

Watershed Cleanup Forges On; Committee Seeks New Members

Perdido Bay boosters are answering the call to serve as the Western Perdido Bay Watershed Management Action Committee marshal to find new ways to clean up the bay.

Seven local citizens joined the committee and eight volunteered to

start testing the bay waters soon through Alabama Water Watch. Volunteers held a water testing field trip on Friday, October 27, where Michael Cleveland demonstrated techniques in various tests on the local waters. The volunteers will be trained and begin water testing after the first of the year.

Future projects now include bay shoreline cleanup events and other community outreach.

The group works for cleaning up decades of pollution in the Alabama waters of Perdido Bay,

With money allotted from the Mobile Bay National Estuary Program, the Western Perdido group has commissioned civil engineer Wade Burcham to produce an outline of remediation solutions. Burcham, who has worked informally with locals on water quality solutions, is an internationally recognized water resources engineer with more than two decades of professional experience focused on natural stream stabilization, water resources engineering, stormwater management, and municipal engineering.

Leslie Gahagan, the Environmental Director for the City of Foley and

the Board Chairperson of the Wolf Bay Watershed Watch, at a November 13 meeting, emphasized the problems that excess sediment caused largely by new construction is creating in area waterways.

"Leslie has helped to create a great program in Wolf Bay and at the Graham Creek Preserve in Foley," said Lani Hudson-Cameron, one of three local committee members.

"We are fortunate to have her assistance in helping us as we continue to establish our Western Perdido Bay Watershed Action Committee. What Leslie and the Wolf Bay Watershed Watch Board have created in their watershed will assist us as we work on implementing our watershed management plan."

Accepting the Challenge

The year was 373. The place northern Italy. The church of Milan, Italy was fighting over the election of a new bishop. Tempers flared between the two groups of Christians – the Arians and the Orthodoxs. The Roman imperial governor, came to offer his help in settling the dispute. The governor had a repu-

tation for being just and fair. His hope was that settling this dispute would help further his political career. Gathering the people, he addressed them with great eloquence and passion. He urged the people to cease their arguments, to obey the law, and to find a way to keep the peace. Suddenly, from the crowd came a cry, "Ambrose for Bishop!" The whole crowd took up the call. This was much to the horror and embarrassment of Governor Ambrose, for you see, he was not yet baptized. The crowd refused to listen to his protests. Finally, Ambrose consented. Within eight days, he was baptized and ordained bishop of Milan on December 7, 373.

For the next 20 years, Ambrose served Christ's church in northern Italy. He preached passionately for the true divinity of Christ. Ambrose is remembered as a gifted preacher and defender of the faith. And he is also credited as being an important influence on the conversion of Augustine. At that meeting in 373, Ambrose had the mantle of Christian leadership thrust upon him. He was certainly not expecting to be chosen bishop, but he accepted the task and by his faith in Christ, accomplished much for the Kingdom of God. He may not have been baptized, but Ambrose was willing to get dressed and ready for service. This is exactly what Jesus asks of his disciples and of us in our reading today from the Gospel of Luke. That in all times and in all places, we should be ready and faithful servants.

Jesus tells us how to start. "Be dressed and ready for service". Other translations say, "Let your loins be girded." In either version, Jesus is comparing our outer dress — shirt, pants, long flowing robes, with our inner manner of dress — the way we prepare our hearts and minds. We can picture rising from bed in the morning and getting dressed and ready for the day. With the unpredictable weather we sometimes have dressing for the day can anything from sun hats to umbrellas. However, we dress, this is a step of preparation for the day.

And with these good steps to being faithful in all times and all places, Jesus tells us how to continue, saying, "and keep your lamps burning,..." In another story, Jesus warns the disciples against being a servant who falls away from his post and allows his lamp to extinguish. This leaves the servant in the dark and unable to see when the master of the house returns. Thus being in the dark is being unprepared. During the time of Jesus, if your lamp went out, you could not simply drive to Walmart and buy more oil for your lamp. To re-light your lamp would involve finding another lamp or some source of fire to light it from.

