## CITY BRIEFS

**In Loving Remembrance**  
Of Mrs. Marie Steiner Gramann, who died in Victoria, Texas, January 4, 1911.  
Mrs. Anna Marie Steiner Gramann was born in Schwammelwitz, Schlesieu, Germany, April 16, 1836, and emigrated to this country with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Carl Steiner, in 1851. They sailed from Bremen September 29 on the Brig Neptune and landed at Indianola, Texas, December 11, the voyage across the broad Atlantic, now made in less than a week, occupying six weeks. They settled in Victoria two weeks later, on December 25. The Steiners descended from some of the best stock of the great Teutonic Race and their ancestors were among the most cultured, learned and influential people of their native land, including several distinguished soldiers and scholars. The family had the advantage of an excellent education and refined surroundings, and Mrs. Gramann, who was a woman of rare talents besides, soon became a great favorite among her new associates. She sang the first mass in old St. Mary's Catholic Church, of which she was a devout member, and her voice is said to have been grand and inspiring, her uncle, Carl Kobitz, cultured and talented like the rest of her kinpeople, being the church's first organist. A few years after coming here Mrs. Gramann was married to Henry Gramann, a gentleman of splendid attainments, also a native of Germany, who had preceded her to this country, and was then one of the most prominent young farmers of Victoria County, residing at Spring Creek. After the marriage of their daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Steiner removed to the Coletto Creek and founded a colony, these hardy pioneers leading in the agricultural development of that fertile section of Victoria County. Mrs. Gramann lost her parents, husband and daughter during the yellow fever epidemic in 1867, when she removed from Spring Creek to Victoria with the surviving members of her family. She endured every hardship administering to the wants of stricken relatives and friends during the dreadful epidemic and her death recalls many heroic deeds she performed. God never created a nobler woman, no person ever led a purer life. Victoria never had a better citizen and no death ever caused more sincere sorrow. Mrs. Gramann lived to see five of her children, all that survive, reach maturity, and was comforted in her old age by the knowledge of their goodness and worthiness. The names of the children are: Mrs. J. C. Beasley, wife of an eminent lawyer of Beeville, and Mrs. August Klein, Misses Minnie and Ida Gramann and H. C. Gramann, all prominent citizens of this city, Miss Ida being a musician of more than local reputation. Mrs. Gramann also leaves a sister, Mrs. Frederick Schob, an estimable citizen of Raisin, this county.

## Oil Land Suit Decided.

(Bay City cor. to Houston Post)  
The trial of the case involving the title to all the land upon which it situated the Markham oil field was concluded in the district court at Bay City Friday afternoon with a verdict in favor of all of the defendants. The trial consumed about two weeks, occupying the attention of prominent lawyers from several different sections of the state. On account of its importance, the case was stubbornly fought on both sides. The land involved is known as the Parker league, containing 423 acres. It was patented by the Mexican Government in 1831 to Henry Parker, whose great-grandchildren were the claimants in this suit. The Hardy Oil Company was the principal defendant, and involved with it were many other prominent oil companies of the state. The case was tried before Charles Carsner of Victoria, who was selected as special judge by the attorneys interested in the case. He occupied the bench in place of Judge Wells Thompson, who disqualified himself. The title of the land in question was claimed by the heirs of Henry Parker, known as the Burnheim heirs, who live in California. The oil companies were claiming title from Colonel W. E. Parker, a son of Henry Parker, who occupied the land in the early days as a ranch. They also claimed the land under the statutes of limitation. It was announced by counsel for the plaintiffs that they intended to appeal the case to the higher court for final determination.
