AMANA NEWS AND NOTES

Powerful Exhibit at AAG Opens July 11

When his exhibition Tour de Force opens at the Amana Arts Guild, July 11 David Garman, rural Homestead, is planning on including portraits of some of his personal heroes, tall figures in his life.

The Amana Arts Guild Center does just two or three exhibitions each year, so being asked to exhibit your work there is an honor. "I feel very privileged to have this opportunity. I was thrilled when they asked," Garman said. "It's an opportunity to introduce myself or perhaps re-introduce myself and to show what I have done and can do."

The Cedar Rapids-born artist has done and can do a lot. His work has been exhibited at CSPS and the Cedar Rapids Museum of Art, as well as galleries in New York City and Montreal and is owned by private collectors nationwide. Garman's portrait of friend and mentor, Robert Kocher, Coe College's Marvin D. Cone, professor of art, emeritus hangs in Coe College's Stewart Library.

His portrait of Rudy Pitz, Charles Kraus and William Rettig for World War I was featured during last year's WWI exhibit at the Amana Heritage Museum and the Amana Arts Guild. It was a huge canvas and had a show-stopping kind of power. "I loved doing that piece. I felt so drawn to them and to their stories," Garman worked from a photograph taken just before they embarked.

Garman is drawn to people engaged in making powerful statements. "I did a portrait of the prophet Jeremiah. People think the Ark of the Covenant is lost but really what happened is that the prophet Jeremiah hid it before the Babylonian invasion. I think of him as one of those heroes, the unsung maybe, heroes, who do something that changes everything." What they do may seem small, but it can have consequences for others that make a huge impact.

Take Garman's Uncle Earl, a northwest Iowa farmer whose farm was one of Garman's favorite places as a youngster. "I was a city kid but we would go to Uncle Earls, and that was so magical, really," he described. "It just meant so much to me to go there."

That love of the land fostered by those summer visits led Garman and his wife to move from Cedar Rapids to rural lowa County not far south of the Colonies. "We just love it out here, the hillsides, the fields. The views from our place are just stunning. All my life I've been driving out here. Driving through the Colonies and really I feel so close to this land. That's another reason why exhibiting at the Amana Arts Guild is important I've loved Amana for so long," he explained. One of his wife's favorite pictures is a landscape titled, "Above High Amana," a view from a hill to the northeast of the village. She has it hanging in her office, but it will be in the show.

Garman and his wife planted a prairie at their place and watching that change and evolve; season after season over the years has been fascinating. "I have painted so many studies there. I just find it endlessly fascinating."

Clouds too have captured his imagination. "The cloud studies are wonderful. I just love doing them. The clouds are of the moment – they change moment by moment and I find that really exciting and very inspiring."

Garman's exhibition will continue at the AAG Center in High Amana through Sept. 2 An open house for the artist will be held Thursday, July 11 from 5-7 p.m.

HISTORIC PHOTOS

The Heritage Museum and I are interested in preserving and identifying your photos of the Colony, its places and people. I am willing to assist those of you with one or many photos. You know the ones you have been meaning to get to, identify, sort and even dispose of in some manner. My goal is to assist you in deciding which to keep or throw out. You may have no idea who, where, when or even why certain photos ended up in your possession. Maybe together we can find answers to some of these questions. Call Jon at the Museum or me (622-3908) and together let us take a good look at pictures of the past.



This is a good example of an historic photo. It was taken in Feb. 1923 by Fred Moershel from his second story looking west (now V St.) in Homestead. (see photo below) In 1923 the home on the left was the "Gefaeller" house, next to the hotel (now Zuber's). Note the two transcontinental telephone poles. Pay special attention to the dense row of tall trees connecting the two parts of town. Behind the house on the far right, one can see the cupola on the roof of the "Hotel Barn" where horses and carriages were kept. Then there is the house build about 1866 that became the home of my grandparents. It was remodeled twice before I became the last to be born there in 1933. The foreground kitchen garden later became the lot of the George Selzer house in about 1941.

Lots of details, just like photos in your collection. Let us sit down at your kitchen table and together do something you have been putting off for much too long. Next year may be too late.
