Principal's Message

Helping Your Child Learn Empathy By Mrs. Little

In our selfie obsessed culture, it's easy to see why kids are struggling more than ever with developing empathy. Yet according to educational psychologist, Michele Borba, a child's ability to empathize with others is a key to both social emotional health, and academic and ultimately professional success. Empathy does not come naturally to every child, but with coaching and guidance every child can grow in this area. Here are five important skills that you can help your child to develop:

<u>Name my own feelings</u>: It's difficult to empathize with others without first understanding your own feelings. For some children this comes naturally, but for others this is surprisingly difficult. Teach your child to stop, take a breath and notice how his body and mind feel. Take some time to help your child describe more complex feelings such as anxiety, anticipation, or impatience. Model and prompt until your child is able to express a wide range of feelings independently.

Notice cues to the feelings of others: Body language, facial expression, tone of voice, and actions all communicate the feelings of others. Recognizing how others around us are feeling is a complex task, and one that requires a great deal of modeling. TV and movies offer a great non- threatening medium to explore these cues. Make a game of predicting the reactions of characters based on their verbal and non-verbal cues. Gradually you can transfer this practice to real life situations with family and friends.

Take other's perspective: Literature is a great avenue to look at the world though different perspectives. Help your child to analyze how a character thinks and feels in a given situation and how that compares to the way he or she might feel in that position. Even better, some books allow you to think about one situation from the point of view of multiple characters. Once children develop the skill of recognizing different perspectives, they can be coached to apply this to a real life situation. This could be someone as close as a sibling, or someone as different as a refugee on the other side of the world.

Put empathy into action: Empathy is a verb and its twin is impact. Once your child can understand the feelings of others, the next step is to brainstorm things he or she could do that would make a positive impact. Encourage your child to think of several responses he or she could make to a given situation, and then pick the one that is most helpful and doable. Your modeling in this area is hugely important. Making explicit for your child the things you do to help others, including those you may not even know, demonstrates your values in action.

Develop an ethical identity: As your child grows in empathy, help your

child to understand that empathy in action is a key part of their character, not something they just do once in a while. One way to do that is to encourage your child to think of themselves as a person who is kinder than necessary, or..... goes out of their way to help others, or.... stands up for people who are down, etc. . Praise your child for the actions he or she undertakes that demonstrate this quality. When your child falls short, hold them accountable saying, "hmm... did that show people that you are someone who....." If the answer is, "no", help your child plan a "do over" thinking about what they could do to make amends and improve the situation for everyone.

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
