### Russell's Reflection for Advent


"You are the light of the world...let your light shine before people, so they can see the good things you do and praise your God who is in heaven. [Matthew 5: 14-15) ... You are the light of God! When people see your life they will connect it to God... We are called to let our light shine bright, to do what we were born to do. You are the only one who can live the life given to you...if you don't shine your particular light it won't be shown. But also know that it doesn't all depend on you. You are part of the Big Story. You and I each have our contribution to make and we are not alone." Flipped pq 158-159 by Doug Pagitt

In our afternoon craft/study group we have been enjoying the book Flipped by Doug Pagitt, quoted above. He focuses on the messages of Jesus that flip past (and present) understandings of faith and God. One of the main flips he talks about is that we are "in God". For a long time I have thought of God being in us, but wrapping my head around us being in God, is another level of understanding. We exist in God, God is in everything and all around us. It connects with the scripture, 'In God, we live, move and have our being' or as the Common English Bible translates, 'in God, ...we exist'. (Acts 17:28) As we enter into Advent, the time of preparing for the coming of Jesus,

understood as 'God with us', we are invited to move deeper into that understanding that God with us, is more than God in us – we are in God. Jesus comes to show us the light – the energy that is in us all and in all things, which is God. We shine our light when we live our lives faithfully, seeking love and justice. Jesus not only proclaimed that he is the light of the world, but also that we are the light of the world. The same light of God that emanates from Jesus is also in us. This is the Good News, we celebrate at Christmas and in our faith.

It is this Light that is in everyone as well, regardless of race, or religion, or sexual or gender identity. The coming of Christ, the incarnation, God coming in humanity, is a reminder of God's presence with us. It is a message of hope in a time of challenge and struggle. It is a message that we can use and be reminded of today. May this season bring you hope, as we celebrate the love that breaks into our lives, into our world, into our existence, reminding us not only that God is with us and in us, but that we are in God.

Eastside's Craft Study Group will be enjoying some special Christmas material during their December gatherings. On December 6 and 13, we will be looking at the Christmas Stories and background from John Dominic Crossan's *The First Christmas*.

From amazon.ca: In *The First Christmas*, two of today's top Jesus scholars, Marcus J. Borg and John Dominic Crossan, join forces to show how history has biased our reading of the nativity story as it appears in the gospels of Matthew and Luke. As they did for Easter in their previous book, *The Last Week*, here they explore the beginning of the life of Christ, peeling

away the sentimentalism that has built up over the last two thousand years around this most well known of all stories to reveal the truth of what the gospels actually say. Borg and Crossan help us to see this well-known narrative afresh by answering the question, "What do these stories mean?" in the context of both the first century and the twenty-first century. They successfully show that the Christmas story, read in its original context, is far richer and more challenging than people imagine.

Join us as we share in discussion, handiwork and coffee time following.

Newcomers are always welcome at this fun group.


# Music the focus of December Women's Breakfast



Thank you for supporting this project in keeping with the true meaning of Christmas!








#### Worship at Wascana Rehabilitation Centre



# Welcome to Bread of Life's new pastor, Stewart Miller

Pastor Stewart Miller started with Bread of Life Lutheran Church in early October, and he is no stranger to Regina. Moving here as a boy and living here for his school years, it was during high school that he became more involved in church, youth and even Synod – deciding at that time that he could feel God calling him to become a pastor. Over the next eight years he attended the University of Winnipeg and University of Saskatchewan (BA in English Lit.), worked as a synod youth worker (one year), and then completed a Masters Of Divinity at the Seminary in Saskatoon (1987).

Pastoral calls have taken Pastor Stewart to Concordia in Churchbridge, Saskatchewan (3 years), Trinity in Estevan (9 years), Hope in Calgary (12 years) and then back to Trinity in Estevan (for the last six years). In his own words: "During these years, I have also often served on a wide variety of Synod & National committees for the church, a bunch of community organizations, ran for city council in Estevan, became a member of the Order of St. Lazarus (ask me about this another time), sang in a bunch of different choirs, learned guitar (a bit) and pretended to be vaguely athletic in a few different ways (mostly curling and golf). To top it all off, I have twice walked across Spain completing the



Camino de Santiago (by far one of THE most profound experiences of my life – be careful about asking me about this!?!). Other hobbies include wood working (including twice building my dream garage/shop only to move soon after it was completed), fly fishing, writing, Scotch tasting, and, of course, traveling."

As a pastor, he has always felt that a church is – in its best form – a community or family, being part of which we are alternately held in great grace and love, while at the same time goaded and challenged to be more than we might otherwise selfishly allow ourselves to be. It is community we come to be fed and healed, but it is also the launching pad from which we move out into the world to be Christ to all those who also seek love and compassion.

We are excited to have Pastor Stewart join our family at the Living Spirit Centre!




# Registration for Winter 2018 Holy Yoga
