PRIMATE'S CHRISTMAS MESSAGE

"Put off your old self, which is being corrupted by its deceitful desires; be renewed in the spirit of your mind; put on the new man which was created according to God, in true righteousness and holiness" **Ephesians 4:22-24**

At the threshold of the New Year and the Feast of the Nativity, we are invited by the All-Benevolent God to reject and relinquish our old being, *"corrupted by its deceitful desires."*

From the first glance, it seems to be easy to relinquish the old, dilapidated, demoralized, and unholy things that make us vulnerable at every step of the way. However, one who wanders on the wide path of wickedness shall find it extremely difficult to abandon and emancipate himself from the snares of darkness and walk through the narrow path of righteousness without repentance. The latter comes with remorse, confession, and retribution, coupled with prayer and good deeds.

Facing the old self requires spiritual maturity, courage, and honesty as we become the target of our own criticism. It is extremely difficult to forego one's ego, overcome shame, and save face, for rejecting the past means to obliterate the pseudo-image that we have created for ourselves and presented to others. Christ, however, states "*No one puts new wine into old wineskins, or else the wineskins break, the wine is spilled, and the wineskins are ruined. But they put new wine into new wineskins, and both are preserved*" (*Matthew 9:17*).

A year ago, as a nation, we experienced a devastating loss. Our tears have not yet dried nor have our wounds been healed. Armenia and Artsakh are still hurting. Have we been courageous enough to reflect on our flaws, analyze our shortcomings, shed light on the corrupt, inhumane and negative aspects, which had infiltrated into our lives, causing collateral spiritual and moral damage? Have we been able to wake up from the lethal sleep that had veiled our eyes from reality? Do we comprehend the heftiness of defeat or do we continue to live intoxicated by our triumphant past?

Undoubtedly, we need to repent and pray fervently as a nation, in order that we may get rid of the "*old self*" and give birth to the "*new person*" in Christ. Otherwise, we shall not be able to fully embrace the greatest miracle of all, namely the Birth of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

Often times, by observing current events, people make the statement that the world has changed. However, the truth of the matter is that the world is unchanged. It is humanity that has changed. Man has distanced himself from God and stripped himself from the virtues of the Spirit. Therefore, it is imperative that we quest the path of justice and true holiness and return to the bosom of the All-Merciful and All-Loving God. When St. Paul, the Apostle speaks about the "new man" in his Epistle to the Ephesians, he specifically emphasizes the need "to be like God in true righteousness and holiness."

FEAST OF THEOPHANY/ARMENIAN CHRISTMAS TO BE CELEBRATED

In the Armenian Church, "Armenian Christmas," as it is popularly called is officially celebrated on January 6th and it is a Major Feast Day. Historically, all Christian churches celebrated Christ's birth on January 6th until the fourth century.

Because January 6th falls on a weekday this year, in Yettem we will be celebrating on Sunday, January 9th. Armenian Christmas is a culmination of celebrations of events related to Christ's Incarnation. Theophany or Epiphany (or Astvadz-a-haytnootyoon in Armenian) means "revelation of God," which is the central theme of the Christmas Season in the Armenian Church.

<u>Hokehankist (Requiem Service)</u> – Hokehankist will not be conducted during these days because January 9th (The Birth and Revelation of Jesus Christ) is one of the five major celebrations of the Armenian Apostolic Church.

<u>Yughakin</u> – During the Christmas season, it is customary in the Armenian Church for parishioners to make a special offering called Yughakin. Originally, this was to purchase oil to keep the lamps of the church burning brightly. This is now used for the general expenses of the church, again to enable it to continue to provide the light of Jesus Christ.

PARISH COUNCIL CORNER

There are many features and items within our beloved St. Mary Armenian Church which we often take for granted. How often have you been greeted coming into church with the sound of a clanging bell? Have you been moved by the tolling of a bell nine times as the Deacon carries the chalice around the altar before presenting it to the celebrant during Holy Badarak? Have you been brought to even more tears as the casket of a loved one is carried out from the sanctuary following a funeral service while a bell is steadily rung as mourners solemnly exit? Our Yettem bell has an amazing history.

