

# <u>The Dismissal</u> - God is giving me a unique mission?...and sending me out every Sunday?!

Where does the English word "Mass" come from throughout the history of our Catholic Faith? Many other Christians might say the Sunday service or Sunday worship or something other phrase, but why do we use the word Mass for what we believe God asks all of us to participate in every Sunday of the year? The Latin phrase that Catholics used towards the end of the entire ceremony for hundreds of years was as follows: Ite Missa Est. This phrase is literally translated, "Go forth, it is the dismissal." However, the word Missa in Latin was not simply thought of as simply meaning dismissal. Indeed, as early as the 7th century, Catholic theologians were discussing how the Latin word Missa is also in relation to the missio or the mission that all of us are given by God as we are sent out from the Catholic worship ceremony on Sundays.

As we reflected on during this bulletin article series, week after week, throughout this entire past year, the Catholic Mass is an overwhelmingly holy encounter with Christ. We come to encounter and experience the love of God, the love of Jesus Christ, through the prayers, the Scriptures, the songs, the movements and gestures, the symbols, the Sacrifice becoming present, and the Eucharist, which is Jesus fully present to us in Holy Communion. This experience and encounter with the person of Jesus Christ, alive and speaking to us today at the Catholic Mass (desiring so deeply to dwell with us in our bodies and souls), is meant to console and encourage us as we receive him passively. However, we are also clearly meant to be sent out on some unique and special mission in response to this eternally new Divine Love within us.

Therefore, when the Catholic priest or the Catholic Deacon says one of the four options for a dismissal prayer to end the entire Sunday celebration of the Mass, we should be thinking about God's special mission for us and how we can more fully live it out in our lives. Here are the four options for the dismissal prayer from the Catholic Church in the current Roman Missal:

- "Go in peace"
- "Go forth, the Mass is ended"
- "Go in peace, glorifying the Lord by your life"
- "Go and announce the Gospel of the Lord"

We can see very clearly from the current options available to us, and given to us from the Catholic Church, we are called to yes, receive Jesus during Mass, but also respond and answer the call to be sent out after Mass has ended! May we do our best to be instruments of God's grace to others through the witness of our lives, our words, thoughts, and actions.

Typically, when we think of a king, we think of a wealthy man who lives in a castle. He has a lot of people who work for him. A king rules over a nation and its people.

In Jesus' time, kings existed. They ruled over nations. They were responsible for the safety of their people and for securing property for their kingdom. People desired a strong and powerful king to protect them.

Jesus had a Jewish understanding of being king. The role of king was to read the law of God and obey it. The king was also to provide the example of what it meant to follow God's commandments. In this sense, Jesus was a king. He taught about the kingdom of God. It is a kingdom of love, peace, and justice. Everyone is invited to enter the kingdom of God. The kingdom belongs to those who believe in Jesus, follow Jesus, and live as Jesus taught. We help build up the kingdom of God when we are caring, forgiving, kind generous, honest and faithful to God in prayer.




#### **Book of the Month**

#### **November and December 2024**




