God knows that we, with our limited vision, don't even know that for which we should pray. When we entrust our requests to him, we trust Him to honor our prayers with holy judgment.





Here's some information about our Food Pantry......

To those of you who are not familiar with our Food Pantry, we welcome you to visit any 2nd or 4th Tuesday or Wednesday of the month. Come take a tour of the facility, and perhaps volunteer.

There were not any records maintained when the pantry came into existence, but from bits and pieces of information we've collected, we know it started before the fall of 2005.

At that time it was operated from a storage closet in the church fellowship hall until it was moved to the current location in June of 2012.

In the Fall of 2011, we applied for food assistance from "First Step Food Bank" in Ocala.

At that time our average number of clients was 29. We were approved and started receiving food in February. With the increase of food products, we became in need of more storage space. It was suggested that we use the building that we are currently in, which at that time was being used for storage. The Board of Trustees approved the request and after some plumbing repairs and cleaning and painting, we moved in. Mr. & Mrs. Charles Craven donated a new freezer and Ila House and family donated a slightly used refrigerator, which allowed us to store fresh fruit and vegetables and frozen meat. Mr. Bill Picking installed hand rails to our porch entrance and Tom Sheehan installed a new ceiling fan. Since then, a Mitsubishi AC/Heat Unit was installed in two of the rooms, and Paul and Sally Silvis built more storage shelves. Paul maintains and repairs anything that needs to be done. As they say, "It takes a village."

We shop the 2nd and 4th Tuesday of the month. We receive government subsidized food via TEFAP (The Emergency Food Assistance Program), which consists of pasta, rice, canned fruit and vegetables, soups, pasta sauce, cold cereal, fruit juice, dried beans, canned beans and canned pork or salmon.

We are able to purchase second harvest donations @ \$.19/lb. Some Ocala markets donate bakery products and fruit/vegetables beyond "last sale date", which are no cost to us.

We can get meat also "last sale date" and then frozen meat at the market can also be purchased for \$. 19/lb. That small fee covers the cost of transporting it in a refrigerated truck from the market to the warehouse. Occasionally, we are able to get eggs and yogurt at no cost. It is through your generous donations that we are able to purchase these products.

I should add that Christmas of 2015 we purchased canned hams from Publix for 100 clients and last Christmas, they received a \$20 gift card from Walmart.

Our current number of clients is 100/pantry day. It requires approximately 8 hrs./week and many volunteers to prepare and distribute the food bags, the 2nd and 4th Wednesday of the month. Because many of our clients are elderly, weak, and some ill and under medical treatment, we need a volunteer just to assist them to carry their food bags to their vehicles. Like I said, "It takes a village."
