PASTOR'S MESSAGE ~ Pastor Allegra Hoots ~



Dear Friends,

Here we are a mere sixty-six days after Advent, the festive time in the church calendar that culminates with the commemora-

tion of Jesus' birth, entering the second week of Lent, one of the most solemn times of the liturgical year.

In contrast to the hopeful spirit of Advent, Lent is a reflective time of repentance and spiritual renewal. The first day of the season, Ash Wednesday, intentionally calls attention to mortality, not optimism and joy. During the Lenten journey, with grateful hearts, Christians meditate on Jesus's teachings and sufferings that concluded with his crucifixion for the world's sins. Unlike the cheerfulness exhibited through Christmas plays and Christmas music that tells of the Savior's birth, during Lent, the stations of the cross retell the sad story of Jesus' unjust suffering and death.

Lent reminds us that the baby Jesus, whose birth we celebrated on December 25, is the mature young man, fully human and fully divine, who withstood ridicule, an unfair trial, and conviction, and who was executed without uttering a mumbling word against his attackers.

Advent is marked by joyfulness. Lent is characterized by an acute sadness stemming from an awareness of the agony Jesus suffered on humanity's behalf. That knowledge grieves us because we know and agree with the words of Isaiah 53:5, "He [Jesus] was pierced for our transgressions, he was crushed for our iniquities; the punishment that brought us peace was on him, and by his wounds, we are healed."

We shed tears mingled with sadness and gratefulness because we know Jesus' afflictions should have been ours. We know we can never repay God's compassion and limitless love shown through the Lord Jesus Christ, nor does God expect that of us. Instead, God calls us to righteous living that includes acknowledging God's grace and doing good deeds to help bring God's kingdom on earth as it is in heaven.

**Good deeds** involve practicing mercy by forgiving those who harm us, as Jesus forgave his tormentors. God also calls us to share our good fortune with those needier than we are and help those who cannot help themselves (Isaiah 58: 6-7).

So, as we journey through Lent, let us honor God by praying for God's Holy Spirit to empower us to live the words of Micah 6:6-8, "He has told you, O mortal, what is good and what does the Lord require of you? Love and practice compassion diligently and walk unassumingly with God." Also, let us remember the words of Ecclesiastes 12:13, the way to show gratitude to God is to reverence God and obey God's commandments.

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March 28th, 2021 This begins Holy Week which leads up to Easter on April 4th

Palm Sunday is a Christian holiday that occurs on the Sunday before Easter each year. This celebration commemorates Jesus' arrival in Jerusalem for the Jewish holiday of Passover. Jesus entered the city knowing He would be tried and crucified and welcomed His fate

to rise from the grave and save us from sin! Palm Sunday marks the beginning of Holy Week, the remembrance of Jesus' last days to the cross. On Palm Sunday, Christian churches often give the congregation palm branches to re-create the celebration of Christ's final arrival.

Jesus rode a young donkey into the city of Jerusalem and was greeted by a large crowd with palm branches and people shouting, "Hosanna to the Son of David," "Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord," "Blessed is the king of Israel!" and other expressions of praise. The people put their coats and palm branches on the ground as Jesus passed by.

#### Why did people lay their coats and palm branches on the ground?

Laying their coats and palm branches on the ground was a symbolic way to treat Jesus as their king. When a king or conquering ruler entered a city, people would create a carpet by putting their coats and branches on the ground to welcome them. Even today we might use the expression, "rolling out the red carpet" to welcome a celebrity or an important guest.

#### What is the significance of Jesus riding on the donkey?

Conquering kings typically rode in chariots or on horseback, so it is significant that Jesus rode on a donkey. Jesus wasn't an ordinary King with a kingdom. Jesus rode on a donkey to fulfill a prophecy about the Messiah. The Gospel writers record Jesus' specific instructions to his disciples to go to a village where they would find a donkey with her colt beside her. They were told to untie both animals and bring them to Jesus.

#### What does Hosanna mean, especially during Palm Sunday?

Hosanna means "Please Save Us." Mark 11:9 records the people as saying, "Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!"

#### Why was Jesus called the Son of David?

Jesus was not the Son of David but a descendant of King David and a rightful ruler based on a promise God had made to David in Psalm 132:11-12.

**The History of Palm Sunday:** Historical celebration of Palm Sunday or Passion Sunday, as the Sunday before Easter was called in the Catholic, Episcopalian, and Anglican churches, can be traced back over 1600 years. "The observance of Palm Sunday in Jerusalem was witnessed by the pilgrim Egeria in about 381-384. During this observance there was a procession of people down the Mount of Olives into Jerusalem. The people waved branches of palms or olive trees as they walked."

**Orthodox Church Traditions:** In the Orthodox Church Palm Sunday is a continuation of the celebration of Lazarus' resurrection. Palm Sunday is one of the great feasts of the Orthodox Church. Russian Orthodox churches give out willow branches because palm branches were not historically available. **Catholic Church Traditions:** In a Catholic service, the palm branches are treated as holy because they were blessed by the priest. They are not to be thrown away but instead are collected and incinerated to make the ashes used in the Ash Wednesday service.





Let us be concerned for one another, to help one another to show love and to do good. Let us not give up the habit of meeting together, as some are doing. Instead, let us encourage one another all the more, since you see that the Day of the Lord is coming nearer. Hebrews 10:24-25 GNB



Mops, brooms, and window cleaner...what do we use these things for? (Pause.) We use them when we clean houses. Do you ever help your parents clean your house? (Pause.)

Let's see how good you are at pretending to clean. When I hold up the broom, stand up and pretend to be sweeping the floor. (Demonstrate the motion.) When I hold up the paper towels and window spray, pretend to spray and scrub a window. (Demonstrate the motion.) When I hold up the mop, stay seated and pretend to use a mop in circles to clean the floor. (Demonstrate the motion.)

Hold up each item several times, sometimes repeating the same item twice in a row. Play until kids get tired.

How do you know it's time to clean house? Here are some signs that will let you know.

It's time to clean house when your feet stick to the floor when you walk through the kitchen.

- It's time to clean house when your mother can't find you when she comes into your room to wake you up in the morning.
- It's time to clean house when the kids in the neighborhood use their fingers to write "wash me" in the dirt on your windows.

It's time to clean house when there are more dishes in the kitchen sink than there are in the cabinets.

It's time to clean house when you have enough dust bunnies under your bed to start a bunny farm.

I think you get the idea! Today we're going to learn about a time Jesus did some house cleaning. It was time for the annual Passover celebration, so Jesus traveled to Jerusalem. When He went to the temple, He couldn't believe what He saw. People were selling cattle, sheep, and doves to be used as sacrifices in the temple. Some men were even charging people to change their money so they could pay their temple taxes. It looked more like a flea market than a place to worship God.

Jesus was so angry that He made a whip from rope, and drove the cattle, sheep, and those who were selling them out of the temple. He also turned over the money changers' tables. To the ones who were selling the doves, He said, "Get out of here! How dare you turn my Father's house into a market!." Jesus did some serious house cleaning that day!

As we think about Jesus cleansing the temple, we can also be reminded that there is some other cleaning that needs to be done. The Bible tells us that we are the temple of God and that the Spirit of God lives in us (1 Corinthians. 3:16). This season of Lent is a good time for us to think about how our hearts might need cleansing.

God, help us to remember that we are Your temple and that Your Spirit lives in us. Help us to keep our lives clean and useful for service to You. In Jesus' name, amen.




