Nestled in museums and archives across the world are thousands of 'squeezes' or paper impressions taken from the walls of temples and tombs in Egypt during the eighteenth, nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. Many are largely ignored or dismissed as a recording technique of a by-gone age.

However, squeezes are a valuable resource for studying ancient Egyptian monuments as they preserve scenes, at a 1:1 scale, which are now often destroyed, missing, or damaged.

This illustrated talk will explain what a squeeze is and will demonstrate why they must be preserved and actively used in the study of Egyptology.

The SSAE was formed in 1992 and is aimed at people in the Derbyshire, Nottinghamshire and South Yorkshire areas with an interest in Ancient Egyptian history and art.
