Manure splll at Willcome farm

Brighton farm cited

The Department of Natural Resources will issue a \$500 fine to a town of Brighton farm responsible for release of a million gallons of manure in May, some of which entered the Little Eau Pleine River.

The Marathon County Conservation, Planning and Zoning Department investigated the incident on the

Willcome Farm. Staff found that manure from the

100-cattle operation was allowed to overflow from a 12 by 20 foot shortterm, permitted holding tank. Air

photographs indicate that the tank released manure for over a year.

Paul Daigle, spokesman for the county department, said "a significant" amount of manure found its way into the Little Eau Pleine River.

He said the manure release has been cleaned up and spread on a neighbor's land. As of May 9, he said, all of the spilled manure had been disced in.

"This is one of the largest spills we've had in recent years," Daigle said.