That is our challenge today. We have started the journey. We are here getting dressed and ready for service. Now we must keep our lamps burning. At some point, maybe many years ago, perhaps only a few weeks, you accepted the call of God. In exchange, you began to keep a lamp burning. To keep alert for the master's call.

Ambrose was unexpectedly called as bishop of Milan, but he accepted that challenge. And while dressed for service, there were probably times when his lamp was burning low. This following few sentences credited to him may have been what he said during those low times. "Lord Jesus Christ, you are for me medicine when I am sick; you are my strength when I need help; you are life itself when I fear death; you are the way when I long for heaven; you are light when all is dark; you are my food when I need nourishment." May this be a prayer for all of us.

Lillian Park Welcomes Santa With Christmas in the Park

This year's celebration will include a giant Christmas card contest. Businesses and organizations were asked to create giant 4'x8'plywood Christmas cards to be displayed around the Park's walking trail. The cards will be judged and prizes will be given in three categories: Most Creative, Most Holiday Spirit, and Community Favorite during opening ceremonies. People will have a chance to vote for their favorite on Facebook and at the Park until noon on December 2.

Christmas in the Park officially opens at 3:00. However, earlier in the day, Santa's elves will be hosting an Elf Run for kids 12 and under. Kids are asked to dress as elves for this fun run.

The Elf Run is free and begins at 9:00. There will be two runs, one for children under the age of 6, one for children ages 7 to 12. Preregistration is not necessary. Just be at the Park no later than 8:45 to sign up and participate. The run will be staged around the Park soccer field.

Santa and Mrs. Claus have indicated they will arrive at the Park around 4:15 and that they are bringing a few of their favorite elves with them to help hand out goodie bags. Unfortunately, Rudolph is unable to attend since he's resting up for his big night later in the month.


By researching the topic and implementing projects to advocate for positive change, students acquire valuable skills and industry insights needed to thrive in the 21st century.


Important The main issue included in these text amendments is to create a minimum lot size category RSF-1.5, 2 homes per acre or 0.5 acres per home, rather than the current RSF-2 category, 2.9 homes per acre. This should not be controversial. The Planning and Zoning staff indicates the feeling that reducing RSF-2 to RSF-1.5 is too restrictive outside of the activity nodes. Either RSF-2 is RURAL or it is NOT. Most area residents feel it is NOT RURAL and 289 registered voters resoundingly expressed their desire to keep the rural character of these districts, Planning Districts 22, 29 and 33. Some landowners with significant acreage are claiming they were not aware of our amendments until a few days prior to the final vote on October 17<sup>th</sup> Commissioners' Meeting, therefore deferring the matter to December 5<sup>th</sup>, 2023. #### The Methodist Message

Jesus came at Christmas to do for us what we cannot do for ourselves. He came to save us from our sins. This is what God did for us on that first Christmas.

He sent us His heart! He sent His only Son into the world to save us, to redeem us and to turn our lives around. He sent us His heart to show us how much He loves us and to show us how He wants us to love one another.

God sent His only Son into the world to be our Savior. Outside of the Bible, the most famous Christmas story ever written is "A Christmas Carol" by Charles Dickens. It is a story about a gruff, miserly character named Ebenezer Scrooge. We probably also recall that there is a little crippled boy in the story named Tiny Tim Cratchit who is most always happy and who is always saying, "God bless us, everyone."

A Christmas Carol is a conversion story..., and oh my, did Scrooge ever need converting! I mean he was a despicable character, a selfish, arrogant, greedy, hard-hearted, mean-spirited, uncaring, unsympathetic, un-Christian tightwad. His now famous response to Christmas, "Bah! Humbug!" has become the sad symbol of such a disillusioned spirit.

As the story unfolds, Ebenezer Scrooge is visited one night by ghosts that made him see himself as he was. The visits of the ghosts and the Christ-like unconditional love of the Cratchit family, who keep on loving him even though he has treated them horribly, work to convert Ebenezer Scrooge.

And now with a second chance, he changes completely! Why are we so fascinated with this story? It's not just that it's a well-written classic piece of literature. There is something more here. You see, the truth is, this is our story. Deep down inside, deeper than some of us even realize, we all relate to Ebenezer Scrooge!

