From the Pastor...

Advent is almost upon us.

Advent is a season observed in many Christian churches as a time of expectant waiting and preparation for the celebration of the Nativity of Jesus at Christmas. The term is a version of the Latin word meaning "coming." The latin



adventus is the translation of the Greek word parousia, commonly used to refer to the Second Coming of Christ. For Christians, the season of Advent anticipates the coming of Christ from three different perspectives. "Since the time of Bernard of Clairvaux (d.1153), Christians have spoken of the three comings of Christ: in the flesh in Bethlehem, in our hearts daily, and in glory at the end of time." The season offers the opportunity to share in the ancient longing for the coming of the Messiah, and to be alert for his Second Coming.

Advent is the beginning of the Western liturgical year and commences on the fourth Sunday before Christmas (sometimes known as Advent Sunday), the Sunday nearest to St. Andrew's Day (30 November), in the Roman Rite of the Catholic Church, the Western Rite of the Orthodox Church, and in the Anglican, Lutheran, Moravian, Presbyterian and Methodist calendars.

This year our calendar gets very interesting. Christmas Eve, December 24th, is a Sunday. We will hold the fourth Sunday of Advent worship services at 8:30 am and 11:00 am on that day and Christmas Eve services will be at our usual 4 pm, 7 pm, and 10 pm. The choir and handbells will be playing at the 7 pm worship service this year. In previous years the handbells played at 7 pm and the choir sang at 10 pm, but we are changing things this year. Our attendance at 4 pm and 7 pm has increased and indicates a desire to make these the primary services that evening.

Evening Advent worship will be led by Vicar Ali Tranvik and the Duke Lutheran community. Advent 1 is Wed, Dec 6 and the theme will be God as Potter – We are shaped by a God who loves us. Advent 2 is Wed, Dec 13 and the theme will be God as Shepherd – We are led by a God who loves us. Advent 3 is Wed, Dec 20 and the theme is God as Weaver – We are woven together by a God who loves us. And then we will celebrate Advent 4 fully on Sunday morning December 24th with the theme – God as incarnate – We are accompanied by a God who loves us.

My prayer is that you will come and join us on Wednesday evenings, Sunday mornings, and for Christmas Eve worship.

My prayer is that you will pray for the three comings of Christ, at Christmas, in your heart daily, and at the end of time.

From the Vicar...

As we begin this Advent season, one of the things that stands out to me is all the beautiful Advent and Christmas music – both sacred and secular – devoted to this time of year. One song in particular from my childhood is by The Statler Brothers, and was a favorite of my grandmother's. The lyrics of the song talk about the scandalous story of the nativity from the perspective of Nazareth's and Bethlehem's townspeople. Whispers and rumors are running wild about this unwed, young mother about to give birth who is claiming to be a virgin since the baby's father is actually the Holy Spirit. Moreover, some smelly, impoverished shepherds now claim that some angels appeared to them telling them that God's son was born in a barn! The story may be so familiar to us that we fail to hear the scandal in the tale, but indeed it is there. The chorus of the song goes:

And who do you think could believe such a thing. Could believe that the story is true? And who do you think could believe such a thing? Well, here's hopin' to Heaven you do!

This may have been one of my grandmother's favorite Christmas songs because she understood all too well the scandal of this story. My grandmother's own scandalous story involved her own hurried wedding to get her married before the baby arrived where she wore a baby blue crushed velvet wedding dress she had sown herself. The wedding took place in my grandmother's mother's farmhouse kitchen because "there was no room for them" in the church. Less than six months after the wedding, my grandmother gave birth to a boy, my uncle, who was not born as the Son of God but was claimed as a child of God through Baptism weeks later. There were no angels but lots of smelly, impoverished dairy farmers in this tale. My grandmother was no virgin mother, but through her story, we can access the scandal of God's Christmas story.

We all have stories to tell that intersect with and diverge from the Scriptural narrative – stories of failure and redemption, stories of promise and hope, stories of forgiveness and reconciliation, stories of

humor and joy. February 8-10, 2018, you will have the opportunity to learn about how to tap into the power of your own true stories. The evening of Thursday, February 8, we will gather for a workshop on the art of storytelling led by professional storyteller Rev. Rebecca Anderson (www.earshotstories.com). Friday, February 9, you will have the opportunity, if you so choose, to meet with her one-on-one to help shape a particular story. Saturday, February 10 there will be more opportunities of one-on-one meetings, culminating in a storytelling event on Saturday evening where approximately 8 people will share their stories around a particular theme. Whether you participate in the storytelling workshop or not, you are invited to come hear the stories of your sisters and brothers in Christ that evening. Registration for the storytelling workshop is free but required; there will be a limited number of seats available. Look for the signup sheet to come out in January.

