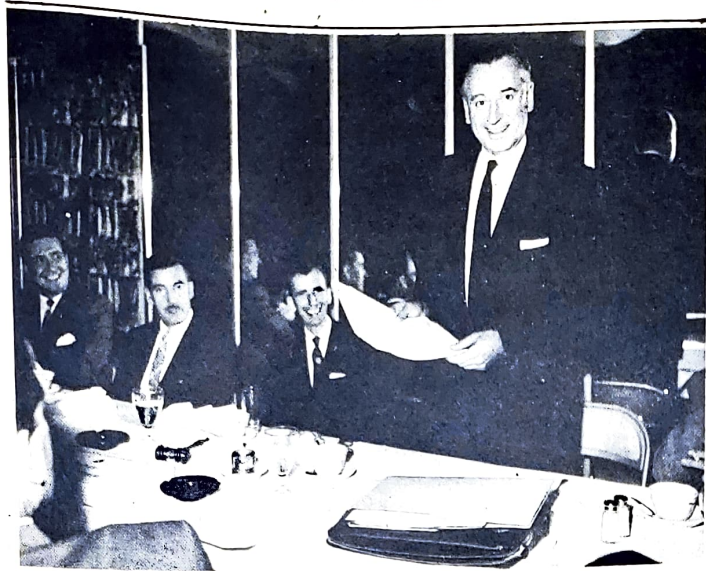

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## EXTENSION OF CARDINAL STARTS NEXT MONTH



Mayor Pratt strikes a humorous note in his address to the Dorval Junior Chamber of Commerce at their dinner meeting held last week at the El Paso. His talk dealt mainly with the problem of water-pollution, particularly in Lake St. Louis, and he took the opportunity to urge all interested citizens to protest in writing to Federal and Provincial authorities, the present deplorable situation in this regard.

### Dorval Bank Loan Deferment Delays Public Works Projects

Dorval City Council has been advised by its bankers that it has reached its limit on borrowing.

City Manager Rene LeBlanc gave the news to aldermen at a special committee meeting of Council last Friday.

This means that various projects on the planning boards will have to be delayed until such times as Council can go to the bond market. Current work planned totals approximately \$1,000,000 which has yet to be financed. Much depends on the reception Council will get when it seeks to sell bonds totalling close to \$500,000.

A spokesman for City Council said Dorval prefers to borrow in smaller amounts, but at frequent intervals, as they find this helps financial houses.

Nevertheless, as a result of the

bank's decision, there will have to be a slowdown on spending greater than was at first anticipated.

One of the biggest blows will be on the labor market, for without additional funds Council will be unable to participate in the Federal Government's winter works program.

Ironically, too, work calling for the extension of paving on Station Road will also be delayed. It will be recalled that two years ago homeowners in the area turned down by referendum a project to complete these works. As a result, when the work is begun it will, it is estimated, cost 15 per cent more than two years ago and will, because of the tight money situation, be delayed even further.

### UNICEF Project Stresses Sharing

Home and school associations, civic and women's institutes, and clubs, service clubs are the most active participants. Hallowe'en for UNICEF is the children's participation in these community projects," she added.

Anyone wishing their child to take part, are asked to have them go to the depots which will be listed next week. They may pick up their can or milk container there.

In Dorval amongst the children, two will be chosen by drawing to present the money to the UNICEF representative, Mrs. Heywood, on behalf of all the Dorval children.

Dorval City Council has been advised from Quebec that work is to start around November 2nd on the extension of Cardinal Avenue from Pine Beach Boulevard to the Dorval Cote de Liesse traffic circle.

This means that the "tolerance" railway crossing at Pine Beach may be eliminated soon.

It was at this crossing that several people met their deaths over the past two years.

Dorval, although not committed in any way, has installed special warning signs, striving to cut down the danger at this entry point into the Pine Beach North area of the city.

Earlier in the year, a suggestion that the crossing should be closed immediately was opposed by the majority of residents north of the highway, since it would have meant that the Pine Beach North district would have been virtually "cut off" from city police, fire and emergency services except for a round-about route via the Sources Road crossing.

Completion of the Cardinal extension to the traffic circle will, of course, provide an alternate entry to Pine Beach North, and work has been authorized on the understanding that the Pine Beach crossing will be closed on the date the new thoroughfare is opened.

### Dorval C of C Delegates Attend Annual Meeting In Toronto

Alan Capel, president of Dorval Chamber of Commerce, together with the vice-president, Lorenzo Decary, the Secretary-treasurer, Roy Amaron, and Ross Smyth, publicity director, returned yesterday from three days of meetings and the annual meeting of the Canadian Chamber, in Toronto.

