SASSIGNMENT: READING ON ACTING

Instructions

As you continue to work in the theatre you have come to realize that you not only "learn by doing," although this is certainly the primary method, but you also learn from observation, and reading and traditional study techniques. Therefore, when assigned each student-actor will read, write about, discuss, and be tested on the following theatrical writings. Neatness, completeness, and clarity are a must and will be graded.

WRITING INSTRUCTIONS. Write a paper in which you do the following:

FIRST, write a brief summary of the book in 2 to 4 paragraphs.

SECOND, detail the most unique or interesting comments/statements/elements on acting by the author.

THIRD, comment on elements of acting discussed by the author of which you are already aware, but are reinforced by the author (reinforcing what you already know). Write 3 paragraphs covering 3 areas of acting technique which you have already studied, but the book reinforces by dealing with in detail.

FOURTH, what new information about acting does the author detail that you "wish" to put into practice in your own acting (learned anew or discuss contradictory techniques or philosophies to those you have already learned). Write 3 paragraphs covering 3 areas of acting technique which you have NOT already studied, but the book deals with in detail.

PAPER STYLE REQUIREMENTS: Title Page: including book title, book author, your name. Body: 2 to 3 pages typed, double spaced, font size: 12 point, margins: 1" all sides, or 5 pages handwritten, double spaced, printed clearly not script. Staple. You will receive extra credit if you three-hole punch the paper for placement in your portfolio.

Please remember you will be charged for lost books!

SOTA Students: Before you leave for WINTER & SPRING RECESS you must pick up your reading assignment book from your teacher.