We will use this storytelling workshop experience as a springboard into our Lenten journey together when we will share stories along the way. Please prayerfully consider whether you would like to be considered to share a story either the evening of February 10, 2018 or during our Lenten worship. Midweek Advent Services: Images of God

A Jewish son of a carpenter from the backwater town of Bethlehem is certainly not the image we had in mind for God. As theologian Will Willimon writes, "God surprised us not only by appearing in human form, but as a person who looked suspiciously like the annoying guy next door, an undeniably human person who hungered, thirsted, rejoiced, suffered, raged, wept, and died as all persons do." Yet this surprising image of God is not merely an image. The incarnation – that for which we wait in this Advent season – is the ultimate display of God's love, the free gift of grace that reconciles us to God and one another, the manifestation of and promise of Life. This Advent, as we prepare for God's incarnated arrival, we look for and celebrate the many other strange and surprising

ways in which Emmanuel dwells with us already. In doing so, we recognize that although God appeared in one particular place at one particular time, God's appearance there changes everything everywhere. Through the images of God that appear in this Advent's lectionary texts, we'll discover how different biblical images of God break open new possibilities experiencing God, ourselves, and one another.

Images of God shape how we see God...

"In an incarnational faith, it's okay to think about God using human analogies," writes Willimon. We see such analogies throughout Scripture, some of which may be familiar to us (like father, king, or rock), while others might be new (like gardener, clothing, laughter, or mother hen). The rich abundance of scriptural images shows us that our imagination, our language, is insufficient for grasping the divine. God is far too big, too mysterious, too unpredictable to be captured in one image.

Many biblical images of God have become all too routine in our spiritual and ecclesial repertoire. Once shocking and even offensive to biblical hearers, many images no longer sound strange. Thus, exploring these advent images of God will both "strange-ify" familiar images and reintroduce images that perhaps new, overlooked, or ignored, helping us reimagine the God of many names.

Images of God shape how we see ourselves...

Exploring images of God not only helps us better imagine who God is, but also helps us see ourselves in a new light. If we are created in God's image (Gen 1:27), and if God is imaged as a potter, for example, what does that say about us? If God is described as a shepherd, who are we? If God is a weaver, a warrior, or a woman in labor, what does that mean for you and me?

Images of God shape how we see one another...

Rev. Dr. Lauren Winner argues that the images we use for God also shape how we see each other. That is, the attributes we say belong to God are those we end up valuing in society. For example, if we picture God exclusively as an old white man, we end up giving greater esteem to old white men. Following this same logic, if we see Jesus as a homeless person, we may value homeless people in our society more. If

we worship Jesus as an arrested man on death row, we might think differently about our incarcerated population. If we imagine God as a woman giving birth, perhaps we might start seeing women and mothers through new eyes. Our spiritual imaginations matter. In changing the way we see God, these different images change the way we see the world.

So join us this Advent as we experience together the richness of God Emmanuel, the fullness of Godwith-us, as we worship the God of many names.

Schedule of Advent Worship

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Advent Clothing Drive

"For he has clothed me with garments of salvation, he has covered me with the robe of righteousness, as a bridegroom decks himself with a garland, and as a bride adorns herself



with her jewels." This is Isaiah 61:10, one of the lectionary texts for the 3rd week of Advent. It portrays God as One-Who-Clothes-Us, perhaps like a weaver, knitter, or tailor. This is one of the images we'll explore during this year's midweek Advent services.

Given Scripture images God as One-Who-Clothes-Us, and given we are created in God's image, we are therefore a people called to clothe one another. As a way to live into this image, this identity, we will be collecting clothing this Advent (Dec 3 - Dec 24). Collections boxes will be placed in the foyer. All donations will go to Urban Ministries.

New and gently-used items accepted (if used, items must be washed). Specific seasonal needs include:

- Men's clothing, especially casual pants (jeans, sweatpants, dockers, etc.), sweaters, sweatshirts, shoes, and belts
- Women's winter clothing, especially casual pants

- Children's winter clothing (pants, long-sleeved tops, sweaters, sweatshirts, particularly for sizes 3T 6X, and 7-16)
- Warm winter jackets, hats, and gloves
- NEW underwear and NEW socks (no used undergarments accepted).

We are wrapped up and woven together and generously clothed by a God who loves us. I look forward to working together to "go and do likewise" for our neighbors in need this Advent.

and effort to being good stewards of the church campus deserve much praise and credit for the approximately 450 labor hours served. This roughly equates to someone working an 8 hour day, one day per week for the entire year. Here are some of the highlights:

- Bulb planting project with Girl Scouts
- Spreading of 50 cubic yards of shredded mulch and 12 cubic yards of pine bark mulch
- Routine maintenance and pruning of shrubs, flowers and other plants including the Damascus house, Creation Garden, Journey Plaza, and Memorial Garden.
- Routine watering and maintenance of interior plants
- Planting of a Laceleaf Japanese Maple tree adjacent to the Creation Garden
- Installation of 3 replacement shrubs at Journey Plaza and 4 replacement shrubs around parking area. Also installation of 7 ornamental grass plants (drought resistant).
- **\$** Extensive pruning of 7 crape myrtle trees adjacent to Damascus house driveway.
- Significant watering during hot summer months.
- Assisted with cleaning and organizing of storage
- Planting of 160 bulbs at various locations for next spring.
