- Step 1: # the paragraphs
- Step 2: Identify & CIRCLE Key Terms.
 - Look for:
 - Words/Phrases essential to unlocking the meaning of the text
 - Repeated words/phrases, etc.
 - Definitions given by the author
 - HIGHLIGHT words you are unfamiliar with
- Step 3: Identify & <u>UNDERLINE</u> information you think will help you answer the question:
 - The Maya: What Was Their Most Remarkable Achievement?
- Step 4: Discuss your answers w/a partner & back them up with evidence! Get feedback!

Definitions:

- <u>Mesoamerica</u>: the southern part of North America, extending from central Mexico to Honduras and Nicaragua
- Slash-and-burn agriculture: the practice of cutting and burning forests to prepare fields for farming
- <u>Classic</u>: relating to the period of highest development
- <u>City-states</u>: independent settlements, sometimes walled, and often including the surrounding territory
- <u>Ritual</u>: a ceremony with an established order, often related to religion
- Glyphs: picture writing

Background Essay Questions:

- Step 1: Answer each question with information from the background essay
- Step 2: Go back to the background essay & DRAW A BOX around the information that answers each question, label each answer with the question #
- Step 3: Re-read the questions & make sure you answered EVERY part of each question
- Step 4: Discuss your answers w/a partner & back them up with evidence! Get feedback!

 - Doc. A The Mayan Trade Network (map)

- What is a Primary Source?
 - The raw materials of history; original documents and objects which were created at the time under study.

- What is a Secondary Source?
 - Accounts or interpretations of events created by someone without firsthand experience.

Document Analysis:

- Step 1: Break it down <u>BEFORE</u> you read the doc!
 - What is the <u>TITLE</u> of the document?
 - What info does the title give for what the doc is about?
 - What is the <u>LABEL</u> of the document?
 - Where does the <u>SOURCE</u> come from?
 - Speech, Article, Image, Artifact, etc.

Document Analysis ctd:

- Step 1: Break it down ctd
 - Who is the <u>AUTHOR</u>?
 - What is the <u>DATE</u> the document was <u>CREATED</u>?
 - Primary Source v. Secondary Source
 - <u>Primary</u> = contemporary, created at that time
 - <u>Secondary</u> = created later
 - Hint: look at the timeline on the Background Essay Questions
 - PAT any NOTES/explanations?
 - PAT = Pay Attention To

Document Analysis ctd:

- Step 2: Read the doc & ANNOTATE THE TEXT
- Step 3: Answer the questions
- Step 4: Discuss your answers w/a partner & back them up with evidence! Get feedback!

- 3 sentences:
 - Info about:
 - Time Period
 - Place Location
 - Population Size
 - Land Area
 - Etc.

Body Paragraphs/Topics:



- Topic/Transition Sentence:
 - What are you talking about in this paragraph?
 - Reason A, B, or C from your thesis
- Evidence:
 - What evidence from the document(s) supports Reason A, B, or C from your thesis?
- Analysis/Explanation:
 - Explain the evidence you just used
- Concluding Sentence:
 - How does this evidence support Reason A, B, or C from your thesis?

Bucketing & Pre-Bucketing:

- Step 1: Label each bucket "Achievement # _____"
 - Use the 4 buckets to categorize each achievement 1-4
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 - Doc. C The Mayan Number System
 - Doc. D The Mayan Calendar

Criteria (Measuring Sticks):

- Scale: How large, grand, extensive is it?
- Genius: How complicated is it? How much thought/intelligence did it take to create it?
- Physical Effort: How much labor did it take to think of/build it and maintain it?
- Significance: How important was it to their everyday lives and their civilization as a whole?
