

How Did We Get In this Mess?

You might wonder what I mean by this strange question. I heard it asked in a different way in our Sunday School bible study class. Are you happy with all the strife and discord we seem to have in this wonderful United States of America? We can no longer say that the U.S. is a Christian country. This was true before the pandemic, and it's even more true now. Look at 1 Cor. 3 10 ff.

According to the grace of God given to me (St. Paul), like a skilled master builder I laid a foundation and someone else is building on it. Each builder must choose with care how to build on it. For no one can lay any foundation other than the one that has been laid; that foundation is Jesus Christ. Now if anyone builds on the foundation with gold, silver, precious stones, wood, hay, straw – the work of each builder will become visible, for the Day will disclose it, because it will be revealed with fire, and the fire will test what sort of work each has done.

If what has been built on the foundation survives, the builder will receive a reward. If the work is burned up, the builder will suffer loss; the builder will be saved, but only as through fire.

St. Paul is saying that the God of Grace gives us a foundation to build on, Jesus Christ and His teachings. You may think, "This foundation was alright for St. Paul and the other disciples he had called but not for me. I'm just a member of the church, and I like to come and sing and listen to the sermons and go home. What's this foundation stuff? Look at the last words of Jesus before His Ascension: Matt.28.18ff.

And Jesus came and said to them, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age."

Jesus sends His disciples out with a foundation and authority to feed the hungry, to clothe the naked, to love their neighbors, to heal the sick and all the other things Jesus did and said. "Yes, well maybe that's okay for disciples but I'm just a member of the church." Oh, my brothers and sisters, you are today's disciples. Look it up in Webster's Dictionary. Yes, the God of Grace has given you a foundation, and Jesus says, "Go therefore with the Holy Spirit and make disciples." In addition to this, every Sunday or every worship service we attend, we hear these last words spoken by the presiding Pastor as we are dismissed or sent out from worship; "Serve the Lord" or "Share the good news" or "Remember the poor" or "Christ is with you," and these words are all preceded by the Pastor saying, "Go in peace" My brothers and sisters, we go in peace from the service to build on the foundation God has given us in Jesus Christ. In other words, we are sent from the service as His followers, His

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disciples to be His care-takers or His evangelists, to be builders, to witness to others who are hurting or wandering in darkness or caught in the awful storms of life. We are equipped by the Holy Spirit to help them. We are equipped to show them God's amazing grace that brings them peace and hope.

We are in this mess because we believed what Satan has told us, "Oh you are to never talk about religion." Did you ever ask yourself, why? Yes, we may be uncomfortable, but the hurting person that the Holy Spirit has put us in contact with is really ready to hear the word the Holy Spirit is going to give him/her through us.

So many people say, "O I can't do that" or "I just don't know what to say." Listen, you are a disciple of Jesus Christ, and you will be surprised if you set fear aside and have the faith to talk and pray with the people with whom you come into contact. Believe me, the Holy Spirit gives you all you need.

I'm reminded of the first hymn I ever learned. [Hymn 595] Yes, Jesus loves me! Yes, Jesus loves me! Yes, Jesus loves me! The Bible tells me so.

I can't even read the words without singing them. The refrain most of us know, but do we know the verses?

Jesus loves me! This I know, for the Bible tells me so, Little ones to Him belong; they are weak but He is strong. Refrain

Jesus loves me He who died, heaven's gates to open wide; He will wash away my sin, let His little child come in. Refrain

Jesus loves me! He will stay close beside me all the way; When at last I come to die, He will take me home on high. Refrain

Yes, Jesus loves us and gifts us with His Holy Spirit to help others to see His light and believe and become disciples so that they might also sing, "Jesus loves me."

There are many versions of this wonderful hymn all speaking this truth.: You are a blest, beloved, baptized, gifted disciple of God.

Library News

Good day, Everyone. I write this under sunny skies in Florida, yet when you read this, Paul and I will be wending our way home to Ohio. Such are the modern wonders of technology? I can say that it has been a restful vacation for these two snowbirds; sometimes I sit here and marvel at all the crazy errands and running around we do when home. Perhaps that is an area we should "work on" when we reach Township Road 72: more meaningful activities.

Today, I want to talk to you about an author that my sister's Catholic church has chosen several times for on-line study (this year's Lenten devotions) and for personal reading. The diocese first bought Resisting Happiness by Matthew Kelly to give to all the members. The theme centers around how we humans tend to sabotage those persons, places and things that could give us happiness and lead us to God.

However, the book which interests me today by Kelly is I Heard God Laugh. Kelly begins by reminding us that, no matter what age, we are who and what we are still capable of becoming, that we are both realized and unrealized potential. Reread that sentence. Think about it: we see endless potential in small children and young people, but at some point we stop thinking about it, including thinking about our own potential. Kelly reminds us that we are not finished until we reach eternity. One of the major ways to continue working toward our unrealized potential comes from keeping the soul in touch with God.

You see, there are four aspects of the human person: body, soul, will and intellect. Kelly maintains that our soul needs tending as much as does the body. That tending begins with daily prayer. He gives us permission to let our prayers be filled with questions: questions like "God, what do you think I should do?" and seeking the answer in God's time, not ours. If we have no "major" questions on a day, we can read a verse from the Bible and TALK with God about it: what do those lines mean to me?