Mr. Capel, impressed by the tone of the sessions, told The Dorval Reporter on his return: "I think we have learned a lot. All the sessions were designed to help us solve current business and community problems which have an effect on us no matter what we do or where we live."

Theme of the meeting was "Serving the Interests of All Canadians."

He said the delegation from Dorval had made itself heard, having

the same opportunity as the other Boards and Chambers to present its viewpoint on taxation, government spending, employee-employer relations - just to mention a few of the points on which a business platform was hammered out. Each Board or Chamber had one vote in determining the final policy of the Canadian Chamber.

"Last Monday we sat around a big V-shaped table to discuss these policies and to put them into shape for a final vote on the last day of the meeting. Some time ago, we got all these policies in advance to study. We also had the opportunity, like other Boards and Chambers, to put forward our suggestions as long as they were national in character, timely in importance, and general in application to the economic and public welfare."

"The instructive program, plus the opportunity of rubbing shoulders with other business and community leaders, will help us to do a better job for our Chamber - and this means a better job for the citizens of our community," Mr. Capel added.

President A.C. Ashforth of the Canadian Chamber delivered the keynote address on October 19, Premier Leslie Frost of Ontario spoke at luncheon on October 20, President E.R. Canham of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States at luncheon on October 21, and N.R. Crump, President of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, at the Annual Dinner on October 21st.

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## John Pratt Reports From Ottawa

Last week I published the first half of a letter from the Chief Commissioner of the Board of Transport to the Deputy Minister of Transport on the subject of level crossings in this riding. The remainder of the letter continues as follows:-

"Mr. Pratt also suggested that the Department of Transport, in co-operation with the Quebec Department of Roads, survey the whole problem of grade separations between Montreal West and Ste. Anne de Bellevue, with priority to Sources Road and St. John's Road. This Board was instrumental in having the Quebec Department of Roads and the interested municipalities from Dorval to Ste. Anne de Bellevue, and Canadian National and Canadian Pacific make a study with a view to protection in that area and the elimination of the most important grade crossings between Dorval and Ste. Anne de Bellevue. The Chief Engineer of the Department of Roads subsequently reported to the Board by letter, dated November 27, 1952, a copy of which I am enclosing.

Our Director of Engineering advises that the recommendations of the Department of Roads were the installation of automatic gates at Montée des Sources crossing, extension of Donegan Road from Coolbreeze Avenue to Montée des Sources to permit the closing of Valois Avenue and Coolbreeze Avenue crossings and the construction of pedestrian subways at Valois and Coolbreeze Avenues pending the construction of a grade separation at Montée des Sources that was estimated at the time to cost \$1, 100,000.00, following which there would be elimination of the grade crossings at Montée St. Charles by construction of a grade separation and elimination of level crossing at Montée St. John by grade separation, these being second and third in order of priority.

Of these works, automatic gates have been installed at Montée des Sources, Donegan Road has been extended from Coolbreeze Avenue to Montée des Sources and the two highway crossings of Valois and Coolbreeze Avenues have been closed.

The Board has received no complaints in respect of the Montée des Sources crossing or the pedestrian crossings at Valois and Coolbreeze Avenues and although it had approved in principle the construction of a subway at Montée des Sources and the construction of pedestrian subways at Valois Ave. and Coolbreeze Avenue, those works have not been constructed and at the present time there is no request before the Board for these subways. The most urgent problem between Dorval and Ste. Anne de Bellevue, is the elimination of Pine Beach crossing in the Town of Dorval.

Two years ago a project was submitted by the Quebec Department of Roads to extend Donegan Road between Montée des Sources and Côte de l'Esse Road through a golf course and through the Dorval airport. At that time there were some difficulties with regard to expropriation of land on the golf course, and the Department of Transport was preparing plans for the expansion of the Dorval airport and could not reach a decision with regard to allowing this road to be constructed on the airport property.

At our request the Quebec Department of Roads prepared a new project which has been submitted to the two railways concerned and the Department of Transport.

We have been advised by the two railways that they are agreeable to contributing the amounts suggested by the Quebec Roads Department of Transport before recommending the approval of this project which will permit to close Pine Beach crossing.

The Board has also received recently a project prepared by the

Quebec Department of Roads for the construction of grade separations to eliminate Montée St. Jean. The project has been submitted to the two railways but no submissions have yet been received from them.

