REFLECTION ON TODAY'S GOSPEL: TWO SIDES OF SAME COIN

What we don't hear or worry about as often is the fate of those who profess their belief and love of God, but whose actions evidence their lack of love for their neighbors. To separate these two great commandments, consciously or unconsciously, is indeed a tragedy and goes contrary to the Gospel. Yet it happens so very often. Jesus invites us once again to examine our conscience and be sure that we're not guilty of either of the above. If so, let's then heed the warning: "If today you listen to his voice, harden not your hearts ..." (Hebrews 3:15).

RECTORY BASEMENT

The basement houses our food pantry, among other things. Thanks again to our Holy Name men who helped to clean it out sometime ago and haul away lots of junks. There was a city approved plan as far back as 1992 to turn it into a multi purpose space, including a conference room, but it never materialized. Another suggestion came up to turn the outer garage into a chapel. Considering the cost and other logistics we left this option behind.

However, each time I go down there, I think of what needs to be done, and that we can't postpone it indefinitely. Some parishioners continue to express concern about the food pantry there and others have suggested that we really need to do something about the place.

It costs much to renovate a basement space. But I think we can work out something that could get it done and wont cost much to the parish. I've been speaking with parishioners that have renovated their basements or houses themselves; and they are willing to donate their time. Luckily, one of our parishioners, Maggie DiPaolo, does renovation works. She has volunteered to lend her expertise.

The Finance Council will meet this coming week on Tuesday and will review the overall plan. We'll keep you posted.

ALL SAINTS SOLEMNITY NOVEMBER 1ST



The earliest certain observance of a feast in honor of all the saints is an early fourth century commemoration of "all the martyrs." In the early seventh century, after successive waves of invaders plundered the catacombs, Pope Boniface IV gathered up some twenty-eight wagonloads of bones and reinterred them beneath the Pantheon, a Roman temple dedicated to all the gods. The pope rededicated the shrine as a Christian church.

According to Bede, the pope intended "that the memory of all the saints might in the future be honored in the place which had formerly been dedicated to the worship not of gods but of demons" (*On the Calculation of Time*).

But the rededication of the Pantheon, like the earlier commemoration of all the martyrs, occurred in May. Many Eastern Churches still honor all the saints in the spring, either during the Easter season or immediately after Pentecost.

How the Western Church came to celebrate this feast in November is a puzzle to historians. The Anglo-Saxon theologian Alcuin observed the feast on November 1 in 800, as did his friend Arno, bishop of Salzburg. Rome finally adopted that date in the ninth century.

COMMENT: This feast first honored martyrs. Later, when Christians were free to worship according to their conscience, the church acknowledged other paths to sanctity. In the early centuries the only criterion was popular acclaim, even when the bishop's approval became the final step on placing a commemoration on the calendar. The first papal canonization occurred in 993; the lengthy process now required to prove extraordinary sanctity took form in the last five hundred years. Today's feast honors the obscure as well as the famous - the saints each of us has known.
