DO NOT BE AFRAID, JESUS LIVES!

Acts 5:12-16; Psalm 118:2-4, 13-15, 22-24; Rev. 1:9-13, 17-19; John 20:19-31 The mission statement of our parish reads thus, "We, the members of St. Bartholomew's Parish, will strive to work for a vibrant and loving

Eucharistic community. In the <u>spirit of Christ</u>, we commit ourselves to the service of humanity - in our parish, neighborhood, archdiocese and the universal Church. We will strive <u>to enrich our community spiritually and socially</u>, and to be a family of worship and prayer for all."

The first reading of today offers us some insights and outlines some essential marks of the early Church in Jerusalem. Here we see a church that was Eucharistic in nature, but vibrant and loving in practice. We see a Church where fellowship, brotherhood and communion were the basic elements in its day-to-day existence. The word Church is from the Greek word ekklēsia, meaning 'community.' The Church, therefore, is a community of the People of God, all of us. You and I form a community that is bounded together by the Holy Spirit and characterized by our common communion (communal life), koinōnia, devotion to the apostolic teaching (didachē) and also to the breaking of bread and prayer (Acts. 2:44-46). The Church, like any human institution, is faced with challenges and problems. In the second reading, St. John's revelation deals with a church that was in distress. It was probably written during the reign of Emperor Damitian. It was a time of severe persecution of Christians. John himself was exiled on a little island called Patmos for preaching the gospel of the risen Christ. He feared for his life, but in one of his visions, he saw "One like a Son of Man" who "touched me with His right hand and said, Do not be afraid. I am the first and the last, the One Who lives." Jesus is always present to comfort us especially in moments of trials.

The Faith Community of St. Bartholomew is the microcosm of the early church; and it is imperative that we make it a family where "all who believe" should always be together to worship and pray. By our resolve to enrich our people spiritually and socially, all should come to esteem us because of our mutual love and outreach to our fellow brothers and sisters. Like the early church, our domestic church is not without its challenges and problems. But we must be a church that enriches members of the community with love, peace, joy, understanding and acceptance. Together, you and I who share in the One Cup and One Body of our Lord Jesus Christ must let Him touch our lives and speak tenderly to us, "Do not be afraid. I am the first and the last, the One Who lives." As members of the church, we should enjoy favor with one another, praising God with exultation and sincerity of heart, because "it is by your love for one another that all will know that you are My disciples" (John 13:34-35).

In this community of faith, whenever we gather to worship and celebrate the Eucharist, the risen Lord visits us and breathes His Spirit upon us, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you" (John 20 :21). He appears to us as a worshipping community, and He sends us to share His peace with one another. He exhorts us to forgive those who offend us. Like the early Christians, He invites us to come together and share the Word and Eucharist. There is strength in unity, thus, whenever you and I come together in this community of faith, Christ is in our midst -He empowers us with the strength to fight and to defeat the devil and to subdue our enemies. Surely, there are challenges as we strive to serve and be faithful to God - there are difficulties on the paths of the leadership and the faithful of the Church, but our united effort will always embolden our resolve to succeed. Jesus urges us, "Do not be afraid!" He is always present to work many signs in our midst. He is there to forgive our sins -He is there to heal us – He is there to take away our pains – He is there to comfort us in our sorrow. Indeed, Jesus is always there to give us new life, because He holds "the keys to death and the netherworld."

TODAY IS **DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY**



Pope John Paul II designated the Second Sunday of Easter as Divine Mercy Sunday; and to ensure that the faithful would observe the day with devotion, he established special graces for participating in prayers and devotions honoring God's Divine Mercy. In his homily at the beatification of Sister Mary Faustina, he reflected on the readings of the Second Sunday of Easter, saying:

"The message of the divine mercy is implicitly a message about the value of every human being. Each person is precious in God's eyes; Christ gave His life for each one; to everyone the Father gives His Spirit and offers intimacy."

The feast of Divine Mercy is both a celebration of God's merciful love and an example for us to follow. God's love for us is never more evident than when He forgives our sins. Today's Gospel describes Jesus' first appearance to His disciples after His resurrection; when He said, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." Then breathing on them, He said, "Receive the Holy Spirit. Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them; and whose you retain are retained." (John 20, 19-23)

What a great gift of His Divine Mercy we receive through our priests in the Sacrament of Reconciliation! We have a duty not only to praise this gift of His Divine Mercy, but also to be agents of mercy in the lives of other people by performing corporal and spiritual works of mercy.
