

Using Marti Michell templates, we will learn how to accurately piece the geometric shapes from both the 60 degree and 90 degree family in the same design. Whether you make a runner or choose to continue on to a bigger quilt, the class will cover the skills needed for either option. Choose your favorite fabric theme and scale and join us for this class. It will look great on your accomplished quilter resume!

2023 Lighthouse Legacies Quilt Show Rules :

October 7-8, 2023

- 1. Anyone may enter quilts in the show. The show is limited to the first 250 entries. Entries must be **postmarked by Monday, September 11, 2023.**
- 2. The entry fee for the first item is \$5.00. For each additional item, the entry fee is \$3.00.
- 3. You may enter only one (1) item per class.
- 4. Quilts must have three layers (top, batting and backing).
- 5. The CLASS for an entered item is determined by the predominant method of construction. To help with CLASS determination, the following is the definition for an entry into the MODERN QUILT CATEGORY:

Quilts in this category may have a strong visual impact, non-traditional designs and quilting styles, high contrast, creative graphic elements and/or expansive negative space.

- 6. "Other Techniques" include whole cloth, yo-yo, crazy quilts, painted or stenciled quilts and other forms of embellishment
- 7. Entries must be entirely made by the entrant unless entered in a "Quilted by Other" or Quilts Among Friends" class.
 - a. Quilted by Other means someone else guilted your entry.
 - b. Quilts Among Friends means two (2) or more people worked on the entry at any stage of its construction. No money was exchanged for services.
 - c. You must list the names of all people/groups who worked on the quilt.
 - 8. No cheater cloth quilts, framed items or sweatshirts may be entered.

Entries Must:

- Be clean and odor free.
- Have been completed within the last five (5) years and never previously entered in a Lighthouse Legacies show.
- Have a four-inch rod pocket attached to quilts and wall hangings. The TOP of the rod pocket must be sewn no more than 90" from the bottom of the quilt when the finished quilt is longer than 90". Top and bottom of the rod pocket must be sewn down. A rod pocket is not required for Miniature quilts, Lighthouse Challenge quilts, Home Accessories, and Apparel/Accessories.
- Have a label sewn on the lower back (inside on wearable art) which includes entry title and entrant's name. The entrant's name must be covered for judging with fabric or masking tape (do not use blue painter's tape) and
- Be in a pillowcase or cloth bag of appropriate size and labeled with your name, address and telephone number. Two labels are required: on the outside of both sides of the open end of the pillowcase or bag.

Any entry that does not meet these rules will not be accepted or displayed. Entrant will be notified of disqualification.

Mail signed entry form and fee to TC Wiley, 352 Quail Point Drive, Mt. Pleasant, WI 53406. Shipped entries should be mailed to TC Wiley's address. Entries to be shipped for return must include a prepaid return label with the entry. Your quilt will be returned in your original sturdy box.

- Lighthouse Quilters Guild, Inc. provides a secure location. However, items are entered at your own risk.
- Entry committee/judges reserve the right to reclassify entries as needed.
- Ribbons will be awarded at the judges' discretion. If entered items do not meet judges' criteria, ribbons might not be awarded in all classes.
- Judging will be completed by certified judges: Maribeth Schmit and Allison Rainboth, both are NACQJ Certified Judges.
- Drop off quilts on Wednesday, October 4, 2023 between 12:00 and 4:00 pm at Lutheran Church of the Resurrection, 322 Ohio Street, Racine, WI.
- Entries and prizes must be picked up on Sunday, October 8, 2023 at Fountain Banquet Hall, 8505 Durand Ave, Sturtevant, WI between 5:30 and 6:00 pm.
- Photographs of you and/or your entry may be taken and used for guild promotional purposes.

2023 Lighthouse Quilters Guild Challenge "Dresden Plate"



The Dresden Plate features wedges set in a circle. According to Barbara Brackman in Encyclopedia of Pieced Quilt Patterns, the traditional Dresden Plate was popularized in the 1930s with block names related to flowers like Aster and Sunflower. However, the block can trace its roots back to Fan blocks popularized in the 1880-90s and common in crazy quilts. In the beginning, the fan blocks featured wedges creating smooth-edged quarter circles. As the trend grew, so did the variations.

