



Marie Knapp made her first quilt about 30 years ago. It was in the Amish style, and she describes it as "awful, just awful." She was inspired to quilt by some older women in her life, especially her husband's grandmother, who hand-pieced quilts into her 80's. She remembers entering a store in New Hope, possibly called "My Grandmother's Garden," that sold antique quilts and deciding that she needed to make a quilt. Like many of us, she started with an appreciation for quilts that led to a desire to create.

Now, Marie loves paper piecing.

Her favorite quilting method is stippling on her domestic machine, a little Bernina. Her taste is eclectic, but she particularly likes watercolor quilts. Starting with a class at Budding Star, she has made many watercolor quilts.

Her favorite quilt is actually three quilts that she made twenty-three years ago for three families that reached out to help her family after they were in a terrible accident. Marie found herself with a broken arm and toddlers and was so grateful for their help, that she made them each a green flannel log cabin quilt.





Marie's two daughters are quilters

and sewists. She says, "My husband is always happy when he sees me at my sewing machine." He also has good eye for color and can be a useful resource in planning a quilt.

Besides quilting, she enjoys waterskiing on the Delaware, riding her bicycle, and reading.

She says that she is thrilled that she came back to Courthouse Quilters. She attended meetings a few times in the early days of the guild, but her life became filled with work and family. Now she is back and is ready to "sink my teeth into it."

A Courthouse Quilters Exhibit at the Lebanon Township Museum

At our May meeting, the membership approved an invitation from the Lebanon Township Museum to create an exhibit of quilts celebrating the 100th anniversary of Women's Suffrage in the United States. In 1920, the U.S. passed the 19th Amendment giving women the right to vote. New Jersey passed the amendment in February 1920, so the museum curator would like to display our quilts for the month of February 2020.

Here are the details:

- Quilts will be displayed at the museum for the month of February 2020.
- Maximum size: 48"x48", no minimum.
- Not a competition. All quilts must be completed by the guild meeting on December 8, 2019. They will be shared in the Show & Tell at that meeting.
- You may make as many as you like, but put them in priority order.

There are many sources of inspiration for making a quilt with the suffrage theme.

- You might chose to focus on color. Gold was chosen as the color to represent Women's Suffrage. Shades range from buttercup to cheddar.
- You might chose to make one or more of the many blocks that were created to represent Women's Suffrage.
- You might chose to look through old photos of the suffragettes and print them on fabric or recreate them in fabric.
- You might chose to use a slogan from the time.



- You might chose an art deco theme very popular 100 years ago.
- Of course, you may already be inspired and have something in mind.


