

day at the DaVinci Science Center. With hands-on workshops and live science shows, everyone was engaged as active participants in the learning process.






STEM Project

Throughout STEM class this year, the sixth grade students at HGA focused on the various uses of simple machines. On May 14th, they were able to put that knowledge into action and help their peers in the process by building bicycles and skateboards for foster children at the Children's Home of Reading.

This one-day event was actually months in the making. Back in the fall, Mrs. Kinyo connected with an organization called Together We Rise (http://www.togetherwerise.org) which provides support for foster children in a variety of ways, including bikes, skateboards, birthday boxes, and duffel bags. She mentioned the organization to the students and everyone agreed that it would be a great way to work with simple machines and give to others at the same time. It was a win-win situation! The only obstacle was how the HGA students would be able to purchase the necessary supplies to make the 16 bicycles that they wished to donate, a cost of \$1,500.


Through creative fundraising and generous donors, the class was able to acquire more than twice the amount needed. In the early spring, the students participated in a mini Math-A-Thon, raising over \$800. In addition, Toshiba America Foundation provided a \$1,500 grant and when the First Energy Foundation learned about the project, they generously donated another \$1,000. With over \$3,000 raised, the students were ready to get to work!

With more funds than anticipated, the class was able to surpass their goal of 16 bicycles and order the supplies to make 22 bicycles and 22 skateboards. Now, they were going to need some help; employees of Met-Ed, based in Reading, generously gave up a day of vacation to work with the students and serve as mentors to guide them through the assembly process. Students were divided into groups, paired with an adult volunteer and produced one bike and one skateboard. After the hard work was completed, all of the students and vovlunteers took tome to relax and enjoy lunch together. It was well worth the amount of planning and the benefits were much farther-reaching than any classroom lesson could have been. Throughout this entire process, the students developed enriching community connections, applied their knowledge of simple machines, and provided for their peers in need. All in all, a good day!



End of Year GAGC News!

Wow! That was fast! The Tuition Credit Program Year ends on Thursday, May 31st. Credit statements will be distributed the week of June 4th. All credit payments are sent directly to the school to be applied toward tuition accounts.



The new Tuition Credit Program year begins on June 1^{st} – all tuition credit earned from June 1, 2018 – May 31, 2019 will be applied to the 2019/2020 school year.

Online Option Update – Improved PrestoPay Enrollment! The PrestoPay enrollment process has been simplified – new families signing up for Online Payments can now instantly link their bank account to ShopWithScrip and start shopping right away. (Manually entering banking information is still an option, which takes 1-2 business days to process.) Your PrestoPay account is secured by a 4-digit PIN number you choose when you create your account. All PrestoPay transactions go through the same ACH process used by banks and major retailers, and it is very safe.