We all need to face up to ourselves. We all need to be converted from selfishness to love or to put it more dramatically, we all need a Savior!

This is the good news we celebrate at Christmas. Two thousand years ago, God looked down and saw the sick, disillusioned Scroogelike spirit of the world, and He knew that would not work, so He sent His Son to save us, change us and show us a better way.

Christ came to change us from greedy, selfish, disillusioned people into generous, loving, gracious servant people. Jesus saves us from disillusionment, He Saves us from sin and hopelessness.

He saves us from fear of death. Some years ago, Harry Belafonte recorded a Christmas carol that says it all. It has these words: "A long time ago in Bethlehem, the Holy Bible says, Mary's boy-child Jesus Christ was born on Christmas Day. Hark now, hear the angels sing. A new king was born today, and we shall live forevermore, Because of Christmas Day." I pray that everyone reading this has a saving relationship with Jesus Christ.

It was for this very reason that He came into this world, to save us from sin and to everlasting life!

#### Here Is the Best Piece of Advice: Don't Leave Your IRA to the IRS

If you've invested in an IRA for many decades, it may well turn into a key source of income for your retirement. Still, you might not deplete your IRA in your lifetime, especially if you also have a pension or a 401(k) and other investment income. So, if your IRA still has sizable assets after your passing, it would likely end up in your estate plan.

If you leave your IRA to grown children or other family members, could they be hit with a big tax bill?

Here's a little background: Up until the Secure Act of 2019, those who inherited traditional IRAs could extend their required withdrawals over their lifetimes, which stretched out the annual taxes due on these withdrawals.

But the Secure Act changed the provisions for non-spouse beneficiaries who inherited an IRA after 2019, meaning that beneficiaries of inherited IRAs had only 10 years (beginning the year after death) to withdraw the entire balance. For some beneficiaries, this could potentially create a tax burden. (Inheritors of Roth IRAs are

also required to follow the 10-year distribution rule but are not subject to income taxes on account earnings if the Roth IRA's five-year holding period has been met).

However, not all beneficiaries were affected by the new rules. Spouses can stretch their inherited IRA distributions over their lifetimes and exceptions exist for certain nonspouse beneficiaries.

Minor children of the IRA owner (until the age of majority), chronically ill or disabled individuals, and beneficiaries who are no more than 10 years younger than the IRA owner may opt to stretch their distributions.

The new 10-year requirement applies to IRAs inherited on or after Jan. 1, 2020. But due to confusion over changes to required minimum distribution (RMD) rules for some beneficiaries of inherited IRAs, the IRS waived penalties for individuals who failed to take RMDs in 2021 and 2022 and extended the RMD penalty waiver for 2023.

Although these rulings give beneficiaries — those not eligible for the

exemptions listed above — more time to plan, they will eventually need to start taking RMDs, which could affect their tax situations. To help protect your heirs, consider these suggestions:

- Using permanent life insurance. A properly structured permanent life insurance policy could help you replace the assets your family might lose to the taxes resulting from an inherited IRA. You might even consider naming a charity as the beneficiary of an IRA, rather than your family members. The charity would receive the IRA proceeds tax free, and the life insurance could then provide tax-free benefits to your heirs.
- Leaving taxable investment accounts to your heirs. Apart from your tax-deferred IRA, you may own other, fully taxable accounts containing investments such as stocks or bonds. Typically, these investments receive what's known as a "step-up" in their cost basis once they are inherited. This means your heirs will essentially inherit all the gains your investments earned by the time of your passing —

but they won't be taxed on these gains if they sell the assets immediately.

This type of sale could help offset the taxes your heirs will incur from the inherited IRA.

The tax and investment issues surrounding inherited IRAs can be complex, so consult with your tax and financial advisors before making any moves.

And, as with many areas relating to inheritances, the sooner you start planning, the better.

The Optimist International structure starts with the local Club. The Club consists of members who elect their local leadership in April and May. The transition of leadership occurs on October 1 each year. This normally consists of a Club President, Secretary, Treasurer, the Club Foundation Representative to the Optimist International Foundation and its Board of Directors.

