GIZELLA ABRAMSON HOLOCAUST EDUCATION ACT

-The Education Act was passed in November 2021 and states:

The State Board of Education shall review the middle school and high school standard course of study and, in consultation and coordination with the North Carolina Council on the Holocaust and the North Carolina Center for the Advancement of Teaching, shall:

- integrate into English, social studies courses, and other courses, as appropriate, education on the Holocaust and genocide
- develop a curriculum for a Holocaust Studies elective

HOLOCAUST SURVIVOR GIZELLA ABRAMSON



Gizella Abramson first began speaking about her experiences in the Holocaust to communities and schools in North Carolina in 1973. She worked with Governor James Hunt to establish the NC Council on the Holocaust from 1977-1981 and was one of its original twelve members when he created Executive Order #63B, making North Carolina the first state in the nation to create a council on the Holocaust. From 1988-2010, she told her story of survival at eight to ten teacher workshops across the state each school year. Her son, Michael Abramson, is currently the chairman of the NC Council on the Holocaust.

In the 2020 *U.S. Millennial Knowledge* and Awareness Survey administered by the Claims Conference to all 50 states, only 25% of North Carolinian respondents could meet all three of the Holocaust knowledge tasks in the chart to the right.

Table 1. Three Criteria Used to Codify "Holocaust Knowledgeable" Millennials/Gen Z	
1)	Have "Definitely heard about the Holocaust" AND
2)	Can name at least one concentration camp, death camp, or ghetto AND
3)	Know that 6 million Jews were killed in the Holocaust


In the 2020 *U.S. Millennial Knowledge* and Awareness Survey administered by the Claims Conference to all 50 states, almost half (48%) of respondents said that they had seen Nazi symbols in their community, on social media, or in both places.

28. Have you personally seen Nazi symbols in your community or on the social media platforms you visit or have used in the past 5 years?

Some common examples of Nazi symbols include: flags with swastikas, pictures idealizing Hitler, flyers with pro-Nazi messages, pictures glorifying Nazi soldiers, "Heil Hitler" symbols such as Nazi-imagery or tattoos with "88" a numerical code for "Heil Hitler."

In March of 2023, the Anti-Defamation League (ADL) released their annual "Audit of Antisemitic Incidents," showing a 30% increase in NC from 2021 to 2022.

"We are deeply troubled by the surge in antisemitic incidents reported in North Carolina in 2022," said Meredith R. Weisel, the ADL regional director, in the press release. "The surges in organized white supremacist propaganda activity like banner drops and flyer distribution, and significant increases in antisemitic incidents in K-12 schools and on college campuses, all contributed to these unusually high numbers. We must work together to combat the spread of bigotry and hate in our communities."



INFORMATION ABOUT ELA CURRICULUM RESOURCES



- -Each grade level 6-12 has two text sets (an anchor text and companion texts) that teachers can choose to use to teach the Holocaust in their ELA class.
- -Each text set has a **core or anchor text** as the focus of the themes and standards taught and companion texts that help provide context for the anchor text. At least one anchor text choice at every grade level is available in a digital format for ease of access. Teachers can choose to use one or more lessons, teach excerpts instead of the full anchor text, or use materials they already have to teach the Holocaust.
- -All text sets include a thorough unit plan with standards-based, classroom-tested lessons by NC teachers and culminating activities to help assess student learning.
- -Foundational lessons for teaching the Holocaust from the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum and important resources for teachers are also provided at each grade level.

INFORMATION ABOUT SOCIAL STUDIES CURRICULUM RESOURCES

- -Each grade level 6-12 has resources aligned to appropriate standards where the Holocaust could be taught. Teachers can choose which standards to use to teach the Holocaust and can choose whether to use the resources that have been developed or their own resources.
- -Teachers should evaluate which standards are best to use to teach about the Holocaust or topics relating to the Holocaust and other genocides, choosing the most relevant and appropriate resources based on the grade or course being taught.
- -Foundational lessons for teaching the Holocaust from the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum and important resources for teachers are also provided at each grade level.



NC HOLOCAUST EDUCATORS' NETWORK



-Since 2020, the NC Council on the Holocaust has been building a network of Holocaust educators across North Carolina. This network is comprised of leaders in Holocaust education who volunteer their time to keep the teachers in their region /county connected to professional development opportunities offered through the NC Council on the Holocaust and other organizations such as NCCAT, Appalachian State, and the USHMM.

-Our goal is to have 100% of the counties represented by the beginning of the 2023/2024 school year so that every district has clear communication about opportunities and resources are available for teachers in NC when teaching about the Holocaust and making local choices about implementing the Gizella Abramson Holocaust Education Act.

-The Holocaust educators in our network will be assisting in the state-wide professional development efforts for the Holocaust curriculum, so if your county is not represented, please encourage teachers in your county to apply!

PREPARING FOR IMPLEMENTATION...



Make sure teachers and curriculum specialists in English and Social Studies are aware of the legislation and the resources that will be provided to support teachers in teaching about the Holocaust. Share this presentation with them!



Encourage teachers to take advantage of webinars, in-person workshops, and other trainings offered by the NC Council on the Holocaust and the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum.



Support your teachers by considering the purchase of classroom sets of books to give them the full range of choices in which texts that they can use to teach the Holocaust. This is NOT a requirement, though it would give teachers the opportunity to use recommended texts with detailed resources developed for them.



Contact your County Coordinator from the NC Holocaust Educator Network (see previous slides) and support them in creating clear communication with teachers in the county. If you do not have a coordinator, encourage teachers to apply.



Communicate with and prepare a presentation that can be delivered to your local board of education.

OVERVIEW OF KEY ELEMENTS FOR IMPLEMENTATION

1 ELA Integration Supports

- ELA teachers in grades 6-12 can choose to use the provided curriculum resources or their own resources to teach the Holocaust
- Review slide 11 for recommended anchor text choices for each grade level
- Available in Fall 2023
- 2 Social Studies Integration Supports
- · Social Studies teachers in grades 6-12 choose which standards to use to teach the Holocaust
- Thorough, classroom-tested resources aligned to identified social studies standards will be provided as a support for each course
- Available in Fall 2023

3 Professional Development

- In-person and virtual trainings will be developed and scheduled for each educational region of the state
- · Holocaust education leaders in each region will be trained to help deliver professional development
- Districts are invited to volunteer to be a training site for their region. (See slide 14 to apply)
- · Professional Development Plan will be available in Fall 2023

Elective Course

- Objectives and a course outline for the elective course will be developed in 2023-2024
- The elective course code and course description will be available when students register for the 2024-2025 school year
- · A course outline and resources will be provided for teachers of the elective course
