Federal Funding Appropriated for Central Valley Flood Control Projects

Congress has appropriated 2016 funding for several local flood control projects in the Army Corp of Engineer's FY 2016 work plan, including construction-related activities to improve 24 miles of levees surrounding the Natomas basin. The Sacramento Area Flood Control Agency (SAFCA) has already completed work on more than one-third of the Natomas levees.

Studies and projects in the region that were allocated funding include:

- Folsom Dam auxiliary spillway construction (\$71.9 million)
- Folsom Dam raise design and construction (\$18.6 million)
- Hamilton City flood risk reduction/ecosystem restoration construction (\$15 million)
- American River Common Features (Natomas Basin) levee improvement design and construction start (\$14.5 million)
- Marysville ring levee construction (\$7.3 million)
- Sacramento River bank protection construction (\$6 million)
- Yuba River restoration feasibility study (\$700,000)
- Lower Cache Creek feasibility study (\$570,000)
- Sacramento River General Reevaluation study (\$500,000)
- Sutter flood risk reduction continue design (\$100,000)

Sacramento Congresswoman Doris Matsui also praised President Obama's FY 2017 budget proposal released on February 9th that requests an additional \$20.7 million to complete the Folsom Dam auxiliary spillway, and funding for ongoing construction projects in Folsom, Hamilton City, Marysville, and Natomas.

Flood Insurance Purchases on the Rise

According to a FEMA spokesperson, Californians are taking the warnings about El Nino very seriously based upon the surge in the number of people purchasing flood insurance during the past four months. The number of policies jumped 24% between August and December 2015, for a total of 285,137 now providing coverage statewide, with 27,000 new policies purchased in December alone.

Political Muscle Flexing to Build Dams Instead of Trains

Critics of high-speed rail are partnering with agriculture interests to gather signatures for an initiative that if approved by voters would divert \$8 billion in unsold rail bonds approved by voters in 2008 to fund water storage projects instead. The initiative would also shift \$2.7 billion in Prop. 1 water storage money just approved in 2014, which has interests already fully engaged in building Sites Reservoir and Temperance Flat Dam worried this could disrupt the CA Water Commission's current process to allocate bond funds early next year. Half of the re-allocated money would go to specific projects including raising Shasta Dam, expanding San Luis Reservoir, and building new storage facilities near the Sacramento River and on the San Joaquin River. The other half of the money is not specifically designated, but could be used for other water supply projects such as capturing runoff in urban areas.

In addition, the <u>proposed water initiative</u> would amend the constitution to establish domestic water use and irrigation as the first-and second-highest priorities – elevating them above environmental conservation. Transportation interests believe voters will be concerned that the water proposal overreaches by rewriting water long-standing prioritization laws and shifting costs of water projects historically paid by water users to taxpayers.

Meanwhile, this money grab is on a fast track of its own with \$2 million to fund a signature-gathering campaign, initiative proponents claim to already have 500-700 people in the field on any given day collecting the 585,000 signatures needed by July 25th to qualify for the November ballot.