The various interest municipalities have close associations with the Quebec Department of Roads and if they have immediate plans or long range plans for highways and grade separations they may make application to the Board when they see fit for whatever authorization is necessary and the Board will assist in every way possible and make a grant from the Fund towards any project entitled to it under the law as it may be from time to time.

In the circumstances this letter is somewhat lengthy and I hope that the information in it will be useful to you and to Mr. Pratt.

## Radio Station Licensed For Lakeshore Area

A new radio station for the Lakeshore has been approved by the Board of Broadcast Governors for installation at Pointe Claire. Station Manager of the new outlet, which will operate at 1470 on the dial at 1000 watts, will be popular local broadcaster Gord Sinclair, currently with CFCF.

Keith Dancy, a former Dorval resident, will be leaving Station CKSI in London, Ontario, to take over the duties of General Manager of the new station. Danny Dooner will be the Sales Manager.

The decision to grant the licence to the Pointe Claire station, represented by Gerald Duffy, followed rejection of a similar application by George S. Mooney for a radio station in Dorval which would have operated at 1570 on the dial at a power of 5000 watts.

In turning down Mr. Mooney's application the Board said the proposed Pointe Claire Station would give satisfactory service to the area and "in the opinion of the Board, the operation of a station at Pointe Claire is to be preferred in terms of intended emphasis on local community service".

## An Important Anniversary

Dorval Chamber of Commerce, initially formed with such enthusiasm by the late Alderman Laurence Earl and a group of local businessmen in the spring of '58, is officially just one year old this month, when it holds its second annual meeting.

During its short lifetime, first under the charter presidency of Mr. Earl, and now under the leadership of Alan Capel, the senior group has felt its way carefully and learned through its errors. It now enters its second full year with hope for its own future and that of the city whose name it bears.

A Chamber of Commerce can do much for the people of any city. Unlike service groups it keeps vigil over local government, with whom it should cooperate for the good of all without narrow, selfish interests. In a word, its members are the watchdogs over matters civic.

Dorval's Chamber has not been too loudly heard mainly, no doubt, because it has desired to walk properly before stepping out.

Newly back from Toronto and the annual meeting of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, they will no doubt speak with more maturity and authority.

We wish them well under a new president to be elected at their meeting next Friday, when they will also act as hosts to a group from Dorval's "twin" city, Oakville, Ontario.

## Tight Money - A Concrete Example

Dorval, like every other community in Canada, is finding the business of borrowing and the cost of borrowing more difficult and more expensive than even a year ago.

Banks, in this tight money squeeze, are not too eager to loan money at a legal rate of interest which they consider uneconomical.

In one respect, however, the city is fortunate in that it has a good name with the lending agencies because its financial house is in excellent standing. Nevertheless, quite naturally, it has no desire to borrow beyond its means and to the detriment of its taxpayers.

Council has, therefore, gone deeply into the subject and wisely ordered a sort of cutback in spending. This means that projects which can be safely delayed will be delayed, and that those which have left the drawing boards and must be done, will be done.

This, in our view, is a wise move and one which is to be commended. It means that property-owners can rest assured that the money they pay in taxes will be used prudently and for the good of all.

## Pratt Spikes Rumour of Struggle For Crossings

In a recent letter to the Mayor and Council of the City of Pointe Claire, Mayor John Pratt of Dorval assured that civic body that Dorval Council's recent formal resolution to press for an underpass at Sources Road in no way inferred that they would be party to a public controversy on the merits of the Sources underpass versus the St. John's Road underpass requested by Pointe Claire.

Mr. Pratt expressed concern at "ridiculous rumors" lately that a struggle is shaping up between the two cities as to the relative precedence and importance of the subways in question.

"The Dorval Council and myself," said the Mayor, "are unanimous in accepting the fact that subways must be built at both Sources and St. John's Roads in the immediate future. If, perchance, the higher authorities insist on building one before the other, it is my personal belief, and I am sure it is yours, that the first grade separation should be erected where the traffic is greatest and the need most urgent," he added.

"This may depend somewhat on the traffic count at these two crossings," he wrote, and indicated he would be obliged if he could be supplied with the results of such a count at St. John's Road. "I know of no two cities whose future interests are more closely interwoven than Pointe Claire and Dorval," continued Mayor Pratt, "and I appreciate very much the friendly cooperation which has always existed between us. It is my own wish, as I am sure it is

yours, that both our cities will continue to cooperate for the betterment of all our citizens."

Mr. Pratt reaffirmed his support as Federal M.P. for both crossings and suggested that a meeting of the two city councils might be desirable in order to explore the various aspects of the situation in the general interest of the entire Lakeshore.

