The Reverend's Ruminations - March 2022

Here we stand, already on the edge of Lent, staring down another snowstorm and cold snap, which reminds us that winter still has plenty of adventure to offer. I pray that you and your family are staying warm and healthy! We have enjoyed seeing quite a few in worship services over the last few weeks, and hope that area COVID numbers continue to trend downward. We still very much encourage masks to be worn at church, but you will notice a few additions to our service that remind us just how long we've been experiencing restrictions to "the way it was." What we'd like to call normalcy is a very nebulous term these days, but each little bit helps brighten our outlook.

As we lean expectantly into **LENT**, I encourage you to return to one of the special observances that sets this church season apart: a mid-week Lenten service each Wednesday at 5:30. These will begin on March 2nd with the traditional Ash Wednesday service, which includes the imposition of ashes—a mark meant to recall the symbolic role of ashes in the Bible. Ashes are present in several biblical stories, such as when Job repented his questioning of God's judgement, declaring, "...therefore I despise myself, and repent in dust and ashes" (Job 42:6). In Old Testament times, the grief-stricken would often exchange their normal robes for rough burlap sackcloth and cover themselves in ashes for a period of isolation and mourning after the loss of a loved one. Jesus later connected repentance and the mourning of loss as he called new believers to repent and believe the Good News of the Gospel.

Throughout the month and into the first week of April, our mid-week Lenten services will feature a unique and engaging format—one that will need a few volunteers to be successful. I've chosen a "dramatic dialogue" sermon series by Rev. Scott Bryte called **Dateline: Jerusalem**, which seeks to bring you closer to the action of Holy Week in a TV news-magazine format featuring interviews with six eyewitnesses including Pontius Pilate, Caiaphas, Peter, Mary Magdalene, John, and the Centurion. If you'd be willing to read as one of these characters (no line memorization required), please contact me to let me know which Wednesdays you're available.

As I'm sure you're aware, there is also a little holiday observed by many on March 17: St. Patrick's Day. But rather than brush it off as a day glorifying an excess of green beer, I thought you might enjoy a brief history of his religious significance, drawn from *Biography.com*:

The man who would come to be known as Saint Patrick, apostle and patron saint of Ireland, was born in Britain around 386 A.D. Much of his early life is unknown to historians and can't be verified, but when Patrick was 16 years old, he was captured by Irish pirates who brought him to Ireland and sold him into slavery. His job was to tend the sheep of his master, Milchu, a high priest of Druidism (a Pagan sect that held major religious influence over the country at the time). Patrick came to view his enslavement as God's test of his faith. During his six years of captivity, he became deeply devoted to Christianity through constant prayer. In a vision, he saw the children of pagan Ireland reaching out their hands to him, and grew increasingly determined to convert the Irish to Christianity.

After escaping enslavement and making a harrowing, roundabout trip home to his family, he eventually went to Auxerre, France, where he studied and entered the priesthood under the guidance of the missionary Saint Germain [no relation that I'm aware of!]. He was ordained a deacon by the Bishop of Auxerre around 418 A.D. By 432 A.D. he was ordained as a bishop, and soon sent by Pope Celestine I to Ireland to spread the gospel to non-believers while also providing support to the small community of Christians living there.

Recognizing the history of spiritual practices already in place, Patrick is credited with incorporating nature-oriented pagan rituals into church practices. It's believed that he may have introduced the Celtic cross, which combined a native sun-worshiping symbology with that of the Christian cross. Legend also holds that Patrick drove away all the snakes from Ireland, and introduced the Holy Trinity to the Irish through the familiar 3-leaved shamrock. March 17, 461 A.D. is cited as the date of Patrick's death—a primarily Catholic religious holiday that has been observed ever since and grown to include many "honorary Irishmen."

The meeting was called to order by Moderator, Abigail Roiger. Pastor Cory led with devotions and prayer.

Treasurer's Report: Catherine reported that 2022 is off to a good start with a number of 2022 pledges being paid in full. A stock gift of \$9500 received at the end of the year has been added to the Operating Reserve as has the earnings from our Endowment Fund. Edward Jones funds were down in January after having done well for most of 2021. Our Edward Jones Rep. will be asked to meet and update the Council before summer. It was recommended to move the Parsonage funds be moved to Operating Reserve.

Finance Business: The Brotherhood Mutual (company that carries our building insurance) rep is from Owatonna. He has called on Pastor Cory and Robbin and Dean will contact him soon to visit about our coverage.

Pastor's Report: Rev. Germain reported on his activities including two funerals and upcoming Airlift Wing drills.

Board Reports

Christian Education: Ellen reported on plans being made for new curriculum next year, bell playing, Confirmation families to serve March Community Meal and VBS in June and July

Hospitality: Cathy reported that the Board had a work meeting and planned their Community Meal.

Facilities: Larry reported that they also held a work day. It was too windy that day to install the new Food Library outside of the front of the church.

Diaconate: Sue reported that they delivered flowers to shut ins for Valentine's Day.

Mission: No Report

Worship: Will hold their February/March meeting on Feb. 23, 2022. The children interested in being Acolytes will be trained next week and a Sign up Genius will be shared with parents.

Old Business

COVID protocol changes were discussed. The Council would like to have the Diaconate look into a more "normal" form of Communion as soon as possible. Offering will be collected in pews with minimal contact.

The Time, Talent and Faith survey is on the website, will be available in narthex and email to members with email addresses.

The MN Conference Clergy Care Grant which we applied for last month was approved and the \$500 was received.

HyVee and Fareway Receipts Report as of 20 February 2022

During the last eight weeks \$28,903.65 (19.27%) worth of Hy-Vee slips were received. After 30 weeks, Hy-Vee is at \$116,977.19 (77.98%) toward the 14th \$150,000 goal. Based on history, \$150,000 should be reached around the 17th of April 2022.

During the same eight weeks, \$10,623.51 (7.08%) worth of Fareway slips were received. After 59 weeks, Fareway is at \$77,910.9 (51.94) toward our 4^{th} \$150,000 goal. It will still take over a year to reach the \$150,000.

This program started the first of March 2011, so any slips from then until now can be used. Any Fairmont Fareway and Hy-Vee food store register slip can be used. Even slips from Hy-Vee Gas, Coffee Shop, Food Service, and Pharmacy help us toward the goal. Thanks to all who bring/mail the slips to the Church, or mailing them to me or even dropping them off at my house. Even the very small amounts help.

Reuben Sandwich Casserole



Description

All the things you love about Reubens in an easy-to-make layered casserole!

Ingredients

- · 4 pounds Corned Beef Brisket
- ½ cups Thousand Island Salad Dressing
- 12 slices Swiss Cheese
- 1 can (16 Oz. Size)
 Sauerkraut, Rinsed And Drained
- ½ cups Butter, Melted
- 10 slices Rye Bread, Cut Into Cubes

Preparation

Place corned beef brisket, fat side up, in an oven safe dish with 2 inches of water in the bottom. Cover and cook for 4 hours at 325°F. Remove foil for the last 15 minutes of baking time. Remove beef from the oven and increase oven temperature to 350°F.

Allow beef to cool a bit, then place on cutting board and cube it.

Sprinkle all but 1 cup beef cubes (these are extra, just freeze or eat them) in an deep 9×13 baking dish. I used a Pampered Chef Deep Dish Rectangular Baker and it just fit.

Drizzle Thousand Island salad dressing over the top. Cover the dressing layer with slices of Swiss cheese, then rinsed and drained Sauerkraut.

Melt butter and toss bread cubes in it before topping the casserole with them. Bake casserole at 350°F for 30 minutes.

This tastes best the day it is made.