The President of the local Optimist Club of Perdido Bay is Dodd Bouchillon. He is serving in his second year of a two-year term. Robin Newell is the President – Elect of the local club and her term as President of the Optimist Club of Perdido Bay will start on October 1, 2024 and run for two-years.

The OCPB has two Vice Presidents, one to serve in charge of membership (John Larson) and one to serve over programming (Daniel Randall). The Secretary is Vicki Loper, while Lee Hoffman is Treasurer. The Club Foundation Representative is John Maye. Kat Keener, Mary Collier and Garnett Eubanks were elected for two-year terms, while Melissa Harris, Karen Rocque and Beverly Woosley are fulfilling their second year of their two-year term on the Board.

Governor Keener was elected Governor Elect in August of 2022 and served in that position for one - year. He officially took office October 1, 2023. His role during that year was to recruit and train the District team. One of the key positions to the Optimist structure is the selection of the Lt. Governor, who serves as the administrative officer for their Zone. Multiple clubs (three or more) are grouped together to make up a Zone. The AL - MS District has ten zones.

The list of Lt. Governors are as follows: Michael Holt (Zonel Birmingham area); Pam Marks (Zone 2 Athens & Northern AL); Dennis Andersen (Zone 3 Huntsville area); Rose Jackson (Zone 4 Montgomery & Central AL); Ernie Rogers (Zone 5 Mobile, AL); Dodd Bouchillon (Zone 6 Baldwin County, AL); Zone 7 is open; Mary Harris (Zone 8 Jackson MS & area); Pam Black (Zone 9 Central MS) and Judy Richardson (Zone 10 Northern MS).

Over the course of the year, the local Optimist Clubs offer a number of Optimist International Scholarship programs. These include the Essay, (\$2,500), Oratorical, (District \$5,000 – International \$22,500), CCDHH (Hard of Hearing \$2,500) and the Junior Golf Program. (\$700) per qualifier at District level – 30 plus scholarships awarded at the Jun-

ior Golf International Championship at Doral.

Most clubs, including the local Perdido Bay Club, also offer individual scholarships for graduating seniors. The local club awards a scholarship to a vocational student and multiple scholarships to children of law enforcement officers and deserving students from Elberta High School and the area. ### Be Healthy During the Holidays

The holidays are fast approaching and it's during the next few months people tend to slack off on their regular exercise routine. Traveling, family gatherings and cold weather brings inconsistency on how we eat and workout.



#### Health Corner

So how do you stay on track and main-

tain a regular workout plan? First thing to do is to think about what happens when you don't exercise and how that makes you feel. Dr. Dean Ornish, the pioneer of lifestyle medicine and his wife wrote a book *UnDo It! How Simple* Lifestyle Changes Can Reverse Most Chronic Diseases "the combination of both sitting more than six hours a day and being less physically active was associated with a 94-percent increase in all causes of premature death rates in women and 48 percent increase in men compared with those who report sitting less than three hours a day and being most active." The main point is that moving more is good for your health.

The next thing is to assess your current exercise plan and determine what changes you need to make to ensure you are including cardiorespiratory, strength and flexibility training. Aim for 30-45 minutes a day of some type of cardiorespiratory activity. Even if you break your cardiorespiratory exercise training into bouts of 10 minutes, 3 times a day you are still getting heart health benefits. A great way to get the benefits of strength training and cardiorespiratory training is doing compound exercises. Compound exercises are exercises that work multiple muscle groups at the same time. For example, a squat is a compound exercise that works the quadriceps, glutes, and calves. You can also do compound exercises that combine two exercises into one move to target even more muscles. For example, a lunge with a bicep curl. Compound exercises save you time and burns lots of calories. All you need is 20-25 minutes for a full -body workout. Strength training should be performed at a minimum of 2-3 times a week. What if you don't have weights or aren't able to get to the gym? Body-weight workouts are the simplest form of exercise-no equipment needed. Using only your weight to get fit can shape your best body and boost your confidence. Focusing on a minimum of four basic body-weight exercises-squats, lunges, push-ups, and planks will improve your muscle endurance if you perform them correctly and consistently.

Develop a plan to challenge yourself and do more each time you perform the exercises. Resistance bands are also a great tool for building muscle endurance and adding fun to your workout. They can easily be packed and used anywhere.

