REPORT ON FORT UMPQUA DAYS AT ELKTON by Lorraine Hayden

There were 8 historical camps this year. FUML members demonstrated fingerweaving, historic glue, hat making, steps in loading a muzzleloading rifle and tinsmithing. Other demos were Applegate Trail equipment, card weaving, gourd banjo music, sign language, fur trapping, weaving, spinning and a trapper's camp display.

Attendance was 264 on Saturday and 199 on Sunday. Debbie Eikenberry passed out quite a bit of club literature. Folks seemed very interested in the presentations. ECEC folks were very happy with all that happened. Elkton Community Education Center is celebrating their 25th anniversary. FUML started participating in 2004 when Fort Umpqua Days began, replacing the old Fishing Derby Days that had died a few years earlier. Planning the rebuilding of the fort began in 2006. That makes our participation with ECEC for 20 years now! -Lorraine

Of the 8 camps, 3 were from southern Oregon and 3 from Washington, at least 2 of whom were refugees from the historic encampments at Ft. Nisqually in Tacoma which is now focused more on the agricultural aspects of the fort's history.

HARVEST MOON ENCAMPMENT will be October 3-6 at Fort Umpqua in Elkton. This club event is promoted as a primitive encampment and a nice finish to the rendezvous season. Competitions are non-shooting. We send fliers to past participants and anyone who else that requests one. There will be a camp potluck about 5:30 Sat. evening. Club members are welcome to visit any time and join us at the potluck. We don't always get a full moon but that is OK since the night sky there is great for stargazing, especially since there are now trees blocking the security lights at the school.
