#### Relaxation

In today's go-go-go world, where productivity and achievement are prioritized, it is easy to get burned out. The relentless pursuit of material success often eclipses deeper connections with ourselves and others.

In this environment, relaxation is not a luxury, but a necessity.

•Physically, relaxation acts as a reset button for the body.

•Mentally, relaxation serves as a sanctuary for the mind to unwind and rejuvenate.

•Emotionally, relaxation is a balm for the soul.

Relaxation can bring us back home. How?

Sitting on the couch and watching TV doesn't do it.

Experiment with practices that balance the logical, analytical mind, such as awareness, noticing, observing, exploring, accepting, being intuitive, creative and open-minded. Slip some being mode into your doing mode.

#### **Going Deeper**

Stillness offers a sanctuary for recharging and healing. Embracing stillness reconnects us with our innate essence. This reconnection guides us towards purpose, balance, and authenticity.

Where is the still point? And what is the dance?

I found this place inside myself after my husband Gene died unexpectedly. We were young. I was shocked, my life upended. I went back to work as quickly as possible – to a demanding, rewarding job. It was exhausting, but I knew how to do it and it made me feel somewhat normal.

Then one evening I literally fell onto the couch. "You can't keep running," said a voice in my head. It was clear to me that the only thing that would move me through that difficult time was stillness, allowing my body, mind and spirit to settle into some shape as yet unknown.

I began to sit still, in silence, on that couch for 30 minutes every day. I wasn't meditating or doing anything scripted. At first it was hard. I was fidgety. But in time I looked forward to it, and learned to relax.

Gradually I became aware of a place deep inside myself that was spacious and peaceful. I missed Gene – powerfully – but felt such gratitude for having loved him. I began to know I would be okay.

That was my introduction to the "still point" Eliot talks about. Grief took me there, but I have learned to go there regularly, and it heals me over and over again when life gets stressful. I'm not sure what the "dance" is, but it feels sacred. Like accessing my soul! Silence

Bob Sardello and his wife Cheryl describe this sacred space in their book, Silence.

There is a tiny organ of perception just behind the heart that is not spoken of or acknowledged; it is there in all of us; it trembles with joy when Silence approaches....It is a realm that we are hardly aware of, yet are desperately seeking. When we stumble onto it, it fills us with unspeakable wonder and we are awakened into the realm of our true human spirit.

## How Communities Benefit When Consumers Shop Local



Shopping locally can benefit our local community economy.

Ideas about shopping are never set in stone, and the pandemic illustrated just how quickly consumer trends and opinions can change. Many individuals are now reevaluating how they spend their hard-earned money, particularly since inflation has affected just how far a dollar can be stretched. When consumers think about which stores to patronize, locally owned businesses may be the smartest option for a number of reasons; not the least of which is the way such enterprises benefit the communities they call home.

Shopping locally means that more money will stay in the community. According to recent research from Civic Economics, local eateries return nearly 79 percent of revenue to the community, compared to just over 30 percent for chain restaurants. Overall, for every \$100 spent at a local business, around \$73 re-

mains in the community, verus roughly \$43 when shopping at a nonlocally owned business. That's a substantial amount of money kept in your local area.

You tend to get a personal touch when you walk into a local establishment. Local business owners typically are inclined to go the extra mile for their customers and are personally invested in the services and products they are selling. As a result, shopping locally tends to be a personalized experience. Furthermore, a local business owner may be more amenable to ordering products for specific clientele. Such personalized service is typically not accessible when shopping big box stores or other shops where owners are off-site.

Lines are shorter in the small neighborhood boutique than at the bigger chains.

Waiting in long lines for checkout or to pick up merchandise ordered online can drain consumers' energy and contribute to stress. Local businesses tend to have short lines and small crowds, which can lead to a more pleasant shopping experience.

Local businesses generate more

tax revenue per sales dollar, according to Rubicon, a digital marketplace for waste and recycling businesses. Taxes paid by local small businesses go to support schools, parks, roads, and other programs that benefit the community as well.

Local businesses often support good work in the community, such as nonprofit groups. These can include schools and sports teams, among other groups. According to a variety of studies, nonprofits receive more support from small businesses than larger ones.

Local business support other local businesses by buying and selling among each other. A local, independently owned restaurant may source its ingredients from local farms, which means visitors to such eateries are supporting multiple local businesses each time they dine out.

Small businesses are a boon to the economy, particularly local economies. These enterprises help their communities in a multitude of ways.

Next time you are deciding where to shop or eat out, try thinking about the local businesses first.

# The Fishin' Hole



2023 has already been one of the best years I have ever had fishing for Smallmouth Bass, and the usual best time for Smallmouth Bass fishing still lies ahead this fall. 2023 has also been a year in which I have learned an incredible amount from personal experience on the water.

School is back in session in all our local classrooms. Even though I stand firmly against the idea of any school before Labor Day or after Memorial Day on general principle. Regardless, let's go to class and I will share with you what I learned this summer.

First, and most emphatically this summer, I have learned that the color of your bait matters dramatically to Smallmouth Bass. I have fished all of my life and never really thought about the color of my bait, especially when throwing plastics. This year I learned. It started one Saturday morning about six weeks ago. I unexpectedly happened upon a hot Smallmouth bite in the creek where I was fishing with live bait. The bite was so good I thought I would try some plastics. In my vest pocket, I found three Watermelon Shade Curly-Tail Fat Grubs. Those three baits only lasted about an hour, the bass destroyed them, literally shredded them off the hook. During the week after that, I made a point to pick up some of that exact kind of bait. There was only one package available so I also bought the exact same grub only in a different color called "Cotton Candy Purple". Over the next two times

on the water, on different waterways the "Watermelon" shade continued to produce dramatic Smallmouth Bass action. In fact, the action was so strong that after two trips out I was down to only a couple "Watermelon" grubs left. Not wanting to run out, I switched to "Cotton Candy". Nothing, and I mean nothing. It was as if the fish had disappeared. I could not believe it mattered that much so I switched back, and back came the fish. I still have difficulty believing it to be honest and so I still occasionally throw on a "Cotton Candy" but the results are always the same. So I have put that in the vault, not that green is better always, but, that color matters. What that color is, I think you have to figure out on your own depending upon where you are fishing. I am sure "Cotton Candy" is the right color somewhere, just not anywhere I was so far this summer.

I also learned that sometimes a size four hook, for the last forty years the largest hook I have ever used, is not a big enough hook. Before two months ago I would have told you the only time you ever need a size two hook is to fish with live Bluegill for giant Catfish. This summer though, I was missing, or plain losing so many fish on the river with size four, that I got frustrated and tried the twos. The misses stopped immediately. Now, the size two can be difficult in smaller creeks and streams with a tendency to snag, but they will forever have a

place in my vest, that they never had before.

The best thing I learned this summer was that Smallmouth Bass can and will go at it all summer long. Prior to that Saturday morning when I ran into the smallies on my local creek accidentally, I would have considered July and most of August to be time when Smallmouth Bass are kind of biding their way through the heat of summer. Occasionally eating yes, but, really just waiting for the water to cool down so they can get into an eating frenzy. I would usually not target Smallmouth until the start of football season. That is no longer true.