During the late 1800s, the Troy-Watervliet area in New York's Capital District was considered the bell capital of the world. Its four bell manufacturers sold a combined total of more than 100,000 bells to every continent except Antarctica. The foundry operated by Andrew Meneely was both the most successful and the longest-running bell foundry in the Capital District. Andrew had three sons, who at one time or another were involved in the family business. A third son, Clinton formed his own business after returning home from the Civil War and not being allowed back into the family business by his brothers.

The Clinton H. Meneely Foundry proved to be highly successful in its own right manufacturing twenty-five thousand bells including the replacement Liberty Bell in Philadelphia and the Women's Liberty Bell on behalf of the suffragist movement. Both the Clinton Meneely Bell Company and the Meneely Bell Company lasted well into the 1900s. During and after World War II, a combination of metal shortages and the increasing popularity of electronic chimes finally led to the closure of both factories in 1952.

What does all of this have to do with our Yettem Church? The story continues.

The bell in our church belfry was originally in the clock tower of the old Bank of Visalia at the corner of East Main and Church Streets circa 1874. That bell was donated to our St. Mary Armenian Church by the City of Visalia in 1947 and installed by the

workmen of the Friant-Kern Canal in the newly built brick sanctuary that replaced the original 1911 church. That is the church bell that you hear today that was cast in Troy, New York by the Clinton H. Meneely Foundry in 1885!

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Ladies Society Featured Member...



Madlien Kalfayan Hebesha

Just when you think you know someone, you find out things you never knew. This was the case with Madlien Kalfayan Hebesha. We all know Madlien as a faithful Christian who regularly attends church sitting in the middle pews on the aisle. We know her as a member of Ladies Society, serving on the executive board, making kufta, rolling yalanchi, making

choreg, baking for the bazaar, and serving on various committees. We know her as a fun-loving woman who never misses having lunch with the ladies after church. But do we really know Madlien?

Madlien (Kalfayan) Hebesha, the second of four children born to Nazaret and Arshalous Kalfayan was born on October 27, 1942, in Cairo, Egypt. The Armenian church was an important part of her family's life. Madlien remembers her mother and the other ladies hand washing the walls of the church before Easter services. At the age of 10, Madlien joined the church choir. Getting an education was also important. From the age of three until her high school graduation, she attended Kaloustian Armenian School in Cairo. Representing Kaloustian School, she was a star athlete competing in gymnastics and running track in the 400m race winning numerous medals in each event.

After high school, Madlien worked as a telephone operator. Then she took a job as a secretary that would change her life. Here she met the handsome, Nabil Hebesha. The couple fell in love and were married in 1965. Three months later, Nabil's work took them to Nigeria for two years. It was here their first born, Nivin, was born. Finishing the work assignment in Nigeria, the young family traveled extensively throughout Europe before settling back in Cairo where their second daughter Rasha was born. It wasn't long before the family was on the move again. This time to Libya where they lived for five years. In 1974, they immigrated to the US settling in Visalia. Why Visalia? Because Madlien's horkoor (father's sister) Anitza Akizian lived here. They found a brand-new furnished apartment in Visalia for \$250/month. (Oh, how times have changed!) Here in Visalia, their third child, Sharif was born. The couple now have five grandchildren ranging from age 25 to 7 years old and are the joys of their lives.

Madlien was a stay-at-home mom, cooking, baking, sewing, knitting, and doing needlepoint. She once put her seamstress skills to work to make a bathing suit for her daughter. Soon after the family moved to Visalia, Nivin was invited to a swim party. Not owning a swimsuit, Madlien cut up two of her own dresses and sewed two different styles of swimsuits for Nivin. Madlien's skills did not stop there. In 1985, she opened and was the sole operator of Meditarrean Deli featuring home style cooking

made from scratch. She even ground the fresh fava beans to make her famous falafel. Operating a deli by herself became too much for her and the decision was made to close it in 1990. Still wanting to work, she went to school to become a medical assistant. She then worked for Dr. Masky. Madlien is now comfortably retired and enjoying a slower pace of life.



Madlien joined St. Mary Yettem Ladies Society in 1993. She served on the

executive board as the treasurer for 8 years, advisor, and vice-chairlady. She served on the auditing committee, as co-chair of the kufta committee, and on various other committees. Madlien could also be found working at the annual food festival and at a hokejosh.



Madlien is an unselfish, dedicated member of our St. Mary Yettem community. We are thankful for her service and oh so happy she moved to Visalia!
