NOTICE OF POLICIES AND PRACTICES TO PROTECT THE PRIVACY OF YOUR HEALTH INFORMATION

THIS NOTICE DESCRIBES HOW PSYCHOLOGICAL AND MEDICAL INFORMATION ABOUT YOU MAY BE USED AND DISCLOSED AND HOW YOU CAN GET ACCESS TO THIS INFORMATION. **PLEASE REVIEW IT CAREFULLY.**

I. Uses and disclosures for Treatment, Payment, and Health Care Operations

The Being Place may use or disclose your protected health information (PHI) for treatment, payment and health care operations purposes with your *written* authorization. To clarify these terms, here are some definitions:

- "PHI" refers to information in your health record that could identify you.
- "Treatment, Payment, and Health Care Operations"

--**Treatment** is when we provide, coordinate, or manage your health care and other services related to your health care. An example of treatment would be when we consult with another health care provider, such as your family physician or another psychologist.

--Payment is when we obtain reimbursement for your healthcare. Examples of payment are when we disclose your PHI to your health insurer to obtain reimbursement for your health care or to determine eligibility or coverage. --Healthcare operations are activities that relate to the performance and operation of our practice. Examples of health care operations are quality assessment and improvement activities, business-related matters such as audits and administrative services, and case management and care coordination.

- "Use" applies only to activities within the practice group such as sharing, employing, applying, utilizing, examining, and analyzing information that identifies you.
- "Disclosure" applies to activities outside of the practice group, such as releasing, transferring, or providing access to information about you to other parties.
- "Authorization is your written permission to disclose confidential mental health information. All authorizations to disclose must be on a specific legally required form.

II. Other uses and disclosures requiring authorization

The Being Place may use or disclose PHI for purposes outside of treatment, payment, or health care operations when your appropriate authorization is obtained. In those instances when we are asked for information for purposes outside of treatment, payment, or health care operations, we will obtain an authorization from you before releasing this information. We will also need to obtain an authorization before releasing your Psychotherapy Notes. "Psychotherapy Notes" are notes made about our conversation during a private, group, joint, or family counseling session, which we have kept separated from the rest of your medical record. These notes are given a greater degree of protection than PHI.

You may revoke all such authorizations (of PHI or Psychotherapy Notes) at any time, provided each revocation is in writing. You may not revoke an authorization to the extent that (1) We have relied on that authorization; or (2) if the authorization was obtained as a condition of obtaining insurance coverage, the law provides the insurer the right to contest the claim under the policy.

III. Uses and disclosures without authorization

The Being Place may release PHI to a third-party payor or peer review organization with the prior written consent of you or your legal representative. The Being Place may use or disclose PHI without your consent or authorization in the following circumstances:

- Child Abuse—If we reasonably believe a child, who we are treating, has been abused, we must report this belief to the appropriate authorities as required by law.
- Adult and Domestic Abuse—if we suspect that a dependent adult has been abused, we must report this suspicion to the appropriate authorities as required by law.
- Health Oversight Activities—If we receive a subpoena from the Texas Licensed Professional Counselor Board for
 protected health information regarding you, we must comply with that subpoena and disclose that information to the
 board.
- Judicial and Administrative Proceedings—If you are involved in a court proceeding and a request is made about the professional services we provided you or the records thereof, such information is privileged under state law, and we will not release information without your written consent or court order. The privileges does not apply when you are being evaluated for a third party or where the evaluation is court ordered. You will be informed in advance if this is the case.
- Serious Threat to Health or Safety—If we believe you present a clear, imminent risk to another, we may disclose information necessary to seek hospitalization or otherwise protect that individual. If we believe there is a clear and imminent risk that you will harm yourself, we may disclose information necessary to seek hospitalization for you or to alert family members o others who have the ability to protect you.
- Worker's Compensation—We may disclose protected health information regarding you as authorized by and to the extent necessary to comply with laws relating to worker's compensation or other similar programs, established by law, that provide benefits for work-related injuries or illness without regard to fault.

IV. Patient's rights and Mental Health Professional's duties

Patient's Rights:

- <u>Right to Request Restrictions</u>—You have the right to request restrictions on certain uses and disclosures of protected health information. However, we are not required to agree to a restriction you request.
- <u>Right to Receive Confidential Communications by Alternative Means and at Alternative Locations</u>—You have the right to request and receive confidential communications of PHI by alternative means and at alternative locations. (For example, you may not want a family member to know that you are seeing a therapist here. On your request, we will send your bills to another address.)
- <u>Right to Inspect and Copy</u>—You have the right to inspect or obtain a copy (or both) of PHI in our mental health and billing records used to make decisions about you for as long as the PHI is maintained in the record. We may deny your access to PHI under certain circumstances, but in some cases, you may have this decision reviewed. On your request, we will discuss with you the details of the request and denial process.
- <u>Right to Amend</u>You have the right to request an amendment of PHI for as long as the PHI is maintained in the record. We may deny your request. On your request, we will discuss with you the details of the amendment process.
- <u>Right to an accounting</u>—You generally have the right to receive an accounting of disclosures of PHI. On your request, we will discuss with you the details of the accounting process.
- <u>*Right to a paper copy*</u>You have the right to obtain a paper copy of the notice from The Being Place upon request, even if you have agreed to receive the notice electronically.

V. Complaints

VI. Effective date, restrictions, and changes to privacy policy

This notice will go into effect on May 22, 2017. Please note that we reserve the right to revise our practices with respect to Protected Health Information and to amend this notice. Should our information practices change, we will post the Revised Notice of Privacy Practices and you may request a copy of the Revised Notice of Privacy Practices from this office.