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# AUTHORS and ARTISTS

## THE MAN WHO CAME TO DINNER

Scarlet plush programmes with gold cords reminiscent of the dance programme of our youth, Girl Guides reminding flags, Sea Rangers guarding cloaks, a star-spangled photographic display - all graced the opening night of the E-Z Players first production of the fall season at Lachine High School Auditorium, Thursday evening.

**THE MAN WHO CAME TO DINNER** written in the thirties as a lampoon of the late Alexander Woolcott no longer seems as funny as it was twenty-odd years ago. In fact to address Mahatma Gandhi as "Boo-boo" now seems nothing short of sheer bad taste. Nevertheless, there is still plenty of wit and fun in the Hart-Kaufman lines for a company which is willing to rehearse. Timing, pace and movement are needed in exacting proportions to bring off such farce successfully, but save in a few precious moments these were unfortunately lacking in this production.

That deaf old lady in the back row to whom the actors are supposed to direct their speech and actions was out of luck on Thursday evening. "The butler is very confidential," remarked Mr. B. to me, and I had to agree. Neither of us could hear a single word he spoke during the entire performance, and he was not alone in being at least part of the time inaudible.

Some of the special effects were excellent. The lowering of the fourth wall in the form of a picture window was delightful and the audience appreciated it. One saw the living room with its beautifully-lit Christmas tree to much greater advantage, and the choir boys in their scarlet gowns made a pretty tableau at the close of Act III, Sc. 1. When a group is lucky enough to perform on a stage where scenery can be flown it is good to make use of it.

The Mummy case was built by an artist, and the bit of business with Lorraine Sheldon was well-contrived and carried out.

The E-Z Players appear to have financial backing, and they have drawn to their group some people of talent and enthusiasm. But Little Theatre must come of age in Greater Montreal, as French Little Theatre has done. You and I must stop saying, "Well, they put forth a lot of work, and after all they are only amateurs." The greatest satisfaction can come to the group which does an artistic job, which is letter-perfect on lines, which rehearses and rehearses for pace and climax, and above all which works as a team in doing these things.

Congratulations to the E-Z Players on what they have already accomplished. When next they present a play it is hoped that they will have had it in rehearsal at least three weeks longer than they had **THE MAN WHO CAME TO DINNER**.

Because their show had been so well received in Montreal, and because they had the first of their kind in town, the Trinity Players experimented in travelling to the Lakeshore with their production of **TWELVE ANGRY MEN**. Playing to an audience of fourteen people in John Renzie High School on Saturday afternoon might have discouraged less-seasoned troupers, but these actors, "twelve good men and true" gave a gripping presentation, which kept the small audience on the edge of their seats.

Originally written for television with very little physical action, the scene of the play is set in a jury room where the jurors have retired to decide the fate of a nineteen-year-old boy accused of murdering his father with a switch knife.

Robert Verniks, the director whose background includes a year at the Moscow Art Theatre, plus experience in theatres of Western Europe and England, has imbued this seemingly static play with tense, dramatic action. Each of three acts builds to an exciting climax as the curtain falls, and the scene re-opens on the same tableau. These intervals, in the TV version used for the commercial, seem rather artificial on stage, but this is a small matter compared with the general excellence of acting and the smoothness of the production.

Particularly worthy of note was the complete naturalness of speech demonstrated by all members of the cast. Yet each man used speech in a manner which was completely vital to point up the character he was portraying. These characterizations were sharply drawn, so as to be almost caricatures, in some cases. Sidney Libman as the neglected old man, Joe Golland with the inquiring mind and sense of justice, came alive as real human beings capable of evoking tears, sympathy and laughter. The emigrant with his pathetic idealism of the American Way, as played by Robert Verniks was particularly moving.

It is to be hoped that the Trinity Players will not be discouraged by their first attempt to bring good semi-professional theatre to the suburbs. We all need to see more productions of this calibre and to commend our home-grown efforts with theirs.

The programme was mimeographed on typewriter paper.

## WATCH THE ST. ANDREW'S PLAYERS

The St. Andrew's Players of St. Andrew's Church Strathmore, in Dorval will shortly present their fourth major production in two and half years. Not a bad record for a group which started with a platform stage, a borrowed \$50 and earned its curtains with Steinberg's sales slips.

Under the direction of Bernard Shipton, the group will present "Love from a Stranger" by Frank Vosper, an adaptation of a book by Agatha Christie, on November 14th and 7th in the church hall. Not wishing to reveal the story line, Mrs. Kay Turpin, president of the Players said, "It is nice, clean horror in the 'Lavender and Old Lace' tradition."