Flexibility exercises are also important to incorporate into your exercise routine to help with mobility and relaxation. The main take away when it comes to improving flexibility is that you want to focus on static stretching which is holding a stretch for 30-60 seconds. Look for ways to stretch the entire body in a slow progressive manner. Stretching on rest and recovery days are ideal for focusing on relaxing the mind and body. Also, remember it is equally important to add time for rest and recovery. Happy Fall!

### Baldwin Vial of Life Free Program Could Help Make **Complex Medical Issues Available to First Responders**

Baldwin County Council on Aging offers Vial of Life Program During medical emergencies it can be difficult to answer all of the questions that first responders may be asking.

The Baldwin County Council on Aging offers a FREE service called the Vial of Life Program that may be particularly helpful for those with a complex medical histo-

Through the Vial of Life program, first responders will have all critical and essential information at their fingertips. A red Vial of Life decal is placed on the front door of the residence making it visible to first responders. A second Vial of Life decal is placed on a Ziploc bag, containing complete medical information. The bag is then placed on the refrigerator door for easy access and viewing. Information First Responders need to know:

- What is your name?
- What medications are you currently taking?
- What illnesses do you have?
- Who is your emergency contact?
- What is your normal blood pressure?
- Are you wearing any hearing or seeing devices?
- Additionally, hospital staff will need information related to insurance coverage.

The Council on Aging is available to assist with filling out the medical form and will provide the two Vial of Life decals and Ziploc bag.

#### Ageless Grace Comes to Lillian; Put Your Brain on This Fitness Program

Ageless Grace is based on the science of Neuroplasticity. The ability of the brain and central nervous system to change form and function, specifically when stimulated with physical movement. It was founded 14 years ago by Denise Medvid of North

Ageless Grace is a Brain Fitness program. It is based on the principle of Neuroplasticity. It addresses 21 physical activities for daily living and five areas of the brain: Strategic, Memory/ Recall, Analytical, Creativity/Imagination and Kinesthetic

Here are a few of the exercises and their primary benefits:

- 1. Juicy Joints Joint mobility, ligament flexibility, circulation
- 2. Spelling "B" Cognitive function, kinesthetic learning, range of motion
- 3. Front Row Orchestra Spinal flexibility, right -left brain coordination, eye-hand coordination
- 4. Body Math Ability to respond, react, recover, cognitive function, agility
  - 5. Rockin Rockettes Hip flexors, lower body

function, thigh strength

6. Grab Bag - Dexterity in the hands, fingers and

All of these are done while seated in a chair, which makes it available for anyone to participate.

After seeing her mother suffer with Alzheimer's, Denise was inspired to find a way to help aging adults engage their bodies and brains. She spent seven years working with scientists from Duke University and what emerged was a program of 21 specific aging factors such as joint mobility, spinal flexibility, balance and the five areas of the brain, as mentioned above.

Ageless Grace fitness activities are largely spontaneous, set to music, and all accomplished while sitting in chairs for stability and wider range of motion. The music and movements are paired to focus on neural pathways created in childhood. The idea is to reopen old ones and create new ones through movements made up on the spot by participants. This is not a strict follow the instructor program.

"I want them to go off on their own and use their creativity and imagination and make up their own moves," according to Sharyon Miller, Certified Educator in Pensacola and Lillian. One of my students, Marie says "she loves the fitness class and the music is awesome and She has a great time being creative and knows it has been so helpful for her cognitive function and physical self." She has been a participant for seven years.

The classes empowers a person to choose their movements. It lets them be creative and involved. The music engages memory and rhythm. Sharyon tells her students to feel free to act silly, laugh out loud and let yourself go.

Ageless Grace is taught in 50 states, 30 countries with 3600 educators certified to teach. Ageless Grace has also met the criteria provided by the United States Department of Health as an evidence based health program.

Sharyon teaches classes at Gullpoint Resource Center, in Pensacola and United Methodist Church in Lillian, Al. She teaches classes for Parkinson's patients and at the Retreat in Pensacola. She has been a Certified Educator for seven plus years and is also a Laughing Yoga Coach.