Join in the fun and create a Dresden Plate quilt! Quilts in this show category may only be entered by members of the guild and will be judged and awarded ribbons as with other categories.

Quilts entered in this category must comply with the following guidelines:

- Entrant must be a member of the Lighthouse Quilt Guild in good standing (i.e., dues have been paid) for the 2023 guild year. Each member may enter only one quilt in this challenge category.
- The quilt must have been completed within the last four years (2019-2023).
- 3. Entry must include at least one complete Dresden plate consisting of at least 8 blades that adjoin to make one complete unit in the quilt. Plates need not be circular, they may be elongated (e.g., oval or "wonky"). For example, any of the blocks in the picture above would quality as a complete Dresden plate unit. A quilt made up of only partial plates or fans that does not include at least one complete Dresden plate unit would not qualify.
- 4. Must have a top, batting and back.
- Must be a quilt, wall hanging or tablerunner that lays flat no tote bags, garments, purses, stuffed pillows, or other 3-D items. A pillow sham or pillow cover could qualify if it can be removed from the pillow itself and can lie or hang flat.
- 6. A hanging sleeve is NOT required.
- 7. Edges must be finished.
- 8. May not exceed 150 inches all around. Can be square, rectangle, round, oval or whatever shape you like.
- Must have some sort of quilting holding the 3 layers together. Hand, big stitch or machine or any combination of your choosing.

Sign your name and title/name your quilt.



Guild Meeting Minutes

February 27, 2023

Meeting called to order at 7:10. Pat Henningfeld explained what happened when January meeting was canceled – church did not have us on their calendar. Seven new members introduced themselves. Sue Lerch announced that Mukwonago Crazy Quilters had their raffle quilt displayed in the back of the room. Raffle tickets for the quilt and a sewing machine are being sold.

Regina Scott Brooks said the "Then and Now" program has been shifted to the Rummage Sale program in September. Announced that the theme for this year's guild programs is "Friendship Through Cloth". She talked about how when she went to her first guild meeting, she felt that people were not friendly and wondered if she wanted to keep going. She wants to make sure our new guild members are welcomed with warmth and friendship, and that we hopefully can use this year to get to know each other better. Regina didn't take over as VP of Programs until October and she's trying to fill in the program calendar for this year. In the past, guild members did some of the programs and workshops, so that is always a possibility.

Program tonight was about small groups within the guild. Regina introduced "The Cupcakes" – Regina, Stevie Breit, Autumn Latimore and Linda Worman. They have been a group for about 15 years after two members of their group met at Walmart while one of them was looking at a quilting magazine. Her group showed 15 years of their annual "challenge quilts". Other small groups included Sue Causey's group of four people which started as guilted jacket makers and has since moved on to small scrappy art quilts. Barbara Vallone talked about her 25 years of arranging quilt camps at Camp Zion, Lutherdale, Conference Point, DeKoven and St. lakovos Retreat Center. Ginger Wanserski and her sister, Catherine Rolfson, have a group called "Twisted Sisters" where they rotate houses and do hand sewing, round robins, and other group projects. Their numbers have gone up and down for 19 years. Claudia Grace introduced herself as a STITCHER, NOT A QUILTER !!!, but she joined Lighthouse Quilters Guild with her sister, who is a guilter, so there is hope for her yet. Her stitching group has met once a month for about 15 years. Grace Kragness talked about the "Erie Street Quilters" which started out as a modern guilt group in 2015 and they get together once a month at a church to sew with their machines all day. When Grace joined the group, she did not do modern quilting but vowed to "Be brave enough to suck at something new." Jennifer Clingaman talked about her group, the Wednesday Wannabees, who make guilts for foster children.

The business meeting began at 9:05. Hospitality update: It was decided that instead of members bringing treats every month as was done pre-pandemic, we would now bring a predetermined food item as announced in newsletter for the Food Pantry, which Autumn Latimore will deliver every month. Grace Kragness introduced the budget that was published in January and February newsletter. Mary Wolter made motion to approve budget, Barb Vallone seconded, motion passed. 48 people attended the meeting plus 16 through Zoom.

Meeting adjourned at 9:30.
