Greetings from Pastor Matthew

Time, Talent and Treasure



This fall, as we begin our 2019 pledge campaign, I am asking for more than your monetary pledge to support Calvary Lutheran Church. Besides prayerfully considering how much money (“treasure”) you hope to give as an offering to God and to the mission of this congregation, I want you to evaluate your “time and talent” as well - your time at worship, in Bible study classes, in caring for others as we do with Family Promise and providing food to the food bank, your public support advocating for the poor, the low-wage workers who take three jobs and still can’t pay the rent, upholding immigrant communities, and caring for the environment. Calvary Lutheran Church does all these things. There are so many ways we can grow in faith and love and serve others here at Calvary, to be “ALL IN”, a phrase recently used by Bishop Dave Brauer-Rieke.

You may remember the vitality surveys we took last year, along with all the churches in our Synod. We filled out the forms, mailed away our results, and the analysis of those surveys came back showing Calvary to be “currently viable, but not sustainable or vital.” Viable is good, but I think we can achieve sustainable. But we must ask ourselves, are we *vital*? Do we matter? Do we people at Calvary actively work to uplift each other and encourage each other in our faith in God and love for one another? Do we make a difference in our surrounding community? Well, yes and no, I would say. In this coming year, I ask you to go “ALL IN”, however that looks in your life. Your council and I will also pledge to give Calvary and its ministry our all.

Across the Oregon Synod, the vitality surveys showed:

About 15-30% of churches are in crisis.

65% are maintaining.

About 20% of congregations were identified as vital and sustainable (but we don’t like them very much – just kidding!)

With a designation of viable but not sustainable or vital, Calvary falls somewhere in that 65% group.

These statistics can be sobering. Within a few years, church as we know it could be gone. I’m not trying to be dramatic. Churches who are willing to go “ALL-IN,” as our Bishop said, and are ready to undergo real transformation have hope of being viable, sustainable and vital. I want to emphasize the word *vital*.

We can ask these questions:

Would we be missed if we were gone?

Do we manage to say “yes” to opportunities and new ideas more than “no?”

Are we willing to take on new things? I believe that Calvary is open to the challenge.

We will need motivated leaders and devoted volunteers.

We have work to do. We have finished Phase I, taking an assessment of where we are. Let’s move forward to Phase II.

Phase II: We will deepen our relationship with God and others, and our capacity for facing difficult issues with respect and care for one another. We will practice having intentional conversations not only with members of our own congregation but with other churches and other people in the community.

What is a vital congregation?

- Fulfilling mission
 - Great Commandment, Great Commission
 - Connecting with God, each other and the world
- Sustaining mission over time
 - Critical mass of people, energy and financial resources
- We need to change the conversation about what it means to be a vital church.

Stewardship @ Calvary

As Pr. Matthew wrote in the letter you received, “Jesus said, I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly.” Our lives are rich in God’s grace, and for this we give God thanks and praise.

Taken from the ELCA booklet called “Steward’s of God’s Love”:

God has skillfully created us and blessed us with more than we could ever imagine. We are fearfully and wonderfully made! God knows us deeply and has created each of us uniquely. God has entrusted us with an abundance of tangible and intangible resources — time, talents, treasure and so much more. While our gifts may seem meager, put in the hands of God, these gifts can become so much more. In Mark 6:30-44, Jesus takes a little boy’s lunch and blesses it to feed thousands. Even in the midst of scarcity, God provides in abundance. God gives in abundance that we might share in abundance. The apostle Paul writes, “And God is able to provide you with every blessing in abundance, so that by always having enough of everything, you may share abundantly in every good work” (2 Corinthians 9:8). When we realize that all we have belongs to God and not to us, we can’t help but give it away in thanksgiving for God’s generosity to us. We give joyfully, graciously and sacrificially because we know that our resources are not ours to keep but are God’s to share.

Excerpts taken from A Spirituality of Fundraising, by Henri J.M. Nouwen

“How do we become people whose security base is God and God alone? How can we stand confidently with rich and poor alike on the common ground of God’s love? How can we ask for money without pleading, and call people to a new communion without coercing? How can we express not only in our way of speaking but also in our way of being with others the joy, vitality, and promise of our mission and vision? In short, how do we move from perceiving fundraising or pledging as an unpleasant but unavoidable activity to recognizing it as a life-giving, hope-filled expression of ministry?”

“Pledging or fundraising is proclaiming what we believe in such a way that we offer people an opportunity to participate with us in our vision and mission. It is precisely the opposite of begging. When we seek to raise funds we are not saying, “Please, could you help us out because lately it’s been hard.” Rather, we are declaring, “We have a vision that is amazing and exciting. We’re inviting you to invest yourself through the resources that God has given you—your energy, your prayers, and your money—in this work to which God has called us.” Our invitation is clear and confident because we trust that our vision and mission are like “trees planted by streams of water, which yield their fruit in its season, and their leaves do not wither.” (Psalm 1).

And bloom


And fill with singing birds!


Calvary Book Club


Lunch Bunch
