# Preheat over to 375°

Make deep 1-inch-long cut with knife parallel to cutting board inside of each chicken breast half to form a pocket. Evenly stuff pockets with goat cheese, then press edges together to seal. Dip chicken in margarine, then bread crumbs until evenly coated. On baking sheet, arrange chicken. Bake 20 minutes or until chicken is thoroughly cooked.

Meanwhile, heat sauce in 2 quart saucepan over low heat. To serve, arrange chicken on platter over hot bow ties, then top with sauce. Serve, if desired, with sauteed spinach.

# **The Secret Ingredient for Good Stewardship: Joy**

nspired by the love of God, demonstrated in his Son, the Macedonian Christians (2 Cor. 8-9) exhibited determined generosity and abundant joy despite their adverse circumstances. Participation in the offering for Jerusalem was seen as a challenge by the Macedonian congregation. As they exceeded their own expectations and the expectations of others, through the generosity of their gifts, a spirit of joy and adventure bubbled up in the community, and spread throughout the congregation, inspiring even greater giving. The generosity of one inspired another until their exuberance overflowed. Like the proverbial snowball, each generous act built on another until the joy was unstoppable. The excitement was contagious. Scientists who study happiness have confirmed the truth of Paul's observation, attributed to Jesus: "It is more blessed to give than to receive.' " (Acts 20:35b) Giving contributes to a sense of purpose and connection in a way that possessing does not. A new purchase may bring a momentary sense of pleasure, but that good feeling is brief and shallow. Meaningful giving creates a more enduring positive attitude and greater long term happiness. Have you experienced joy in giving? Have you ever experience contagious joy? Numerous studies have confirmed that it is a sense of connection and meaning that characterizes the joy-filled life. Once basic needs are met, poverty and adversity may create hardship, but they cannot prevent joy from breaking through like a light in the darkness. When Jesus stooped down to wash his disciple's feet, he called them to a life of servanthood. The slave does not live for himself only, but lives to serve. Especially if the ties that bind are not ropes and chains but love. The life of love and generous selfsacrifice that Christ taught and modeled is not a call to dour self-deprivation, but opens the way to abundance and joy. Who knew?