"One cannot help but catch Mrs. Turpin's enthusiasm for the Players. 'One of the nicest things about this group,' she said, 'is the number of husband and wife teams we have working together in it.'"

Geoff. Turpin is a master of set designing for the very small stage, and is just as enthusiastic about play production as Mrs. Turpin herself.

All the cast hopes you'll come and see **LOVE FROM A STRANGER**.

## DORVAL RESIDENT MARKS 25TH YEAR AS ANGLICAN LAY READER

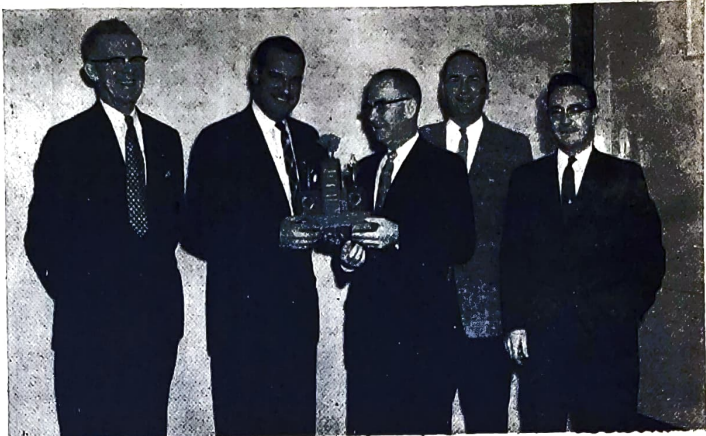

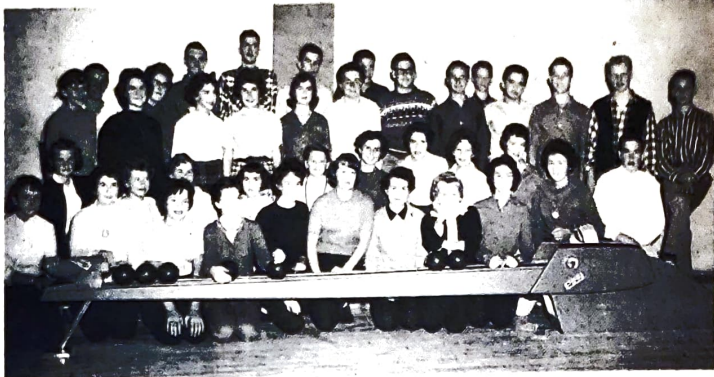
A while ago we reported here that the City of Pointe Claire had donated some grounds for the erection of an artificial ice arena to the Lakeshore Hockey Board and this is confirmed in a letter received from Bob Birnie, president of the Lakeshore Hockey Board.

In his letter Mr. Birnie states that over 1,400 youngsters are registered and play organized hockey with teams under the jurisdiction of the board on 17 outdoor rinks where maintenance, snow removal and centralized supervision are becoming increasingly difficult. For several years the Lakeshore Hockey Board has been planning to provide the Lakeshore with a winter sports center and, as Mr. Birnie points out, various Lakeshore communities have built swimming pools and parks and are doing an excellent job in the summer, but in winter when our young people should have something to do other than hang around street corners, we have little else to offer.

The City of Pointe Claire has donated the land and made an offer of services to go with it if, as, and when the arena is a reality. Mr. Birnie says that both Provincial and Federal governments would be willing to each make grants equal to one-third of the proposed cost when suitable representation has been made. In order to get that suitable representation, they need the support of the majority of service, civic, social and sports organizations along the Lakeshore. A meeting with our Federal M.P. Mr. John Pratt is planned for early in November. Any Association interested should name a delegate and advise the Lakeshore Hockey Board in writing at 135 Duke of Kent Avenue, Lakeside Heights P. Q.

A meeting will be held on November 5th, Thursday, at Pointe Claire City Hall to outline the proposal and to give a chance to all delegates to report to their own association on the proposal. Mr. Birnie also points out that plans for an arena include in addition to hockey and skating, its possible use for badminton, volleyball, exhibitions, indoor sports, shows and large group activities.

We will be looking forward to the success of the meeting as we are very much in favor of an artificial ice arena. We had hopes that Dorval would have been first on the Lakeshore with an arena but one in Pointe Claire is better than none at all and, as it doesn't appear that Dorval citizens are ready to build one yet, we wish Pointe Claire "bonne chance".
