September 29, 2019 Twenty-Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time Lk 17:5-10

Dear St Pius X and St Anthony Church,

I just can't get through to him! Have you ever said that about someone after continually bumping up against their hard head or hard heart? A haunting detail in today's gospel is the phrase about an unbridgeable chasm (hell) between the rich man and Abraham. In Luke 16:26, Abraham says "between us and you a great chasm is established to prevent anyone from crossing who might wish to go from our side to yours or from your side to ours." No crossing? No way? But what about mercy and forgiveness? To understand this unbridgeable chasm, we have to face/admit the human tragedy of hard heads and hard hearts. Sometimes we insulate and wrap ourselves up in so much of our own preferencesopinions-likes, that we cannot see or feel past our own skin (remember the little boy Randy in the movie 'Christmas Story' who was so bundled up in layered coats, gloves, & hat that he couldn't walk, move his arms or feel anything?) This rich man in the parable has surrounded himself so tightly in luxuries that he has no feeling for Lazarus. He doesn't even notice him, right at his doorstep. Even in his personal torment, the rich man is not softened to consider Lazarus' impoverished suffering on earth. But, mercy is available for the rich man. I suggest that even the offer of an after-death dialogue opportunity with Abraham is an opening of mercy. That verbal exchange is the rich man's chance to show his own open and 'changing heart' with a more compassionate attitude. (Blessed are the merciful, they will be shown mercy-Matt 5:7). But, no, even then, the rich man doesn't get it (I guess a snowball surviving hell is more likely than a hardhead softening!) Adding to his own tragedy, even in his hell, the rich man still doesn't see Lazarus as an equally dignified child of God. Notice how the rich man still talks degradingly down to Lazarus. The haughty rich man views Lazarus as a 'whipping boy' and demands twice (who demands in hell?) of Abraham to 'Send' Lazarus on slave duties for his selfish ends (1-for water and 2to warn his brothers --verses 24, 27) The hardened rich man needed to ask for mercy, period. Yet, he is still bullying Lazarus and arrogantly issuing commands to Abraham.

Mercy is always present to one seeking it! The beauty of mercy is that it cannot be forced. The goodness of God is freely given, and freely received. Shakespeare's character Portia in the Merchant of Venice (4.1) says of it, *'The quality of mercy is* <u>not strained</u>. It drops as the gentle rain from heaven, Upon the place beneath. It is <u>twice blest</u>: It blesses him that gives and him that receives." Mercy doubly understands goodness, both of the gift itself and in the action of giving. Mercy is freely offered out of pure love. With God, we freely receive and freely give. We must open our heart's door for God to enter us. God may knock, but we must open. God does not coerce, or push Himself on us. Have you ever seen the popular picture of Jesus coming to the door at night, with lamp in hand, knocking at the door? The one major detail in that picture, often overlooked(?) is that there is no outside door knob! There is no external handle for Jesus to pry open the door from the outside. The door knob is inside and it must be opened from within. He knocks, but we must open to invite God in. The rich man in this parable still does not understand this, even in his own hell.

Today's parable invites us to reflect upon what an awesome God created us. Psalm 139:14 proclaims of God, "I praise you, because I am wonderfully made, wonderful are your works!" Genesis 1:26-27 teaches that God made human beings, "in the image of likeness of God". That means so much more than I can outline in this short note. I simply emphasize that when we consider all that God has made (the whole of the universe or even parallel multiverses!), the unique mark of God's image in us is our freedom. God freely made us - He is just as splendorous and all-holy before we ever came along. He did not need to create us. God was doing just fine being glorified by the majesty of the suns and stars of the skies. Yet, the added piece of majesty God planted in us was our liberty to serve and glorify Him or not. To appreciate our unique glory as humans, reflect deeply on Psalm 8:4-6 "When I see your heavens, the work of your fingers, the moon and stars that you set in place-What is man that you are mindful of him, and a son of man that you care for him? You have made him little less than a god....." This Psalmist is praising God who made the immense stars to glorify Him by their robotic keeping to predetermined courses. Yet, God made humans differently, to glorify Him through *freely choosing* to serve and follow His direction. God's loving freedom is reflected in our ability to love God in return or not. God risks our rejection. That is divine love. Such awesome vulnerability! We know God created suns and galaxies! God is all-powerful. Yet, God also created us free beings and He respects our autonomy to accept His will and gifts or not. God's sovereignty stops at the door of the human heart. God is more glorified by our free acceptance of His will. His greatest glory is our willing service of Him!
