24th Sunday Ordinary Time Year A Matthew 18:21-35



"Peter approached Jesus and asked him,_"Lord, if my brother sins against me,how often must I forgive? As many as seven times?" Jesus answered, "I say to you, not seven times but seventy-seven times. That is why the kingdom of heaven may be likened to a king who decided to settle accounts with his servants. When he began the accounting, a debtor was brought before him who owed him a huge amount. Since he had no way of paying it back, his master ordered him to be sold, along with his wife, his children, and all his property, in payment of the debt. At that, the servant fell down, did him homage, and said, 'Be patient with me, and I will pay you back in full.' Moved with compassion the master of that servant let him go and forgave him the loan. When that servant had left, he found one of his fellow servants who owed him a much smaller amount. He seized him and started to choke him, demanding, 'Pay back what you owe.' Falling to his knees, his fellow servant begged him, 'Be patient with me, and I will pay you back.' But he refused. Instead, he had the fellow servant put in prison until he paid back the debt. Now when his fellow servants saw what had happened, they were deeply disturbed, and went to their master and reported the whole affair. His master summoned him f and said to him, 'You wicked servant! I forgave you your entire debt because you begged me to. Should you not have had pity on your fellow servant, as I had pity on you?' Then in anger his master handed him over to the torturers until he should pay back the whole debt. So will my heavenly Father do to you, unless each of you forgives your brother from your heart."

Pastor's Study Desk Notes



Dear St Anthony & St Pius Families,

24th Sunday Ordinary Time Year A

Matthew 18:21-35

Here we go! How many times must we forgive? Peter thinks he will have a hard time with forgiving his brother *seven times* (Was Andrew that hard to live with?) Oh, but He would just be getting started with such a low number! Jesus tells him to try *seventy seven times* (Matt 18:22). I may not be too good with math, but that is a lot of forgiving. Some people hear Jesus saying 'seventy seven--times' (77 times) and some people hear Him saying, "seventy—seven times (repeated over)" (490 times). But obsessing about such math calculations probably misses Jesus' point. He doesn't want us to keep count of our efforts at forgiveness. As if we can max out the number of attempts and then self-righteously stop loving our brother and sister. And I suggest that since most of us see a spiritually symbolic significance to the number seven (seven days of creation-& the seventh day of sabbath being the day of creation's <u>completion</u> & day of <u>perfect rest and peace</u>), some people interpret Jesus to be saying 'forgive an *infinite* number of times.' Or as I heard someone say once, Jesus is telling us 'You start forgiving and keep on forgiving until I tell you to stop'. Of course, Jesus will never have us stop forgiving.

As Jesus likes to do, He answers Peter's question about how often to forgive (*always*) by adding a parable to keep in mind. The parable is about a very merciful king who forgives his servant a huge debt. Then that servant, instead of being grateful and consequently generous to others, he turned around and acted pitilessly like a loan shark, toward another servant over just a tiny amount of money owed to him in comparison. When the king heard of this miserly servant being so cruel over such a small amount, the king threw that man into prison, turning him over to torturers! Why? Well, we reap what we sow (Galatians 6:7). The unforgiving servant has the blade of greed cut against himself! Jesus teaches elsewhere that "the measure with which you measure will be measured back to you" (Matt 7:2). In this parable about the need to always forgive, I hear Jesus saying, "When you consider how the Father has forgiven you so much & so often, how can you hold back forgiveness for a fellow brother/sister?" When we consider ALL that God has done for us, how can we hold back helping another person in any way?

I am struck as a practicing Christian (& I hope, a faithful Christian!), how often I ask God for forgiveness of my sins. Every Mass is filled with requests for mercy, & outright petitions for forgiveness. For example, right at the beginning of Mass, we all begin our prayer by acknowledging our sinfulness ('I confess...') or pleading for mercy ('Lord, have mercy' which means 'Lord, forgive me'). Also, so many of our hymns have verses detailing our sinfulness and need of forgiveness, along with various prayers that change each Sunday, but still constantly ask mercy of God even though we are unworthy. Also as we progress toward Holy Communion at the sign of peace, the priest asks God on our behalf to "Look not on our sins, but on the faith (trust) of the Church". We do <u>trust</u> in Divine Mercy! And most of all, consider how many times in a typical day we pray the Lord's Prayer. For example, if we only pray one rosary a day, then we pray at least six 'Our Fathers'! But how often we may open or close a meeting with Jesus' simple words of prayer. About the Our Father, I love to point out that every time we pray it, we are admitting to God, 'forgive us our trespasses <u>as we forgive those</u> who trespass against us'. We are presuming to ask forgiveness from God, to the degree that we are offering forgiveness to others! So, we ought to be quite forgiving of others, if we are expecting any. If not, then we are going to come up short receiving forgiveness ourselves.

What might hold us back from offering forgiveness to others? Might it be our 'petty ego' holding out in retribution against an offender in some misguided attempt to make them suffer and save our pride, or an exaggerated sense of our 'self-importance' presumptively seeing ourselves as executors of God's ultimate justice (usurping God's role)? Instead of keeping oneself hung up in the sins of others, it seems healthier to simply 'move on' by forgiving as Jesus advised His apostles whenever they may have been rejected or persecuted ('shake dust from feet' Matt10:14). Also, Jesus highlighted the role of each person who serves in His Name, to have the authority to either 'bind or free' others. He does this dramatically on Easter morning after He Rises form the dead. He appears to His apostles to empower them with the authority to 'forgive as He does'! He says in John 20:23, "Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained" (also found in Matt 16:19, 18:18). But perhaps, our greatest motivation to 'forgive the sins of others' is what Jesus tells us at the Last Supper after He washed the apostles' feet. Jesus said, "I have given you a model to follow, so that as I have done for you, you should also do" (John 13:15) Follow Him! Peace, Fr Brian


