echoes of God's constant presence. Then fly with the freedom of one who is right on track!