Or we can talk with God about how to make the verse a part of my daily living. FYI: the daily meditation book <u>Jesus Calling</u> provides the Bible verse(s); we need only meditate and pray about the verses.

Another form of daily prayer is part of Native American philosophy. With this teaching, we do everything in a prayerful manner; as we go about our day, we observe, acknowledge, and let God in.

Finally, if we are still unsure how to talk with God, Kelly gives us his Seven Point Prayer Process:

- 1. *Gratitude.* Begin by thanking God in a personal dialogue for whatever you are most grateful for today.
- 2. **Awareness.** Talk to God about the times in the past twenty-four hours when you were and were not at your best. Discuss what you learned from them.
- 3. **Significant Moments.** Identify something you experienced today and explore what God might be trying to say to you through that person, place or thing.
- 4. **Peace.** Ask God to forgive you for any wrong you committed and to fill you with an abiding peace.
- 5. *Freedom.* Speak with God about how He is inviting you to change your life, so that you can be the best version of yourself.
- 6. *Others.* Lift up to God anyone you feel called to pray for today, asking God to bless and guide them.
 - 7. *Finish* by praying the Our Father.

Paul invited us to "Pray constantly." Let's let all that we do become prayers in our lives.

Praying Boldly – A resource from Women of the ELCA

For some of us, praying is second nature, while for some; praying out loud is a bold step. If you're not used to praying as bold action, you may feel uncertain—or maybe even silly—about trying it. Trying new things is good. And praying with boldness is what we are called to do. It will change the world, and us. Here is a list of ways you might pray boldly.

Try doing a different prayer idea every day for a week, or try one new bold idea a week for seven weeks.

- 1. **Invite a group of friends** to pray with you.
- 2. Pray for something that you think is completely impossible. Journal about it and record what happens.
- 3. Prayer-walk your neighborhood. As you walk, look around at the houses you see and the people you pass. Pray for the people in your neighborhood. Prayer-walking is a great exercise all around—you get out and active, and your spirit gets moving boldly.
- 4. Try praying aloud in a big group setting, like your women's Bible study group or in church.
- 5. Try a new prayer posture. If you usually sit when praying, try kneeling. If you usually kneel, try standing and raising your hands.
- 6. **Pray over a meal out**—at school, work, or in a restaurant. Don't worry if others watch you; they may want to join you sometime.
- 7. Share a song, a story, or a joke with God as you pray. Or draw a prayer for God and color it beautifully! Based on an idea from Jane Cline Rubicini, Kitchener, Ontario (2000)

So let us come boldly to the throne of our gracious God. There we will receive God's mercy, and we will find grace to help us when we need it. Hebrews 4:16 (New Living Bible)





Welcome to Dar es Salaam, Tanzania



Nestled along a natural harbor on the Indian Ocean, Dar es Salaam ["Abode of Peace"] is a multicultural city of some 5 million inhabitants, home to African Tanzanians, Arabic and South Asian communities, British and German expatriates, Catholics, Lutherans and Muslims. This diversity in people is reflected in the culture: the city boasts international cuisine ranging from traditional Tanzanian barbecue and Zanzibari food to Thai, Chinese and American restaurants. Its vibrant music scene has witnessed a rise in Bongo Flava, a form of hip hop. While in Tanzania, climb Mt. Kilimanjaro [Africa's highest], go on a safari in the Serengeti National Park, take a boat trip on Lake Victoria or snorkel in the blue Indian Ocean off exotic Zanzibar.

"To make people know Jesus Christ and have life in it fullness by bringing to them the Good News through words and deeds based on the Word of God ..." This is the mission statement of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Tanzania (ELCT) made up of 26 dioceses and comprised of 6.5 million members [the ELCA has 3.4 million members].

The Church focuses on propagating the "holistic" Gospel serving man through spiritual, social, economic and environmental ministries. Among these are:

The Tumaini University, Morogoro Lutheran Junior Seminary (LJS), three schools for deaf children, 23 hospitals and more than 140 health centers and dispensaries spread across Tanzania. It is engaged in HIV counseling, treatment and palliative care. ELCT has a number of water projects as well as poverty alleviation and environment protection projects.

The Berlin III Missionary Society, also known as the Evangelical Missionary Society for East Africa (EMS), was the first to send Lutheran missionaries from Germany who planted the seed that eventually formed the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Tanzania. Their first missionary station was opened at Kigamboni in Dar es Salaam in 1887.

On June 19, 1963, seven Lutheran churches merged to become the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Tanganyika. The following year, when the union with Zanzibar produced a change of the national name to Tanzania, the Church was renamed the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Tanzania.

The ELCA has twelve missionaries in Tanzania whose task is to support the work of the ELCT.







They may look familiar because Pastor Mark was formerly a member of our congregation, Pastor Cynthia, pastor at 1st Presbyterian, Findlay, and they both spoke at our church a while back. We also have supported their ministry financially as we do whenever we give an offering [they are supported by Global Missions of the ELCA]



The Dodoma Diocese of the Evangelical Lutheran Church is Tanzania (ELCT) is one of 26 dioceses of the ELCT and is located in the middle of Tanzania.

From it's website, the mission of the ELCT is "to enable people to know Jesus Christ and gain eternal life."

The Dodoma Diocese has been a "companion synod" of the NWOS for several years. The Northwestern Ohio Synod has multiple on-going missions and projects in the Dodoma Diocese.
